THURSDAY, JANUARY 25, 2024

CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Ervin called the Thursday, January 25, 2024 Work Session of Florence City Council to order at 10:00 a.m.

INVOCATION

Mayor Ervin gave the invocation for the meeting. The pledge of allegiance to the American Flag followed the invocation.

WORK SESSION

Mr. Scotty Davis, Deputy City Manager, began the session by asking all attendees to introduce themselves. Following introductions, Scotty moved into a discussion on the budget. He said his budget philosophy is that staff has an unwavering commitment to ensuring the city is delivering high-quality services and is responsive to the needs and concerns of our residents. How do we do this?

- 1. Develop operational budgets within projected available revenues.
- 2. Focus on goals of Comprehensive Plan:

Growth Capacity

Land Use and Development

- 3. Invest strategically in employees by providing adequate pay, benefits, training, technology resources, support, etc.

- 5. Maintain a minimum General Fund balance of at least 30% of the General Fund budget.
- 6. Maintain sufficient working capital in the utility funds.

2025 Budget Influencers

External factors influencing the budget are inflation, the labor market, improved borrowing costs, residential growth and the AESC original investment plus expansion. The average inflation rate for 2023 was 3.4%, down from 8% in 2022. The Florence County unemployment rate is 3% compared to the South Carolina unemployment rate of 2.9% and the United States unemployment rate of 3.9%. Federal interest rates are projected to reduce in 2024. Current federal rates average 5.25%-5.5% with projections of 4.6% in 2024 and 3.6% in 2025. AESC is expected to create 1,620 jobs with a total investment of \$1.62 billion.

Mr. Davis went over Fiscal Year 2024-25 revenue and expenditure assumptions. It is assumed that property tax revenue will remain stable. The city will need to continue to "backstop" the TIF bonds with water and sewer funds. Building permit revenue is down 34.7% from this time last year; however, this is being due to permits being pulled early in Fiscal Year 2023 for two major projects. Business license revenue is up 20.7%, but it is too early to determine if this trend will continue. Hospitality revenue is up 10.4%. Water revenue is up less than 1% but should continue to rise and sewer revenue is up 6.25%. Water and sewer rates will increase by 9% for inside city limit customers and 11% for outside customers



for the Fiscal Year 2025. Operational and capital costs will continue to rise as a result of wage inflation, supply chain constraints, fuel price fluctuations, materials and supply cost increases and insurance premium increases.

FY 2022-23 Year End Review

Highlights of the FY 2023 Annual Comprehensive Plan:

- For the Fiscal Year ended June 30, 2023, the City's Governmental Funds reported a combined fund balance of \$47,633,835, an increase \$52,212.
- At year end, the City's Governmental Funds reported a total outstanding bonds and notes payable obligations of \$85,159,199 compared to \$88,840,293 last year, a decrease of 4.3%.
- For the Fiscal Year ended June 30, 2023, the Water and Sewer Fund reported a total fund balance of \$150,447,526 a decrease of \$8,123,072. The unassigned fund balance decreased \$13,957,959 from \$39,700,018 to \$25,742,059. The decrease is due to economic development payments for the AESC project.
- The Water and Sewer Fund reported an outstanding bonds and notes payable of \$106,080,215 a decrease of \$12,937,643 compared to \$119,017,858 last year.

The General Fund:

The following chart illustrates the General Fund Revenues in 2023 compared to 2022. Property tax revenue, miscellaneous revenues and revenues from other funding sources are down from 2022.

Mr. Davis said the City of Rock Hill completes an annual cost of public service comparison study among several South Carolina cities, to include Florence. According to the comparison, Florence has one of the lowest net property tax rates in the state. This low tax rate makes it very difficult for Florence to compete with the other cities. There was discussion on the city's millage rate compared to other cities. State law now regulates and limits the amount of millage that can be raised annually. Some cities make it a practice to raise their millage the maximum allowed amount each year, whereas Florence went several years without raising millage at all.



The following chart illustrated the General Fund Expenditures in 2023 compared to 2022. Total expenditures are down approximately 17%.

Outstanding Debt:

Mr. Davis went over current outstanding debt. He said it is important to know the current debt and what it means for the City of Florence. The City is analyzed by two rating agencies: Moody's and Standard and



Poors. The City has a rating of Aa2 with Moody's and a rating of AA- with Standard and Poors, meaning the City is in very good standing. Mr. Davis went over the current outstanding governmental debt and utilities debt for the City and their maturity dates. Several bonds are scheduled to mature over the next year.

Human Resources

Mr. Davis began the discussion on recruitment and retention. MIT conducts a living wage study and, according to the study, Florence County has a living wage of \$15.32 per hour. There are currently several City positions that have a starting wage below the Florence County living wage. Mr. Davis said it is his hope we are able to increase the salaries to the minimum of the living wage.

Councilwoman NeSmith-Jackson asked for the total amount of employees that are below the living wage. Mrs. Jennifer Krawiec, Human Resources Director, said this mostly affects employees starting out and the majority of employees are above the range due to merit and years of service increases. The desire is to raise the salary for the starting position to be above the \$15.32, which will in turn impact other positions. While she is unsure of the cost, she does think it is able to be done with this next budget. Councilwoman NeSmith-Jackson inquired on the City's lowest salary and Mrs. Krawiec said the lowest is currently \$8.00 per hour for some part time positions and the lowest full-time position is \$12.48 per hour.

Mr. Davis said it is important to continue the annual cost of living and merit increases in order to keep starting salaries competitive and avoid compression. City of Florence salaries are competitive in the region and among similarly sized municipalities in the state, but it is very difficult to attract quality employees with the unemployment rate being so low in Florence County.

Mr. Davis discussed some compensation challenges the City faces. In regard to the Police Department, the City relaxed the facial hair and tattoo policy to attract more applicants and retain current employees. This year's 8% cost of living increase allowed the compensation for non-certified and certified officers to be more competitive with surrounding agencies. There was discussion on recruiting officers from larger cities outside of South Carolina. Police jobs are advertised on a variety of websites to include community sites and law enforcement specific sites.

The City does offer attractive benefits to include PEBA health insurance, state retirement, an onsite nurse practitioner, and paid retiree insurance. Health insurance is a significant cost to the City. Nationally, health insurance premiums continue to rise; however, employee cost; remain low with little to no increases for employee premium contributions.

Mr. Davis said some concepts to consider to assist with recruitment and retention include expanding the Employee Wellness Clinic to include retirees, student loan repayment assistance, and a modified work schedule. Some considerations for a modified work schedule include half-day Fridays with longer hours Monday through Thursday, a four-day work week, and job sharing to keep retirees. There was discussion on a modified work schedule among Council and staff and its potential positive and negative impacts.

Police Department

Mr. Allen Heidler, Chief of Police, discussed the current and upcoming needs of the Police Department. He began by providing an overview of the life expectancy of a patrol vehicle. The biggest factor in the life expectancy of a patrol vehicle is engine hours. Normal preventative maintenance is done on a vehicle



based on driven miles; however, police vehicles sit and idle for long periods of time which isn't calculated into the wear of the vehicle. The idle time is just as taxing on a vehicle as driven miles in most cases. According to industry standard calculations, one engine hour equals thirty driven miles. The average patrol vehicle has over 3,000 engine idle hours within three years of use, which is equivalent to 90,000 driven miles.

Chief Heidler also spoke on patrol vehicle turnover. The Police Department has on average 50 vehicles that are used for daily response services and another 20-25 that are utilized by specialty units. Several vehicles will be ready to cycle out this year and be made into spares. The cost of vehicles has significantly increased since 2019 and the cost to upfit a vehicle is expected to increase as well. The best method for cycling vehicles is to purchase 5-8 vehicles per year which will allow the City to turnover approximately one quarter of the fleet every four years and cycle reliable units into the spare fleet. Chief Heidler said the vehicle request for 2024 is five vehicles. If ordered early in the fiscal year, it is expected that these vehicles will cost approximately \$55,000-60,000 and would be delivered early to mid-2025.

