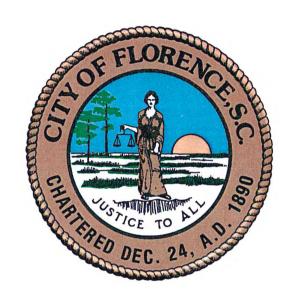

CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Wukela called the May 11, 2020 regular meeting of Florence City Council to order at 1:05 p.m.

INVOCATION

Councilwoman Teresa Myers Ervin gave the invocation for the meeting. The pledge of allegiance to the American Flag followed the invocation.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Councilwoman Ervin made a motion to adopt the minutes of the April 13, 2020 Regular City Council meeting and the May 5, 2020 Special City Council meeting. Councilwoman Moore seconded the motion. The minutes were unanimously adopted.

ORDINANCES IN POSITION

Bill No. 2020-10 - Second Reading

An ordinance to annex and zone CG the parcels located at 305 Pamplico Highway, Florence County Tax Map Parcels 90108-01-001 and 90108-01-004.



Councilman Willis made a motion to adopt Bill No. 2020-10 on second reading and Councilwoman Ervin seconded the motion.

Council voted unanimously (7-0) to adopt Bill No. 2020-10.

Bill No. 2020-12 - Second Reading

An ordinance authorizing the issuance of Waterworks and Sewerage System Revenue Refunding Bonds.

Councilwoman Ervin made a motion to adopt Bill No. 2020-12 on second reading and Councilman Willis seconded the motion.

Mr. Kevin Yokim, Assistant City Manager of Finance/Administration reported the interest rates came in lower than expected at 1.17%, saving the city over \$750,000 over a ten year period.

Council voted unanimously (7-0) to adopt Bill No. 2020-12.

INTRODUCTION OF ORDINANCES

Bill No. 2020-11 - First Reading

An ordinance to annex and zone NC-10 the parcel located at 1620 Third Loop Road, Florence County Tax Map Parcel 90031-02-005.

Mayor Wukela stated the applicant has requested that this item be deferred.

Without objection, Bill No. 2020-11 was deferred.

Bill No. 2020-15 - First Reading

An ordinance to annex and zone NC-6.2 the parcel located at 1012 West Sumter Street, Florence County Tax Map Parcels 90060-08-010 and 90060-08-011.

Councilwoman Moore made a motion to pass Bill No. 2020-15 on first reading and Councilwoman Ervin seconded the motion.

Mr. Jerry Dudley, Planning Director reported the parcel is currently the site of a single family home and City water and sewer service is available.

On April 14, 2020 Planning Commission held a public hearing regarding this matter and voted 7-0 to recommend the zoning designation of NC-6.2, pending annexation approval.

Council voted unanimously (7-0) to pass Bill No. 2020-15.

Bill No. 2020-16 - First Reading

An ordinance to raise revenue and adopt a budget for the City of Florence, South Carolina, for Fiscal Year beginning July 1, 2020 and ending June 30, 2021.

Councilwoman Ervin made a motion to pass Bill No. 2020-16 on first reading and Councilman Jebaily seconded the motion.



Mr. Yokim presented an overview of the FY 2020-2021 budget. Total for all funds is \$91,098,000.

General Fund Budget Highlights:

Initial budget requests were \$2,976,910 greater than revenue estimates. This shortfall was resolved through adjustments to capital requests, department operational requests, as well as adjustments based on attrition trend savings and delayed hiring.

Job related vacancies and controlling expenditures have resulted in savings which will be used for a onetime purchase of auto and maintenance equipment.

General Fund Revenue Budget by Source:

The following chart illustrates the General Fund Revenue Budget by Source and the percentage of budget for each category. Property taxes and Licenses and Fees are the largest contributors to the General Fund revenues.

FY 2020-21 COVID-19 Budget Impacts:

Mr. Yokim stated staff estimates a combined shortfall of \$1.5-2.0 million in the General Fund and the Hospitality Fund. There is a Business License shortfall estimated at \$900,000 that will be spread over FY 2019/20 and FY 2020/21 budgets. The actual impact will be unknown until July 2020 or July 2021. Sales tax is used to fund \$15 million in recreational borrowing, future borrowing for Urban Square, and taxpayer credit factor. Since debt has not yet been issued for Urban Square, debt savings will offset revenue loss. The Hospitality Tax revenue shortfall is estimated at \$470,000, or 50% of fourth quarter revenue. Fund balance (non-General Fund) will cover this shortfall.