Chief Heidler said the City is receiving several stationary flock cameras that will monitor entrance ways and exit ways of the City. These cameras are an investigative tool and are able to read license plate tags and assist in tracking individuals and solving crimes.

Councilman McCall raised a concern with the media receiving a press release with the information on the cameras prior to Council's knowledge. Mayor Ervin asked that releases be shared with Council before being shared with the media so they are informed when residents reach out to them. Scotty said releases will be shared with Council from the City Manager's Office prior to being released to the media moving forward.

Mayor Ervin mentioned cameras that are currently located at some of the parks. Mr. Davis clarified that the cameras are located on the buildings/community centers and are only monitoring people coming and going from the buildings and to protect staff. Mayor Ervin expressed her desire to have cameras located at all parks.

There was discussion on the potential to add an armored vehicle to the fleet. Councilman Braddock requested that staff look into armored vehicles and provide Council with information on cost, design, potential storage locations, et cetera.

Chief Heidler spoke on long term and large evidence storage next. The SC Evidence Preservation Act requires evidence to be preserved. The Police Department currently leases a building for storage but due to state law requirements, the City will need to consider relocating their long-term and large evidence storage facility due to reaching capacity of the current site. Chief Heidler discussed potential sites and cost estimates. The approximate project total is \$500,000.

Fire Department

Mr. Shannon Tanner, Fire Chief, discussed the current and upcoming needs of the Fire Department. He began with an overview of the current status of the Fire Department. Chief Tanner said the Fire Department is currently running seven companies comprised of six Engine Companies and one Ladder Company, responding out of six stations. The average responses over the last few years is 4,548 calls. In order to maintain the current ISO rating of 1, Fire Department response must be in five minutes 90% of the time for the first due engine and nine minutes 90% of the time for the second due engine and first due ladder.



Chief Tanner discussed fire apparatus replacement. Currently, the Fire Department has five first out engines, one first out ladder and one quint running as a first out engine from the stations. The last major purchase of apparatus occurred in 2010 and 2012; therefore, many of the first out apparatus, engines and ladders have age on them. Chief Tanner expressed the urgency in the necessity to purchase three engines and one ladder. Recently, at least one truck has been out of service every day and obtaining parts for repairs has become difficult. The pandemic created a major backlog on apparatus delivery as well as significant price increases. Currently, delivery times for engines are 36 months and ladders are 48 months. The current cost of a fire engine is \$1,000,000 and a ladder is \$2,000,000 which equates to a 40% increase in price over the last three years. Signing a contract to purchase new apparatus will lock in pricing and start the clock on receiving the apparatus. It will be necessary to refurbish the current first due engines and ladder until the new apparatus arrives.

Chief Tanner also discussed staff vehicle replacement. Chief Tanner requested to replace five vehicles this budget and five next budget year. Vehicle prices range from \$30,000 to \$40,000 and have a delivery time from 90 to 365 days.

Chief Tanner spoke of Fire Department facilities and growth. Recently two fire stations were built on the west side of the City and fifteen years ago a station was built on the south side of the City. Two of these were additional stations while one was a relocation. Many of the older stations are in need to upfitting and repairs. Due to annexation and continued growth, Chief Tanner discussed the need to add an additional Engine Company on the west side of the City at Station 4, an additional Battalion Chief, and an additional Fire Station on the southeast side of the City.

Councilman McCall inquired on the most critical need. For future needs, Chief Tanner said adding a ladder truck and an engine company. However, the present need is to replace existing trucks.

Mr. Davis discussed the current Building Department status. Over the last two years, the Building Department has experienced an overall increase of 42% in inspections. If this increase continues, the City will need to hire additional inspectors to keep up with the increase. Mr. Davis said the City is considering charging a re-inspection fee after the first inspection, which would require an ordinance to be passed.

City Manager's Office

Mr. Davis said the City is under a three-year contract with Citibot. Mrs. Amanda Pope, Director of Marketing, Communications and Municipal Services, said the bot has been named Cypress or "Cy". The City is still working to implement with the work order program with Citibot and the tentative launch date is in March.

Mrs. Pope said the City of Florence Municipal Code is in need of a complete recodification. Recodification will involve a full legal and thorough review of the City's code to ensure that provisions are comprehensive, lawful, and enforceable. The approximate cost for recodification is \$75,000.

Mrs. Pope provided a brief overview of the City Center Farmers Market and Commercial Kitchen. Farmers Market vendors are comprised of food producers and farmers, as well as artisans. Several events are held at the Farmers Market to include Jam Fest, Farm to School, Holiday Gift Market, Bee City Takeover, and the Cultural Garden Celebration. The Commercial Kitchen is a shared commissary-style kitchen available for rent and is a certified South Carolina Department of Health and Environmental Contral facility. Current facility needs include a market entrance sign, parking improvements, and an additional permanent shed at a total approximate cost of \$150,000. The City owns several surrounding properties that may be able to accommodate these needs.

Parks and Recreation Services Division

Mr. Davis spoke of the needs of the Parks and Recreation Services Division. He acknowledged the lack of signage in the City's parks. Interpretive signage can be very educational for residents providing insights into the history, significance, and unique feather of each location. Interpretive signs serve as outdoor graphic displays that enhance awareness, appreciation, and understanding of the environment. There is also a need to replace picnic shelters at Lester Park, Lucas Park, and Southpark.

Mr. Davis spoke of the Florence Trail System. There is a need to add wayfinding signage to the Florence Trail System. Mr. Clint Moore, Assistant City Manager of Development, spoke of the recent trail extension from the existing rail trail to the Soccer Complex and said the contract has been signed for this project. The City also received a grant to complete an extension of the trail from Naturally Outdoors as well as add a kayak slip. Mr. Davis said the Florence trail system boat launches are in need of better infrastructure to facilitate easier and safer boat launches. It is important that residents are able to enjoy outdoors and all Jeffries Creek has to offer.

There was discussion on naming some of the parks after individuals in the community to raise money for these improvements. Mr. Moore said there are already local groups and non-profits that work with the City to help with these efforts.

Mr. Davis spoke of the need to add multiple dog parks in several locations throughout the community. The establishment of dog parks will bring benefits such as community enhancement, tourist appeal and community health and well-being. Potential locations include the downtown area, Levy Park, Southpark, and McLeod Park.

The NFC Program has offered to fund \$30,000 towards the installation of a Fitness Court, which could significantly enhance our public spaces. However, the total cost is projected to cost \$175,000 – 225,000. Locations that have been approved by the program include Levy Park and could be included with the anticipated Levy Park expansion. The City is still waiting to hear back on the status of the grant; however, the City may need to plan and budget for the maintenance and upkeep of the park.

There was discussion on the addition of an amphitheater to Dr. Iola Jones Park. The estimated cost of an amphitheater and concrete pad is \$250,000.

Athletics/Sports Tourism Expansion

The City currently has four major complexes: Dr. Eddie Floyd Tennis Center, Freedom Florence Recreation Complex, Florence Soccer Complex, and the Florence Sports Complex. Mr. Davis spoke of the need to continue to emphasize sports tourism. Current athletic facility needs include new facilities such as a football complex and an addition of an arena to the Pearl Moore Basketball Gymnasium. Mr. Davis spoke of some obstacles in expanding Pearl Moore. There was discussion on the potential for eminent domain for surrounding abandoned properties and buildings. Mr. Boone Aiken, City Attorney, said the City will have to establish a legitimate public purpose for the property. There was further discussion on abandoned and dilapidated properties and the potential to add an affidavit to these properties when they are purchased to state the future purpose of the property or add a fee to abandoned buildings. Mr. Boone Aiken, City Attorney, said he will research these requests.