Pre COVID-19, General Fund savings were estimated at \$3.0 million. Staff recommends \$1.0 million be used to cover shortfalls detailed above, \$1.2 million for early purchases to balance the FY 2020-21 budget, and remaining \$800,000 be added to fund balance.

The Utility Fund budget is in a good position and any revenue impacts are expected to be minor and brief.

Mr. Yokim completed the FY 2020-21 budget presentation by stating staff will remain diligent regarding COVID-19 budgetary impacts and will monitor capital purchases and other variable expenses to ensure the City remains in a strong financial position.

Council voted unanimously (7-0) to pass Bill No. 2020-16.



Bill No. 2020-17 - First Reading

An ordinance revising the water and sewer rate schedule for the City of Florence, South Carolina.

Mayor Wukela stated the City adopts a rate ordinance for water and sewer utilities every 10 years. The rates are recommended by consultants based on expenses of the utility and inflation of the market. The rate ordinance is completed every ten years for several reasons: 1) To ensure the rates are not influenced by yearly politics; and 2) to ensure that revenues are stable and predictable, which is important for the City's bond holders.

As proposed, the rate increases for the first three years is one percent per year. After this three year period the annual rate increase will be two percent for water and three percent for sewer. In addition, these proposed increases also fund the proposed sewer facility to be located on the west side of Florence.

Mayor Wukela made a motion to defer first reading of Ordinance No. 2020-17

Councilwoman Ervin acknowledged the current COVID-19 situation and how rate increases could further burden the financial responsibilities of Florence citizens. She agreed with the deferral of this ordinance so that Council may further consider the rates.

Councilman Willis and Councilman Jebaily also voiced their concerns on the well-being of the Florence community and are in agreement with the deferral of the ordinance.

Without objection, Bill No. 2020-17 was deferred.

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

Resolution No. 2020-10

A resolution to adopt the 2020 Florence County Hazard Mitigation Plan to comply with the Disaster Mitigation Act of 2000 as required by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA).

Councilwoman Ervin made a motion to adopt Resolution No. 2020-10 and Councilwoman Moore seconded the motion.

Mr. Dudley reported FEMA requires the adoption of an approved Hazard Mitigation Plan in order for communities to be eligible for federal hazard mitigation grant funds. The Florence County Hazard Mitigation Plan was compiled by a working group of County and Municipal staff members and includes the input of the citizens of Florence County through Public Meetings held in Florence County.

Council voted unanimously (7-0) to adopt Resolution No. 2020-10.

Resolution No. 2020-11

A resolution of City Council approving Downtown Redevelopment Grants 4th Quarter, FY20.

Mayor Wukela stated this Resolution will be discussed in Executive Session.



Resolution No. 2020-12

A resolution to adopt the COVID-19 CARES Act budget of \$161,263.

Councilwoman Ervin made a motion to adopt Resolution No. 2020-12 and Councilwoman Moore seconded the motion.

Mr. Davis reported in response to COVID-19, the City of Florence received a special allocation of \$161,263 in CDBG funding. These funds will be used to assist low-moderate income citizens whose jobs or income have been affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. The City has matched the CARES Act funding up to \$150,000.

At the recommendation of City Council, staff coordinated with certain members of the Mayor's Coalition to gather input and assist the City on the use and disbursement of the City's CARES Act funding. Below are their recommendations:

- 1. Direct Services Rent, Mortgage, and Utility Payment Assistance
 - Lighthouse Ministries and Salvation Army will provide rent, mortgage, and utility payment assistance to eligible clients. Estimated allocations of \$250,000 with caps of \$500 for rent/mortgage, \$250 for utilities up to three months.
- 2. Healthcare
 - Mercy Medicine will use the funds for uninsured and unemployed patients for prescriptions and care to keep them healthy as a preventative to COVID-19. Estimated allocation is \$50,000.
- 3. Information Distribution
 - Helping Florence Flourish, United Way, and Family Support Center will partner to prepare and divide information packets and masks/hand sanitizer for the public. Estimated allocation is \$10,000.