Current renovation needs include a Dr. Eddie Floyd Tennis Center expansion/repair and a Freedom Florence baseball/softball light upgrade.

Total cost for all these projects is approximately \$20 million. Potential funding sources include the hospitality fund, the creation of a Tourism Improvement District, or CDBG Section 108 loan, if located within a CDBG eligible area. A Tourism Improvement District would consist of a partnership with local hotels in the area and adding a fee on hotel stays within the City of Florence with a committee group overseeing the fund usage.

FRIDAY, JANUARY 26, 2024

CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Ervin called the Friday, January 26, 2024 Work Retreat Session of Florence City Council to order at 9:05 a.m.

INVOCATION

Mayor Ervin gave the invocation for the meeting. The pledge of allegiance to the American Flag followed the invocation.

Public Works Department

Mr. Davis said Beautification and Facilities (including the animal shelter), Equipment Maintenance, and Sanitation are the three divisions of the Public Works Department.

Mr. Adam Swindler, Public Works Director, gave an overview of future Public Works needs. Current Beautification and Facilities Division needs include additional employees; various capital equipment such as aging forklift, motor grader, backhoe, skid-steer, and tree trucks; and new housing/space for offices, equipment storage, and sign shop operations. Mr. Swindler also discussed necessary facility repairs for the animal shelter.

Current Equipment Maintenance Division needs include additional employees; an updated/new facility and amenities to meet current and future service needs; capital equipment; and other items such as a Fleet Maintenance Management Software.

Mr. Swindler spoke on the Sanitation Division next. Sanitation collects approximately 14,450 residential units per week or approximately 2890 units per day. For every 500 units added, an additional route/truck is needed. Mr. Swindler discussed the transfer fee increases over the last 5 years. The recycling fee has seen a significant increase and is now \$165.00 per ton while less than 25% of the City's residents participate in recycling. In fiscal year 2023, 525 tons of recyclable material were collected at a cost of \$86,625. Below is chart detailing the transfer fee increase over the last five years.

Mr. Swindler presented needs for the Sanitation Division to include new facilities and additional trucks. Mr. Swindler discussed aging offices and buildings at the Public Works Department site. New facilities needed include offices, meeting and training rooms, lockers and bathrooms and showers. Depending on annexation numbers, it is forecast that two residential rear loader trucks will be necessary at a cost of approximately \$600,000. If the City continues the recycling program, an additional commercial front loader truck will be necessary at a cost of approximately \$400,000. Prices for sanitation trucks are expected to increase. Currently, a commercial front loader is \$400,000, basic residential rear loader is \$255,000, upgraded residential rear loader is \$315,000, a grapple loader is \$200,000 and a lift gate truck for roll cart delivery is \$65,000.

Mr. Swindler went over some issues sanitation faces with residents piling boxes, furniture, bags, et cetera at the curb for pick up and there was discussion on adopting and ordinance to establish a fine for these situations. Mr. Davis said the City Attorney can start working on an ordinance. Mr. Davis spoke on landlord evictions. In South Carolina State Code, a landlord is able to set the evicted tenant's belongings on the curb. The City then must collect the items, but only after forty-eights hours has passed. Mr. Davis said state law does not require the landlord to notify the City when they've placed items out, so the forty-eight hours begins once the City is notified either by a resident or a sanitation worker.

Growth and Development

Mr. Moore said annexation, growth and development impacts every City department. Since 2018, the City has approved 3,500 new units of residential construction which can have a substantial impact. Mr. Moore discussed projected City limits growth over the next ten and twenty years and said it is based largely on utility availability. Important concepts to consider with annexation, growth and development is the direction of residential growth; the direction of commercial growth; and impacts related to the extension of water and sewer infrastructure, sanitation services, fire services, police services, recreation, and streets and stormwater. There was discussion on annexation and doughnut holes throughout the City. Mayor Ervin expressed her desire for the City to be more aggressive with doughnut hole properties and communicate with the residents the benefits of annexation. Mr. Moore said there are several mechanisms the City can implement in an attempt to control, manage and direct growth. Common strategies for municipalities include Impact Fees and Special Purpose Taxing District.

Mr. Moore provided a housing and rental outlook. The estimated population by 2030 is 47,000 residents. The recent median sales price for a home in Florence is \$250,000, up from \$159,000 in 2019. The average household income is \$52,425, which is a monthly income of \$4,300. The current cost of a new build



residential home is \$150 per square foot and current mortgage rate is 7%. Mr. Moore said the City looks at how to remain developer friendly while also protecting the environment of the current resident. Upcoming projects that will need to be addressed in the Unified Development Ordinance include an update to the sign ordinance, short term rentals, accessory dwelling units and the riparian buffer. Upcoming costs include an update to the 2020 Comprehensive Plan at \$75,000 – \$85,000, Design Guidelines at \$135,000, a Neighborhood Revitalization Plan at \$150,000, an Affordable Housing Study at \$150,000 and Corridor Studies at \$200,000 - \$300,000.

Downtown Development

Mr. Moore said downtown currently has a 6% vacancy rate, which indicates how the City should approach downtown development and how to progress downtown. Currently, downtown has property maintenance and appearance codes for the Historic District only; however, the incentive boundary was expanded. It may be beneficial to also expand the property maintenance and appearance codes to include the Irby Street Corridor and the Food, Artisan, and Warehouse District.

Community Services

Mr. Davis gave an overview of the projects in progress to include rehabilitation, weatherization, demolition, new home construction, preliminary work on the Pine Street Masterplan, and the Habitat for Humanity home. Mr. Davis provided an overview of the Pine Street Master Plan to help with homeownership in the area.

Utilities Department

Mr. Davis said the workforce for the Utilities Department is comprised of employees with technical expertise and specialized skills. Mr. Jerry Dudley, Utilities Director, provided Council with some challenges he faces with the Utilities Department. The City must compete with other government and private sector jobs as well as other geographic locations for employees in this field. Water and Wastewater Operators must obtain certification and it takes years of on-the-job experience to become a competent operator. Additional employees will be necessary due to the surface water expansion, growth of the City and the utility, and to maintain water quality. It is important to provide a livable wage to attract quality employees. Mr. Dudley spoke of the challenge of rising costs and capital expenses. These have higher upfront costs and the equipment is more technical and typically requires contractors to repair. Emergency repairs also presents a challenge because it eats up a lot of the budget and the budget for these types of repairs is small. Emergency repairs include sewer repair, water line repair, lift station repair, pump repair, repair parts, et cetera. Solutions for some of these concerns include on-call contractors, preventative maintenance contracts and capital improvement projects.

Mr. Dudley spoke on water quality and recent complaints. Most water quality complaints are due to iron in the water. Many of the groundwater plants and wells are in need of repairs and maintenance. If the City were to overhaul all the groundwater plants at once, it would cost over \$20 million. Four plants are scheduled for renovation utilizing grant funds. Mr. Dudley said a work group to focus on water quality was established with participants from various departments around the city.

Mr. Dudley discussed various specialized equipment needs to include two sewer vac-trucks at a cost of \$500,000 per truck, a valve installation machine at a cost of \$120,000, and a boring machine at a cost of \$200,000.



Projects Update

Mr. Moore provided an update on stormwater projects in relation to the \$7 million stormwater bond. Projects completed include Sandhurst West, Tarleton Estates and Phase I of St. Anthony/College Park. Current projects ready for bid include Pennsylvania Street and Cedar and McQueen Streets. Engineering has begun for the North Church and Oakland Avenue project and the Master Plan is nearing completion.

Mr. Moore provided information regarding the Penny Sales Tax. Capital Projects Sales Tax III passed by referendum in November 2020. The City received \$40,000,000 from the County and a bond was issued in summer, 2021. Approximately 170 total roadways and projects were included, and, to date, thirty-six roadways have been completed and twenty-four are under contract. Mr. Moore said the City does not have a funding mechanism for road resurfacing so the Penny Sales Tax has helped to accomplish many projects. The fourth Penny Sales Tax will go before taxpayers in November 2028 as a referendum and the City will need to soon plan for potential projects and areas of focus.

Utility Planning and Economic Development

Mr. Michael Hemingway, Utility Planning and Economic Development Director, discussed infrastructure upgrades for growth and regulatory compliance. The below chart illustrates the project and the current, estimated capital costs associated with the upgrades.

Mr. Hemingway then discussed impacts of global warming. Given the uncertainty of future weather events, effective stormwater management requires that the City develop strategies to minimize the probability of flood conditions and to mitigate the impact of other extreme weather conditions. Impacted infrastructure includes the Jeffries Creek Interceptor, Middle Swamp Interceptor, Pye Branch, High Hill Creek, Two Mile Creek Black Creek, roads and housing. The City must take proactive measures to maintain and enhance existing stormwater infrastructure for current and future development. Mr. Hemingway went into detail on several of the projects and upgrades.

Mr. Hemingway said Florence County Economic Development is working to bring several major economic development projects to the area. If these projects come to fruition, the City will need to look at starting construction of the Wastewater Facility expansion in 2026 instead of waiting until 2028 as



originally planned. In this instance, the City will be overlapping the Surface Water and Wastewater facility expansions. Mr. Heminway said there are potential federal funding opportunities for several of these projects and they are working through the process to hopefully obtain this funding.

Mr. Davis spoke on Impact Fees. Impact Fees represent financial payments from a developer to a local government that fund their proportionate share of certain off-site capital improvements needed to accommodate future growth. Impact Fees pass construction costs onto new development rather than existing development. Impact Fees may be used for design and engineering, right-of-way acquisition, construction, utility relocation and project financing. In order to implement an Impact Fee, the City will need to prepare an Impact Fee Justification Report, prepare a capital projects list, prepare a Housing Affordability Study, and adopt an Impact Fee Ordinance. Council expressed their desire to have staff research Impact Fees.

General Fund - Fund Balance

Mr. Davis said the unassigned fund balance for the General Fund was \$21,234,879, an increase of \$9,094,144 in comparison of last year. The unassigned fund balance represents 43% of expenditures which is 13% above the 30% set as the minimum. This equates to approximately \$6.5 million. Council and staff broke into groups and discussed the biggest needs for the City and how the General Fund fund balance can be utilized to help with the needs discussed during the work retreat.

CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Ervin called the February 12, 2024 regular meeting of Florence City Council to order at 1:01 p.m.

INVOCATION

Mayor Ervin gave the invocation for the meeting. The pledge of allegiance to the American Flag followed the invocation.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Councilwoman Barnes made a motion to adopt the minutes of the January 8, 2024 Regular Meeting and Councilwoman NeSmith-Jackson seconded the motion. The minutes were unanimously adopted.



SPECIAL PRESENTATION

The City of Florence Tennis Center was recognized for receiving the USTA Southern Outstanding Parks and Recreations Department Award.

APPEARANCES BEFORE COUNCIL

Ernie James and Paul Pittman, Florence Tennis Association

Mr. Ernie James and Mr. Paul Pittman appeared before Council to speak on tennis in the City of Florence. Mr. James stated that tennis has grown significantly in Florence and nationwide for the last three decades. Mr. Pittman informed Council that the packet they received contains information regarding the 2023 Report of the state of tennis in Florence and programs presented by the Florence Tennis Association (FTA). (The packet is attached to and made a part of these minutes.) Mr. James informed Council that the FTA has agreed to coordinate a tennis program at Levy Park. The goal is to also expand tennis to the North Florence area. Mr. Jonathan Barch briefly spoke on the economic impact of tennis in the Florence area. Mr. James and Mr. Pittman thanked Council for their support of the Florence Tennis Association.

ORDINANCES IN POSITION

Bill No. 2024-01 - Second Reading

An Ordinance to annex and zone Neighborhood Conservation-15 (NC-15) 233 North Lakewood Drive, Florence County Tax Map Parcel 90008-01-003.

Pro tem Jebaily made a motion to adopt Bill No. 2024-01 on second reading and Councilman McCall seconded the motion.

Council voted unanimously (7-0) in favor of the motion. Bill No. 2024-01 was adopted.

Bill No. 2024-02 - Second Reading

An Ordinance to convey a portion of the West Vista Street right-of-way to the South Carolina Department of Transportation, specifically fifty feet west from the intersection of West Vista Street and North Irby Street.

Councilwoman Barnes made a motion to adopt Bill No. 2024-02 on second reading and Councilwoman Nesmith-Jackson seconded the motion.

Council voted unanimously (7-0) in favor of the motion. Bill No. 2024-02 was adopted.

INTRODUCTION OF ORDINANCES

Bill No. 2023-42 - First Reading

An Ordinance to rezone 1110 Oakland Avenue from NC-6.1 to NC-6.3, identified as Florence County Tax Map Number 90114-08-004.

Councilwoman Barnes made a motion to pass Bill No. 2023-42 on first reading and Councilman Smith seconded the motion.

Mr. Clint Moore, Assistant City Manager of Development, reported this rezoning request was deferred at last month's meeting. The property located to the east is zoned NC-6.3 and neighboring properties to the



north and south are zoned NC-6.1 with some commercial reuse, activity center and campus zonings as well. The applicant is requesting the rezoning to construct townhomes on the property. The current NC-6.1 zoning only allows for single family residential homes and a rezoning to NC-6.3 would allow townhomes to be constructed on the property. Mr. Moore reiterated that this is a deferred matter, and that the applicant has not provided any additional information.

Mayor Ervin asked if adjacent properties are single family homes. Mr. Moore stated that is correct. Mayor Ervin also stated that there was a public hearing with the community and the developer, and the community was not in support of the townhomes being constructed. Mr. Moore responded that there were mixed opinions regarding the construction of the townhomes.

Pro tem Jebaily stated he was hoping that Council would have received clarity from the developer, as this was the reason of the deferral from last month's meeting. This development has a look and feel of spot zoning, and he feels that the adjacent property owners may try to follow suit. He stated that he did not think this would be in the best interest of the properties along this corridor to approve this request. Having not received further clarity from the developer, Pro tem Jebaily said his concerns remain the same and he will be voting against the rezoning request.

Councilman McCall expressed his support of the rezoning request, although he wished the developer had further discussion with the community. Councilman McCall stated that new development in this part of town is always met with a lot of resistance. He stated that he understands the concerns, but he is still going to support the rezoning request.

Mayor Ervin stated that the purpose of community revitalization and neighborhood conservation is to preserve the character of traditional communities. This community is zoned for residential single family and she cannot remember an instance where Council has permitted townhomes to be built amid single family homes. She provided details regarding projects that have taken place in some of the City's catalytic areas. Mayor Ervin stated she agrees with Pro tem Jebaily and she cannot support something that may even appear to be spot zoning.

Council voted 5-2 against the motion with Mayor Ervin, Pro tem Jebaily, Councilwoman Barnes, Councilman Braddock, and Councilwoman Nesmith-Jackson voting against and Councilman Smith and Councilman McCall voting in favor of the motion. Bill No. 2023-42 was denied.

Bill No. 2024-03- First Reading

An Ordinance to amend the City of Florence Code of Ordinances Chapter 1.7 and add a new subsection providing that a person who violates any section of the City's Code of Ordinances with the intent to intimidate another person or persons in whole or in part because of the action or perceived race, color, creed, religion, ancestry, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity, physical or mental disability or national origin is guilty of the separate offense of hate intimidation.

Councilwoman Nesmith-Jackson made a motion to pass Bill No. 2024-03 on first reading and Mayor Protem Jebaily seconded the motion.