Council voted unanimously (7-0) to adopt Resolution No. 2020-12.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

Without objection, Council entered into Executive Session at 1:40 p.m. for a discussion of negotiations incident to matters relating to a proposed Economic Development and a discussion of matters relating to an unnamed economic development project within the Historic District.

AN ORDINANCE TO RAISE REVENUE AND ADOPT A BUDGET FOR THE CITY OF FLORENCE, SOUTH CAROLINA, FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING JULY 1, 2020, AND ENDING JUNE 30, 2021.

WHEREAS, § 5-7-260 of the South Carolina Code of Laws (as amended) requires that a Municipal Council shall act by ordinance to adopt budgets and levy taxes pursuant to public notice.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Florence in Council duly assembled and by the authority of the same:

Section 1

- (b) Further, there is hereby adopted a General Fund Debt Service Fund budget for the City of Florence for fiscal year beginning July 1, 2020, and ending June 30, 2021, as filed in the office of the City Clerk which is hereby incorporated by reference as if set forth fully herein, providing for revenues and appropriations in the total amount of \$455,000.
- (c) Further, there is hereby adopted a Water and Sewer Utilities Enterprise Fund budget for the City of Florence for fiscal year beginning July 1, 2020, and ending June 30, 2021, as filed in the office of the City Clerk which is hereby incorporated by reference as if set forth fully herein, providing for revenues and appropriations in a total amount of \$35,538,000.
- (d) Further, there is hereby adopted a Stormwater Utility Enterprise Fund budget for the City of Florence for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2020, and ending June 30, 2021, as filed in the office of the City Clerk which is hereby incorporated by reference as if set forth fully herein providing for revenues and appropriations in the total amount of \$1,430,000.
- (e) Further, there is hereby adopted a Water and Sewer Utilities Construction Fund budget for the City of Florence for fiscal year beginning July 1, 2020, and ending June 30, 2021, as filed in the office of the City Clerk which is hereby incorporated by reference as if set forth fully herein, providing for revenues and appropriations in a total amount of \$6,790,000.
- (f) Further, there is hereby adopted a Stormwater Utility Construction budget for the City of Florence for fiscal year beginning July 1, 2020, and ending June 30, 2021, as filed in the office of the City Clerk which is hereby incorporated by reference as if set forth fully herein, providing for revenues and appropriations in a total amount of \$379,000.

- (g) Further, there is hereby adopted a Water and Sewer Utilities Equipment Replacement Fund budget for the City of Florence for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2020, and ending June 30, 2021, as filed in the office of the City Clerk which is hereby incorporated by reference as if set forth fully herein providing for revenues and appropriations in the total amount of \$895,000.
- (h) Further, there is hereby adopted a Stormwater Utility Equipment Replacement Fund budget for the City of Florence for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2020, and ending June 30, 2021, as filed in the office of the City Clerk which is hereby incorporated by reference as if set forth fully herein providing for revenues and appropriations in the total amount of \$320,000.
- (i) Further, there is hereby adopted a Hospitality Fund budget for the City of Florence for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2020, and ending June 30, 2021, as filed in the office of the City Clerk which is hereby incorporated by reference as if set forth fully herein providing for revenues and appropriations in the total amount of \$4,606,000. Authorized as part of this ordinance and incorporated into the Hospitality Fund budget is a commitment by the City of Florence to contribute to the operations and maintenance costs of the Florence County Museum for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2020, and ending June 30, 2021, and for future fiscal years through June 30, 2025 pursuant to the Memorandum of Understanding Between Florence County and the City of Florence dated April 25, 2013.

Section 2

In accordance with § 6-1-320 of the South Carolina Code of Laws (as amended), a tax for general operating purposes for the period from July 1, 2020, and ending June 30, 2021, for the sums and in the amount hereinafter mentioned, is and shall be levied, collected and paid into the treasury of the City of Florence for the operational use and service thereof. A tax of fifty nine and one-tenth (59.1) mills upon each one dollar (\$1.00) in value of real estate and personal property of every description owned and used in the City of Florence, South Carolina, is and shall be levied and paid into the City treasury for the credit to the City of Florence for the corporate purposes, improvements, and for the purpose of paying current operating expenses of said municipality. Such tax, set at the same operating millage rate as the previous fiscal year, is levied on property assessed for taxation for County and State purposes.