Mr. Scotty Davis, Interim City Manager, stated that a hate crime ordinance would create a separate offense and if found guilty and would be punishable by a maximum fine of \$500 or thirty (30) days in jail. South Carolina and Wyoming are the only two states without a statewide hate crime ordinance.

Councilman Braddock addressed Mr. Zeigler and asked how this bill relates to state law. Mr. Zeigler said the state has not acted on the bill yet, so local governments are able to impose their own penalties. If the



house bill does pass and become law, he would then need to research the what status of the local enactment would be in light of the state taking action. The proposed bill will create a separate offense depending on if there is another violation of a separate city ordinance. Mr. Zeigler stated that if the ordinance violation is proved to be motivated by hate, then this can be added on as a second offense, essentially a penalty enhancement.

Councilman Braddock made a motion to defer Bill No. 2024-03 until the state has an opportunity to address this situation during the upcoming session. Councilwoman Barnes seconded the motion.

Pro tem Jebaily stated that his understanding that a deferral would only be until next month and he doesn't believe the situation in the Senate will be resolved by then. He suggested that Council move forward with the ordinance and if the state does take action with state law, the City can then revisit the City ordinance.

Mr. Zeigler stated that if the General Assembly creates a hate crime law for the state, then the question would be if a local enactment and statewide enactment can cover the same issue. Without researching the issue, he is unable to answer this question now. If the General Assembly acting invalidates the local ordinance, then Council would not need to withdraw the ordinance. It will be effective until there is a statewide enactment.

Following the explanation given by Mr. Zeigler, Pro tem Jebaily asked if Councilman Braddock would like to withdraw his motion. Following discussion, Councilman Braddock withdrew his motion to defer Bill No. 2024-03. The main motion is on the table.

Councilman McCall spoke in support of this bill and said he hopes the state can address this matter, as many hate crimes are happening all over the world and people need protection.

Mayor Ervin acknowledged that several community members asked Council to consider this matter and this bill is in response to the community's concerns. She stated she will support anything that makes the community a more inclusive society.

Council voted unanimously (7-0) in favor of the motion. Bill No. 2024-03 was passed on first reading.

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

Resolution No. 2024-05

A Resolution to appoint Scotty Davis, Kevin Rawlinson and Victoria Nash as Directors of the Public Facilities Corporation.

Councilwoman NeSmith-Jackson made a motion to pass Resolution No. 2024-05 and Councilwoman Barnes seconded the motion.

Mr. Kevin Rawlinson, Chief Financial Officer, said this resolution is to replace the members of the Public Facilities Corporation. This is a not-for-profit corporation that was created out of the requirements of a debt service funding mechanism called Installment Purchase Revenue Bond (IPRB). Even though bonds are outstanding, the corporation still must exist. Previous members of the corporation included Randy Osterman, Kevin Yokim, and Chuck Pope and all three are no longer with the City of Florence.

Council voted unanimously (7-0) to pass Resolution No. 2024-05. Resolution No. 2024-05 was passed.

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FLORENCE CITY COUNCIL REGULAR MEETING – FEBRUARY 12, 2024

Resolution No. 2024-06

A Resolution to state the support of the City of Florence for the Clementa C. Pinckney Hate Crimes Act, H-3014, and to request approval of said Act by the South Carolina Senate.

Councilman Braddock made a motion to pass Resolution No. 2024-06 and Councilwoman Nesmith-Jackson seconded the motion.

Senator Mike Reichenbach spoke to Council to provide an update of Bill H-3014. Senator Reichenbach informed Council that Bill H-3014 has received bipartisan and full support from all nine members of the Florence County Legislative Delegation. The Senate Judiciary Committee passed the bill out of the Senate last year, so the next step is for the bill to receive "special order." Senator Reichenbach stated that Council could help this bill come to fruition by encouraging constituents to reach out to fellow state senators that may not fully understand or support Bill H-3014. Senator Reichenbach clarified that the bill is an enhancement bill on a violent crime and that it must be shown that the crime was motivated by terror and hate.

Councilman Braddock thanked Senator Reichenbach and his wife Charisse for coming today to provide clarity on H-3014. There is a lot of confusion regarding this bill and that he is pleased that Council and the Florence County Legislative Delegation all agree that this is very important to our state and community.

Pro tem Jebaily also thanked Senator Reichenbach for shedding light on Bill H-3014. He offered his assistance with reaching out to fellow state legislators.

Councilwoman Nesmith-Jackson thanked Senator Reichenbach for coming today to share information regarding H-3014. She also offered her support with reaching out to fellow state legislators.

Councilwoman Barnes thanked Senator Reichenbach for coming to provide insight regarding H-3014.

Council voted unanimously (7-0) to pass Resolution No. 2024-06. Resolution No. 2024-06 was passed.

Resolution No. 2024-07

A Resolution and Conditional Grant and Development Agreement to provide an incentive for the development of new housing in Historic West Florence as part of the ongoing Neighborhood Redevelopment Project.

Mayor Ervin said this item will be discussed in Executive Session. Without objection, this item will be discussed in Executive Session.

Resolution No. 2024-08

A Resolution to proclaim February 26 – March 1, 2024 as Montessori Education Week in the City of Florence.

Councilman Braddock made a motion to pass Resolution No. 2024-08 and Councilman McCall seconded the motion.

Councilwoman NeSmith-Jackson presented the Resolution to Elizabeth Kahn, Director of the Montessori School of Florence and students.

Council voted unanimously (7-0) to pass Resolution No. 2024-08. Resolution No. 2024-08 was passed.



Resolution No. 2024-09

A Resolution of Recognition for the induction of Darryl Page into the South Carolina Football Coaches Association Hall of Fame.

Councilman Smith presented the Resolution to Darryl Page.

Council voted unanimously (7-0) to pass Resolution No. 2024-09. Resolution No. 2024-09 was passed.

REPORTS TO COUNCIL

Appointments to Boards and Commissions

Mr. Davis presented the packet of appointments to Boards and Commissions to Council.

Design Review Board

Councilwoman NeSmith-Jackson made a motion to reappoint Kyle Gunter to the Design Review Board and the motion carried unanimously. Kyle Guner was reappointed to the Design Review Board for a term to begin immediately and expire on June 30, 2027.

Housing Authority

Councilman Braddock deferred his nomination to the Board.

Comprehensive Financial Report and Audited Financial Statements

Mr. Tracy Huggins of Burch, Oxner, Seale Company, CPA's, PA reported for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2023. The City had budgeted revenues of \$37,887,000 and actual revenues of \$39,835,000 in the General Fund. This resulted in a positive variance of \$1,948,000. Budgeted expenditures were (\$47,417,000). Actual expenditures were (\$49,073,000) leaving a negative variance of (\$1,000,665). Budgeted operating deficiency in the general fund of revenues over expenditures was (\$9,530,000). Actual operating deficiency of revenues over expenditures was (\$9,238,000), leaving a positive budget variance of \$292,000. 55% of general fund revenue came from property tax credits, business licenses and franchise fees.

Governmental Funds: The unassigned fund balance in the General Fund is \$21,235,000 an increase of \$9,095,000 from prior year. This represents 43% of general fund expenditures for the year.

Enterprise Funds: Operating revenues last year were \$44,373,000; operating expenses were (\$32,839,000); net non-operating expenses were (\$16,502,000); capital contributions were \$2,811,000; total transfers out were (\$5,346,000); leaving a net loss of (\$7,000,504) in the enterprise fund.

Council thanked Mr. Huggins for his report.

Request to reschedule the March and November 2024 Regular Meetings of City Council

Councilwoman Barnes made a motion to reschedule the March and November 2024 Regular Meetings of City Council and Councilman Smith seconded the motion.



Interim City Manager Scotty Davis stated that there has been a request to reschedule the March 2024 Regular Meeting of City Council to Monday, March 18, 2024 due to several councilmembers traveling out of town for training sessions.

Mayor Ervin stated that the November 2024 Regular Meeting of City Council falls on Veterans Day and city offices will be closed. It has been requested that this meeting be rescheduled to Monday, November 18, 2024.

Council voted unanimously (7-0) to reschedule the March and November 2024 Regular Meetings of City Council to Monday, March 18, 2024 and Monday, November 18, 2024.

MAYORAL REPORT

Mayor Ervin spoke of recent awards the City has received. She also acknowledged Mr. Scotty Davis as the Interim City Manager. Mr. Davis recently led a budget retreat with council and city staff, and it went very well. Mayor Ervin encouraged citizens to utilize the city's website, as well as the city's social media accounts to communicate with city officials and staff.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Business Development Committee, Chaired by Pro tem Jebaily

Pro tem Jebaily stated the committee received information and updates regarding the III Penny Sales Tax, capital road projects and infrastructure projects. He thanked city staff for their dedication, hard work and for providing information to council each month. The committee also received an update on the city's corridors and looks to bring a corridor study to council once more information has been received.

Community Development Committee, Chaired by Councilwoman Barnes

Councilwoman Barnes stated the committee met last month and discussed a wish list that was placed on social media. She thanked those who responded to the wish list and stated that the list is being worked on. Councilwoman Barnes also said the committee met with Mr. Ben Zeigler and is looking at ways to preserve the community's history. The committee also received a report regarding community services projects.

Marketing and Public Relations Committee, Chaired by Councilwoman NeSmith-Jackson

Councilwoman NeSmith-Jackson stated the committee discussed the progress of the city's app, which will be launching soon. She stated the committee has been doing a lot of engaging and educating through the city's Facebook account with "did you know" segments and encouraged everyone to visit the city's Facebook page to receive more information.

Finance, Audit and Budget Committee, Chaired by Councilman McCall

Councilman McCall stated the committee received a presentation regarding sports tourism in the City of Florence. The committee also revisited the CARE program to address concerns received from the community.

EXECUTIVE SESSION



Mayor Ervin said Council will be entering into Executive Session for a discussion of matters related to an Economic Redevelopment Project, for a discussion of matters relating to an Economic Development Project and for a personnel matter.

Councilwoman Barmes made a motion to enter into Executive Session and Councilwoman NeSmith-Jackson seconded the motion. Council voted unanimously (7-0) to enter into Executive Session at 2:34 p.m.

Council resumed open session at 3:20 p.m. and took action on the following items:

Resolution No. 2024-07

A Resolution and Conditional Grant and Development Agreement to provide an incentive for the development of new housing in Historic West Florence as part of the ongoing Neighborhood Redevelopment Project.

Councilwoman NeSmith-Jackson made a motion to pass Resolution No. 2024-07 and Councilwoman Barnes seconded the motion.

Council voted unanimously (7-0) in favor of the motion. Resolution No. 2024-07 was passed.

PRESENTATION TO FLORENCE CITY COUNCIL

February 12, 2024

- The Florence Tennis Association (FTA) is a 501(c)3 organization with over 600 hundred volunteer members. Its mission is to grow and develop the sport of tennis in Florence and the surrounding area. We do this by using tennis to serve the community.
- We manage or support dozens of major tournaments every year—from the professional McLeod for Health Florence Open to college, high school, Southern, South Carolina and local recreational events. Last year, tourism revenues from these events amounted to \$ 6.62 Million.
- We manage year-round adult and youth leagues with thousands of players, and provide a tremendous amount of programming for the public including low-cost beginner clinics and low-cost and free programs for underserved kids.
- Since its inception in 2021, our Ron James Youth Tennis Program has served over 800 underserved area children. This program is part of the US Tennis Association's National Junior Tennis and Learning network, which was founded to combine tennis and education to motivate young people to succeed.
- Diversity is a major theme for the USTA and the FTA. Tennis in Florence does not yet look like our population, but we are pushing it in that direction as hard and as fast as we can.

- The FTA is funded primarily by tournament entry fees, member fees, accommodations tax funding, corporate sponsorships and grants. To date, over \$300,000 in grant money has gone directly into growing local tennis.
- The FTA works closely with City and County governments and area schools to make high-quality tennis courts available to the public. It played a major role in developing the Dr. Eddie Floyd Florence Tennis Center, and has on several occasions helped County and City officials obtain funding to refurbish courts. It has constructed a hitting wall, a storage building and changeover benches at public facilities, and provided scorecards and other amenities for numerous public courts.
- The FTA was named National Community Tennis Association (CTA) of the year in 2007, Southern CTA of the year in 2007 and 2021, and SC CTA of the year four times. It has been honored for community service by the Southern and State Tennis Associations, the SC Parks and Recreation Association, and the Florence Athletic Hall of Fame. FTA leaders are highly respected tennis volunteers at the national, regional, and state levels
- Working together, the City Department of Athletics and Sports Tourism and the FTA have put Florence on the national tennis map.

REPORT ON TENNIS IN FLORENCE - 2023

January 15, 2024

Executive Summary

- Tennis in Florence is growing at a steady rate. This is true when we look at sports tourism and the number of major events coming to the Dr. Eddie Floyd Florence Tennis Center, and when we consider the large number of recreational programs and activities held at the Tennis Center and at other venues, public and private.
- The driving forces behind the continuing success of tennis are year-round good weather, the availability of enough well-maintained courts to support large events and regular recreational activities, conscientious management by the Florence Department of Athletics and Sports Tourism, and steady support from the Florence Tennis Association and the tennis community.
- An estimated 8,800 people played tennis in Florence this past year, including a record number of local residents. Players of all ages and skill levels took part in tournaments, lessons and clinics, adult and junior leagues, outreach programs, and professional, college, high school, and social matches. A number of national and regional events were held at the Florence Tennis Center and other local venues, generating \$6.62 Million in tourism revenues.

Facilities

- The Dr. Eddie Floyd Florence Tennis Center has 30 courts. In addition, there are 11 courts at Timrod Park, 2 at Lucas Park and 2 at Levy Park.
- Florence County has 5 public courts at Ebenezer Park and has requested bids for 2 more, as well as 2 at Greenwood Park just South of the City.
- With prior coordination, event planners can use 18 public high school courts, plus 8 at Francis Marion University, 8 at the Florence Country Club and 6 at the Country Club of South Carolina.

- There are 85 hard surface public, school and club courts. With this
 number we can recruit mid-size tournaments, although some of the
 courts are spread around town or in two-court complexes, which
 discourages some large tournaments from coming to Florence.
 There are only 14 clay courts, too few for most tournaments.
- We do not have enough centrally located courts to host very large national tournaments.
- There are enough courts for recreational players, although finding places to play can be difficult when major tournaments are under way.
- The buildings at the Tennis Center are adequate, but cramped (the FTA just helped build an additional storage facility). Most other area venues have limited amenities, and some require porta-potties for big events. For major tournaments, parking overflows the lots at the Tennis Center and causes congestion at Timrod Park.

Tournaments

- Florence is becoming an important site for regional and state tournaments, and hopes to entice national events. This can be attributed primarily to our excellent facilities and the strength of our tennis community. Another vital, but intangible factor is credibility: we have always done well as tournament managers and hosts, and both the Dr. Eddie Floyd Florence Tennis Center and the Florence Tennis Association are known and respected in tennis circles nationwide.
- The City of Florence hosted 29 tournaments with 5,330 participants.
 An estimated 4,400 of these were visitors who were in town for several days.
- These included 2 professional tournaments, 3 college team tournaments, 2 state high school team tournaments, 2 state high school individual tournaments, 2 pre-season high school tournaments, 2 state adult league championships tournaments, 2 USTA adult tournaments, 9 USTA junior tournaments, and 3 FTA social tournaments.
- Most tournaments were managed entirely by Tennis Center staff, FTA volunteers, or both. However, in some cases, staff and volunteers supported management teams from other entities.