Section 3

In accordance with of § 6-1-320 of the South Carolina Code of Laws (as amended), a tax for general obligation bond indebtedness for the period from July 1, 2020, and ending June 30, 2021, for the sums and in the amount hereinafter mentioned, is and shall be levied, collected and paid into the treasury of the City of Florence for the purpose of meeting general obligation bond debt service requirements. A tax of up to, but not exceeding, four (4.0) mills upon each one dollar (\$1.00) in value of real estate and personal property of every description owned and used in the City of Florence, South Carolina, is and shall be levied and paid into the City treasury for the credit to the City of Florence for the purpose of

providing and paying for general obligation bond debt of the municipality. Such tax is levied on property that is assessed for taxation for County and State purposes.

Section 4

In accordance with § 23-47-10 through § 23-47-80 of the South Carolina Code of Laws (as amended), and § 14-93 through § 14-98 of the City of Florence, SC Code of ordinances (as amended), funding is and shall be provided to allow for the operation, maintenance, and enhancements of the E-911 system through a monthly charge of seventy-seven cents (\$0.77) upon each local exchange access line in the area served by or which would be served by the E-911 service and/or system of the City. Such charges are specifically enforceable under § 23-47-50 (B) of the SC Code of Laws. E-911 fees collected by the City of Florence shall be used to fund the acquisition of Police and Fire communications equipment in compliance with § 23-47-40 (B) of the South Carolina Code of Laws, as amended. Funding in the total amount of \$560,000 is hereby appropriated and allocated in increments of approximately \$80,000 per year over a seven-year period, from fiscal year beginning July 1, 2015 through fiscal year ending June 30, 2022 as part of a multi-year communications equipment budget provided pursuant to the Florence City Council adoption of Resolution No. 2015-13.

Section 5

The City Manager shall administer the budget and may authorize the transfer of appropriate funds within and between departments as necessary to achieve the goals of the budget. The City Manager is authorized to assign fund balance intended to be used for specific purposes.

Section 6

The City Manager or his designee is authorized to execute all necessary documents relating to the lease-purchase financing of equipment specifically authorized in the budget as presented or amended by City Council for fiscal year beginning July 1, 2020, and ending June 30, 2021. This action further constitutes a resolution of City Council authorizing and approving such equipment for lease-purchase acquisition, and this ordinance shall serve as representation of this resolution.

Section 7

If for any reason, any sentence, clause or provision of this Ordinance shall be declared invalid, such shall not affect the remaining provisions thereof.

Section 8

That all ordinances or parts of ordinances conflicting with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed, insofar as the same affect this Ordinance.

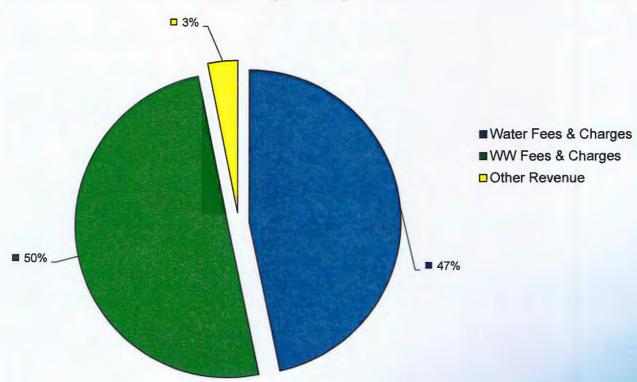

FY 2020-21 COVID-19 Budget Impacts

- ▶ Staff estimates a combined shortfall of \$1.5-\$2.0mm in the General Fund and the Hospitality Fund
 - ▶ Business license shortfall estimated at \$900,000, to be spread over FY2019/20 and FY2020/21. Impact unknown until July 2020 or July 2021.
 - Sales tax is used to fund \$15mm recreational borrowing, future borrowing for Urban Square, and taxpayer credit factor. Since debt has not yet been issued for Urban Square, debt savings will offset revenue loss.
 - ► Hospitality tax revenue shortfall estimated at \$470,000, or 50% of fourth quarter revenue. Fund balance (non-General Fund) will cover this shortfall.
- ▶ Prior to virus, General Fund savings were estimated at \$3mm. Staff recommends \$1mm be used to cover shortfalls above, \$1.2mm be used for early purchases to balance FY2020/21 budget, and remaining \$800,000 be added to fund balance.
- Utility Fund budget is in good position and any revenue impacts are expected to be minor and brief.
- Staff will remain diligent regarding COVID-19 budgetary impacts and will monitor capital purchases and other variable expenses to ensure the City remains in a strong financial position.

I. ISSUE UNDER CONSIDERATION

An ordinance revising the water and sewer rates by providing for a ten-year rate schedule beginning with Fiscal Year 2020/21 to become effective July 1, 2020.

II. CURRENT STATUS/PREVIOUS ACTION TAKEN

- **A.** A comprehensive water and sewer utility rate study for the City of Florence was last conducted in 2010. Based on the recommendations of that study, a ten-year rate schedule was adopted by City Council on March 8, 2010. This rate schedule is effective through June 30, 2020.
- **B.** The City's combined water and wastewater system continues to face ongoing fiscal challenges related to increasing operational costs and capital improvement needs to include the construction of a new wastewater treatment facility.
- **C.** In response to these challenges, the City of Florence contracted with Willdan Financial Services to perform a new ten-year comprehensive water and sewer rate study.
- **D.** On April 9, 2020, the City received the first draft of the findings and recommendations of the comprehensive ten-year water and sewer rate study by Daryll Parker of Willdan Financial Services.

III. POINTS TO CONSIDER

- **A.** A thorough analysis of the City's operating, capital, and debt service needs indicates that rates for the combined water and sewer system must be revised to include a rate schedule which will meet the current and future financial requirements of the system.
- **B**. As proposed, the rate increases for the first three years are one percent per year. After this three year period the annual rate increase will be two percent for water and three percent for sewer. In addition, and very significantly, these proposed rates also fund the proposed sewer facility to be located on the west side of Florence.
- **C.** The proposed ten-year rate schedule, to become effective with the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2020, is recommended to meet these current and future requirements.

IV. STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Approve and adopt the proposed ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE REVISING THE WATER AND SEWER RATE SCHEDULE FOR THE CITY OF FLORENCE, SOUTH CAROLINA

WHEREAS, continued use and expansion of the combined water and sewer system of the City of Florence is important and necessary for the health, welfare, and public good of the citizens, and

WHEREAS, a comprehensive water and sewer utility rate study for the City of Florence was last conducted in 2010, and based on the recommendations of that study, a ten-year rate schedule was adopted by City Council on March 8, 2010. This rate schedule is effective through June 30, 2020, and

WHEREAS, the City's combined water and sewer utility system faces ongoing fiscal challenges related to increasing operational costs and capital improvement needs to include the construction of a new wastewater treatment facility, and

WHEREAS, in response to these ongoing fiscal requirements, a new comprehensive ten-year rate study was recently performed by Willdan Financial Services, an independent rate consultant, that included an extensive examination of the City's combined water and sewer system operating and capital improvement needs, and

WHEREAS, based on recommendations resulting from the comprehensive rate study, the City has concluded that a revision of the water and sewer utility rates is necessary to allocate costs equitably and produce sufficient revenues to operate, expand, and improve the system as needed and required for the public good, and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the Mayor and Council of the City of Florence, South Carolina, that the following sections or noted subsections of said sections of the City of Florence Code of Ordinances be revised and are hereby amended to read as stated below. Existing subsections not specifically identified in the sections below shall remain unchanged as written.

Sec. 12-87.1. Monthly rates for ordinary service.

(g) The schedule for sanitary sewer rates inside the City limits based on subsections (a) through (f), shall be set for a period of ten years consecutive fiscal years and thereafter, unless amended, as follows: FY 2021, FY 2022, FY 2023, FY 2024, FY 2025, FY 2026, FY 2027, FY 2028, FY 2029, and FY 2030. Rates will be effective from July 1 through June 30 of each fiscal year. The fiscal year 2030 rates shall remain in effect for subsequent years unless amended.