City Programs

- The Dr. Eddie Floyd Florence Tennis Center is staffed and equipped to provide a full complement of services to players at all levels. With four full-time employees, three of whom are teaching professionals and five part-timers, it manages 45 courts, including 15 at other locations.
- During 2023 the Tennis Center provided regular individual lessons for adult and junior players of all skill levels. In addition, there were numerous group clinics for adults and four regular clinics for juniors at different ages and skill levels, as well as an Academy for advanced junior players.
- The Center also conducted two week-long summer camps for beginner and intermediate junior players.
- Small group adaptive tennis clinics were provided for individuals with mental disabilities.
- The Tennis Center hosts quarterly Match Play opportunities for high school and junior tournament players. Average attendance is 25.
- Contract pros also teach at the Tennis Center, and can be used to supplement the permanent staff when necessary.

Florence Tennis Association Programs

- An all-volunteer non-profit organization, the FTA has almost 600
 members and its programs bring the benefits of tennis to thousands
 of local residents and visitors. It manages a number of tournaments,
 the USTA Adult Leagues, and a Junior Team Tennis league. It also
 offers beginner programs for adults, social events, Cardio and Triples
 Tennis, and an outreach program for under-served youth.
- USTA Adult Leagues. Over 500 participants played in 477 team matches, which amounts to 3,340 individual play occasions on 1,603 courts. League seasons, which ran for approximately two months each, included Spring Men's and Women's Leagues, a Men's and Women's Combo League, a Mixed Doubles League, Men's and Women's Singles Leagues, and a Social League made up largely of new players.
- Junior Team Tennis. Just under 40 children took part in JTT, which is a competitive program with several age divisions for children who have a basic understanding of the game. This is a significant drop

- from the previous year, and the program is expected to grow quickly in 2024.
- Adult beginner classes. There were 11 Tennis 101 classes, each 6 sessions long, during the year. They produced 87 new adult players.
- Cardio Tennis clinics. The FTA held 10 Cardio Tennis events in 2023, with 98 participants.
- Triples Tennis event. An introductory clinic was held near the end of 2023 with 27 players.
- The Ron James Youth Tennis Program. Free multiple-session clinics were provided to 480 under-served children. These included after-school programs at 5 Florence District 1 elementary schools, clinics at District 1 and City summer camps, programs at Boys and Girls Clubs and YMCAs, and Saturday Fun Days at the Tennis Center. A member of the United States Tennis Association's National Junior Tennis & Learning Network, the RJYTP targets youth who would otherwise have limited access to the sport. Its goal is to improve lives through tennis and education.

College Tennis

- The Francis Marion University Men's and Women's teams have 26 student-athletes from 13 countries. In 2023, they played in 25 matches and 3 tournaments.
- Three collegiate tournaments, including the Conference Carolinas Championships, were held in Florence in 2023.
- FMU players participate frequently in community tennis events.

High School Tennis

- All three public high schools had varsity and junior varsity boys' and girl's teams. There were approximately 40 players in each program a total of 120 for the three schools.
- Private high schools also fielded tennis teams—boys' and girls' at Trinity, and girls' at Florence Christian, Kings Academy and All Saints—adding another 80 to 100 kids.

 Typically, high school seasons include 20 dual team matches and up to 3 tournaments. High school team matches are composed of 5 to 6 individual matches. Conservatively, local high schools played over 230 team matches and at least 1,200 individual matches in 2023.

Other Recreational Play

- The Florence Country Club maintained an active instructional and social tennis program and entered several teams in the Pee Dee Adult Leagues.
- The Country Club of South Carolina tennis program was largely dormant in 2023.
- Florence County conducted instructional and recreational tennis at several sites, including Ebenezer Park on the Western edge of Florence. Several Ebenezer teams competed in the Pee Dee Adult Leagues.
- A significant number of individuals, families and social groups played recreational tennis at public and private venues—a conservative estimate is that at least 2,000 people played recreational tennis on their own.

Economic Impact.

- Tennis generated \$6.62 Million in tourism revenues in 2023, almost half of the amount brought in by all sports.
- During 2023, the FTA received grants totaling \$25,230,51, with \$20,250 earmarked for the Ron James Youth Tennis Program. Over the past 20 years, FTA grant revenue has exceeded \$300,000, all of which has gone back into community tennis.
- Area businesses invested an over \$60,000 in sponsorship, marketing and public awareness funds in tournaments or other events, or in direct support of the FTA and its programs. Sponsorship for the McLeod for Health Florence Open women's professional tournament added another \$32,000, and included sponsorship grants from USTA Southern, USTA South Carolina, and the FTA.
- The FTA received 2023 Accommodations Tax Awards of \$14,643.39 from the City of Florence and \$2,310.00 from Florence County.

Recognition

- Since the construction of the Dr. Eddie Floyd Florence Tennis Center, our community has gained a reputation as one of the South's tennis hot spots. The City Department of Athletics and Sports Tourism was recently honored as the USTA Southern Parks & Recreation Department of the year for 2023. Earlier, the Dr. Eddie Floyd Tennis Center was named Southern and SC Member Organization of the Year in 2014, and selected as a USTA National Outstanding Tennis Facility in 2022 and a USTA Premier Facility in 2023. It received a Ten-Year Tournament Award from the USTA Pro Circuit in 2023.
- The FTA has helped put Florence on the national tennis map. It was named USTA National Community Tennis Association of the Year in 2007, Southern CTA of the Year in 2021, and SC CTA of the Year in 2004, 2007, and 2013, and won the USTA South Carolina Cam Littlejohn Community Service Award in 2008. Its Boys and Girls High School Tournaments claimed the USTA South Carolina Jim Russell Junior Tournament of the Year Award for in 2016. In addition, the FTA has been recognized for community service by the state Recreation and Parks Association and the Florence Athletic Hall of Fame, and in 2021 the Florence City Council issued a proclamation commending the Ron James Youth Tennis Program. FTA leaders have been asked to speak on community development, diversity, and advocacy at national, Southern and state meetings and conferences.
- Florence is well known in tennis circles in part because tennis volunteers from the FTA have been exceptionally active at the national sectional and state levels for many years. In the past ten years, the FTA has produced 2 USTA committee members; 2 USTA Southern Section Board members and 7 committee chairs or members; 2 USTA South Carolina Presidents, 8 Board members and 29 committee chairs or members. There have also been 3 Southern Tennis Foundation Board members, 2 South Carolina Tennis Patrons Foundation Chairs and 5 Board members, and 3 Florence Area Sports Council Chairs. In addition, FTA volunteers have won every volunteer leadership and service award available at the Southern and state levels. The South Carolina Tennis Hall of Fame contains 2 Florence residents.

Community Value of Tennis

- The value of tennis extends far beyond the dollars and cents it brings into our community. It is demonstrably America's best health and fitness sport, providing both physical conditioning and cardiovascular exercise, and players tend to be healthier than their contemporaries. On average they live 9.7 years longer than other American adults, and significantly longer that people who play any other popular sport.
- Tennis can be played into and well past middle age. In fact, for most players, it is a "sport for a lifetime".
- With its focus on friendly competition and team play, tennis makes it easy to meet new people and make lifelong friends. Its social aspects make it great for relaxation, stress-relief, and quick decompression.
- Everyone is welcome. Lessons are readily available for beginners and there are tennis programs for people of all ages and all levels of ability, including those who are mentally or physically challenged.
- Compared to most sports, the equipment is inexpensive and there are plenty of public courts. In fact, some 80% of American tennis is played in public parks.
- Tennis emphasizes fair play and good sportsmanship. Young players are trained to treat teammates and opponents with respect and "in your face" behavior is not tolerated.
- Students who play tennis regularly, including those from disadvantaged backgrounds, are healthier, do better socially and academically, and have better high school graduation and college acceptance rates than their peers.
- All of these factors explain why tennis is growing steadily across the country and in Florence. End of year 2022 statistics show a 33% increase in play since 2019, with a total of 23.6 million players in the United States. Estimates of 2023 and early 2024 growth, based on equipment sales and court construction, suggest that this boom is continuing.