I. ISSUE UNDER CONSIDERATION

For consideration is the adoption of an Ordinance to amend Code Section 12-130

II. CURRENT STATUS/PREVIOUS ACTION TAKEN

Code Section 12-130 creates a violation for unlawful damage to the water system and states that any person causing such damage will be charged with a misdemeanor.

III. POINTS TO CONSIDER

The City is now several months into the Flex Net project, which will convert virtually all the water meters to "radio read" meters. This involves replacing each meter and also installing an MXU radio read device on top of each meter. The cost of each new meter is approximately \$120 and the cost of each MXU device is approximately \$150. Meter reading staff has noticed a few instances in which either the new meter and/or the MXU device has been damaged after it was installed, resulting in increased cost to the City. Therefore, the City needs a mechanism to be able to recover this cost by adding this cost to the customer's utility bill. The City Attorney has recommended that this be done through the adoption of an Ordinance, rather than by policy.

ORDINANCE NO. 202	20-
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AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CODE OF ORDINANCES SECTION 12-130.

WHEREAS, the City of Florence needs a mechanism to recover the cost of replacing radio read water meters and associated devices.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Florence in Council duly assembled and by the authority of the same:

1) Section 12-130 currently reads as follows:

"It shall be unlawful and a violation of this chapter for any person to damage, deface, alter, change, or tamper with any part of the waterworks system; and upon conviction, said person shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and punished in accordance with the penalty for a misdemeanor and shall be liable for the full costs incurred."

2) Section 12-130 is removed in its entirety and replaced with the following:

"Section 12-130. - Protection of Water Meters from Unlawful Damage, Tampering or Improper Care.

- a. It shall be unlawful and a violation of this chapter for any person to damage, deface, alter, change, or tamper with any part of the waterworks system; and upon conviction, said person shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and punished in accordance with the penalty for a misdemeanor and shall be liable for the full costs incurred.
- b. According to South Carolina State Code, it is unlawful for anyone to tamper with or damage a water meter, MXU, SmartPoint device, or associated equipment. It shall be unlawful for anyone to remove a meter or install any pipe or other device which will cause water to be received without being properly registered by the meter. No trees, bushes, shrubs, fences, structures, or other obstructions shall be located within one foot of the meter box in order to keep the meter accessible to the City of Florence. The property owner and/or customer shall exercise proper care to protect the meter, MXU, SmartPoint device, meter box, and other City of Florence property serving his/her premises from damage or loss from any other cause, and in the event of loss or damage thereto arising from neglect or from any other cause, shall pay the estimated cost of any water received illegally and the costs of repairing or replacing the damaged items before further service will be provided at this location."
- 3) If for any reason, any sentence, clause or provision of this Ordinance shall be declared invalid, such shall not affect the remaining provisions thereof.
- 4) That all ordinances or parts of ordinances conflicting with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed, insofar as the same affect this Ordinance.

DEPARTMENT/DIVISION: Department of Planning, Research & Development

I. ISSUE UNDER CONSIDERATION:

Request to rezone from RS to RG-3 44 acres located on Sam Harrell Road, specifically identified as Florence County Tax Map Number 00175-01-224. The request is being made by the property owner, Gary Finklea.

II. CURRENT STATUS/PREVIOUS ACTION TAKEN:

- (1) On May 12, 2020 Planning Commission held a public hearing on this matter, and voted unanimously, 8-0 to recommend the rezoning request of RG-3, General Residential Housing District.
- (2) This parcel was considered by the Florence County/Municipal Planning Commission at its meeting on January 22, 2008, at which time it was recommended to be annexed into the City and zoned R-3, Single Family Residential District (40.61 acres) and R-2, Single Family Residential (4.56 acres).
- (3) The parcel was officially annexed by City Council March 14, 2008 with the R-3 & R-2 zoning designation.

III. POINTS TO CONSIDER:

- (1) Request is being considered for first reading.
- (2) The vacant property consists of approximately 44.2 acres and is currently zoned RS Suburban Residential; this district is intended to provide for single-family development with a suburban character. The minimum lot size in the RS Zoning District for a Conventional Neighborhood Development is two acres.
- (3) The proposed zoning is RG-3 General Residential; this district is intended to provide for a variety of residential housing and neighborhood types with an auto-urban or new-urban character. The minimum lot size in the RG-3 Zoning District for a Conventional Neighborhood Development is 6,000 square feet.
- (4) At this time there is no development proposed for this parcel
- (5) The parcel was zoned R-3 (40.61 acres) and R-2 (4.56 acres) under the previous Zoning Ordinance. Adoption of the Unified Development Ordinance resulted in the designation of the property as RS, Residential Suburban, which staff believes was a translational error in map conversion from the previous Zoning Ordinance to the current Unified Development Ordinance. The requested RG-3 is more consistent with the original zoning granted by City Council March 14, 2008.
- (6) City staff recommends that the rezoning request be approved and concurs with Planning Commission's recommendation to rezone the property to RG-3.

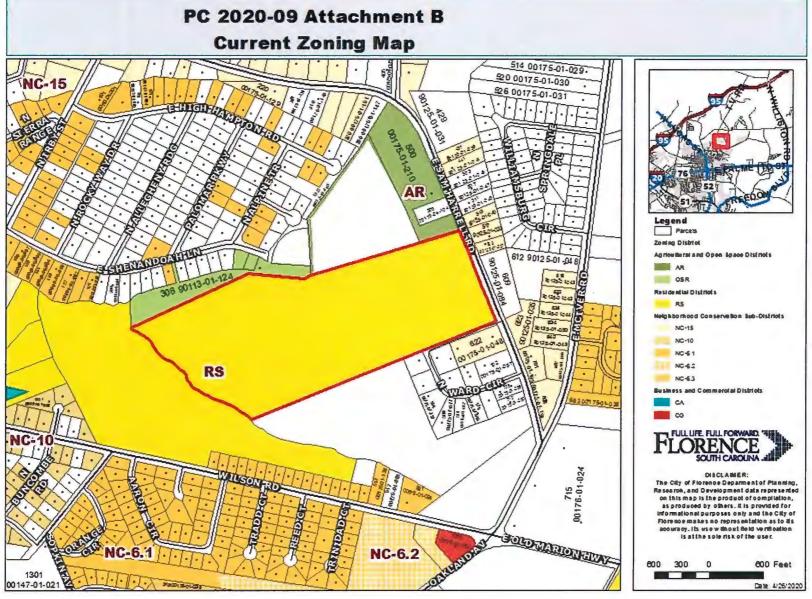

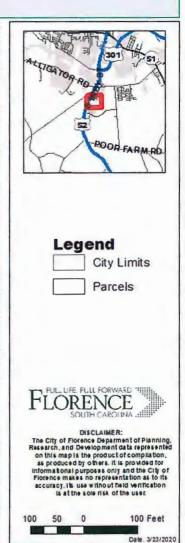

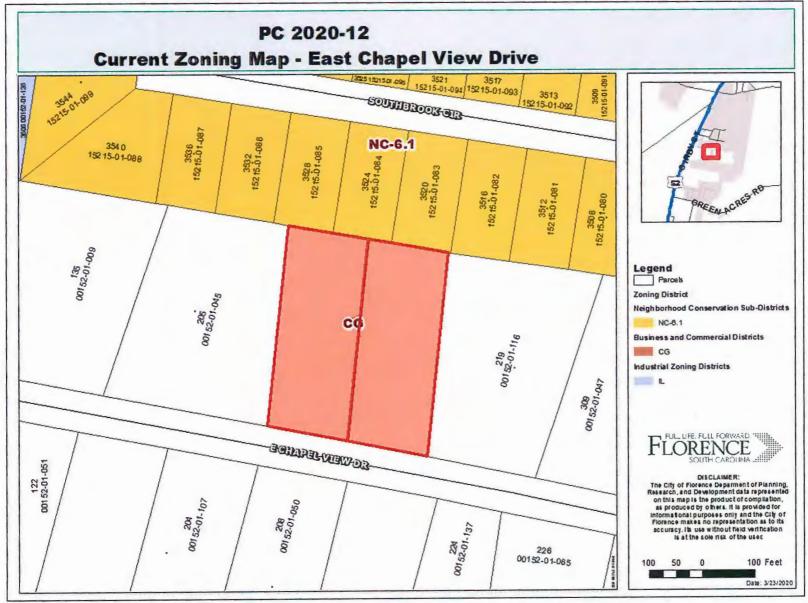