Ron James Youth Tennis Program

Program Structure

- The Ron James Youth Tennis Program was created in 2021 to provide tennis instruction and academic assistance to under-served youth in Florence, South Carolina and the surrounding communities. To date, over 800 children between the ages of 6 and 18 have taken part in the program.
- The RJYTP is currently a subsidiary of the all-volunteer, 501(c)3 Florence Tennis Association (FTA) and a member of the United States Tennis Association (USTA) National Junior Tennis and Learning (NJTL) network.
- Within three years we hope to convert the program into a separate non-profit organization. As a first step in this direction, the RJYTP will form its own community-based Board of Directors in November of 2023. This Board will assume all normal Board functions, including governance, fiscal oversight and representational responsibility, while relying on the FTA for continued support.
- The program is funded by grants and local donations. Over the past three years, the RJYTP has received grants from the USTA Foundation, USTA Southern, and the South Carolina Tennis Patrons Foundation. It has also benefited from annual contributions from the FTA and the City of Florence Athletics and Sports Tourism Department, and from the work of its volunteer Fundraising Committee, which is made up of Florence area business leaders. It receives significant pro bono support from the Florence Tennis Center in the form of court usage, meeting space, equipment, and

technical assistance. To date, grants have totaled over \$60,000 and donations over \$17,300.

- The most significant expense is staffing, with smaller amounts for equipment and supplies. We pay part-time tennis pros and a part-time Administrative Coordinator at the prevailing local hourly rates. Of course, we use as many volunteers as possible, and we have put several of them through USTA Community Coaches Courses. Three of us recently completed Level 1 Coaches training and are certified by the Professional Tennis Registry (PTR) to work with children. Over the first three years, incomes have outpaced expenses, allowing us to build a small reserve fund.
- The RJYTP is named for Ron James, a retired educator and tennis
 professional who managed youth tennis programs for the City of Florence
 and the FTA and coached the Wilson High School tennis teams. Mr. James,
 who was loved and respected by everyone in the tennis community, died
 unexpectedly in 2019.

Tennis

- The RJYTP began on-court tennis instruction during the summer of 2021 and has since provided over 50 after-school, weekend and summer programs. Teaching is done in small-group clinics conducted by certified tennis professionals and trained volunteers using USTA-approved, ageappropriate curricula and equipment. Adults who work directly with children must pass the USTA Safe Play course and background check.
- Clinics are provided to participating youth without cost. We also provide youth racquets and all other necessary equipment.
- Initially, clinics were held at the Dr. Eddie Floyd Florence Tennis Center. However, Covid made that difficult. The RJYTP worked initially with the Boys and Girls Clubs of the Pee Dee and Girls University, but Girls University was forced out of business by the pandemic and the Florence Boys and Girls Club has been unable to provide transportation for months. The Boys and Girls Club and the City of Florence After-School Centers want to resume

lessons at the Tennis Center as soon as their current transportation issues are resolved.

- In April of 2022, the RJYTP began a partnership with Florence School District 1's Extended Day Academy, which serves approximately 560 youngsters at 14 middle and elementary schools. This collaborative program, which features both after-school and summer sessions, is ongoing and has already impacted 11 elementary schools—typically with 16 clinics per school spread over four to eight weeks.
- We also have a partnership with the City of Florence Parks and Recreation Division, which manages after-school youth programs at a number of City Parks. This past summer, we conducted tennis sessions as part of their summer camp. In addition, we worked with the City of Florence, the Florence Tennis Association, and USTA SC to erect fencing around two courts at Levy Park so we can teach after-school clinics at that site. We are pushing for courts at Iola Jones Park or the old Williams Middle School to give us access to another high-density, low-income neighborhood.
- In September 2022, the RJYTP initiated its first regional program with the Hartsville, SC Boys and Girls Club, which is part of the Boys and Girls Clubs of the Pee Dee. Since that time, we have conducted regular training at several other locations in Hartsville and Darlington, including YMCAs, the Darlington Boys and Girls Club and Butler Academy, typically using mininets in gyms. We would like to reach out to other Pee Dee Region communities, and are looking for teaching pros in to represent us their home towns.
- In the fall of 2022, we began to hold periodic Saturday Fun Days at the Tennis Center. These are 150-minute trainings that feature drills. Competition, games, and a refreshment break—with the emphasis on fun. Several months ago, when we noticed parents sitting around watching their kids, we began to include adult beginner training, a move that has produced quite a few new players, including some Tennis 101 and league participants. Not coincidently, some of our most committed kids come from these new tennis families.

• Even though we provide youth racquets for all program participants, we recently started selling new racquets at cost (\$10) to children or other family members. We do this because we know that a family with its own racquets is more likely to stick with the sport. One long-term goal is to give each child a racquet as a graduation gift when he or she completes a course. In addition, we make sure participating families know that they are welcome at all public tennis courts and that the Tennis Center staff will give them loaner racquets and balls on request.

Florence Tennis Association

- The program's parent organization, the FTA, has worked with the City of Florence, Florence County, local tennis pros, businesses, and schools on many projects over the years. An all-volunteer entity managed by a volunteer Board of Directors, the FTA is a registered Community Tennis Association (CTA) chartered as a 501(c)3 organization. As a parent organization, the FTA has given the RJYTP strong and experienced oversight, reliable financial management, enhanced media and social media capacity, D&O and liability insurance and 501(c)3 status.
- One of the nation's strongest Community Tennis Associations, the FTA was national CTA of the Year in 2007 and Southern CTA of the Year in 2021, and has been South Carolina CTA of the year three times since 2004. It won the USTA SC Community Service Award in 2008 and the Southern Community Service Award in 2009, and has been recognized for community service by the SC Recreation and Parks Association and the Florence Athletic Hall of Fame. In March of 2021, the Florence City Council issued a Resolution supporting the Ron James Youth Tennis Program.
- Many FTA members have been tennis volunteers at the state, southern and national levels. In fact, the founders of the RJYTP, Ernie James and Paul Pittman, are FTA Board members and Past Presidents, who have also served as USTA South Carolina Presidents and on the USTA Southern Board and USTA Committees.

• Through its tournaments, training programs, and other activities. The FTA has brought the Florence area nationwide recognition, millions of dollars in tourism revenues and over \$300,000 in tennis facility and program grants.

National Junior Tennis and Learning

- NJTL is a national program founded over 50 years ago by Arthur Ashe and his friends to help children by using tennis to spur academic improvement. Shortly after it was founded the RJYTP sought and obtained membership in the USTA's National Junior Tennis and Learning Network, which oversees and supports over 300 chapters across the country.
- The hallmark of NJTL programs is blending tennis and education to improve academic outcomes. Each of our Florence area partner organizations has an academic enrichment program, but plans call for the RJYTP to develop its own teaching assets within three years. Funds have been set aside for part-time teachers, computers, and online curricula (STEM, English Language, Health and Wellness, and SEL), which will be selected in collaboration with partner organizations.
- Longitudinal studies of NJTL chapters across the country indicate that linking tennis and academic work produces improved academic outcomes in grades K-12 and boosts high school graduation and college acceptance rates. In addition, tennis is an exceptional vehicle for teaching sportsmanship and teamwork. It has been rated the healthiest recreational activity in America, is relatively inexpensive, and can be enjoyed for a lifetime.

An Ordinance to amend the City of Florence Code of Ordinances Chapter 1.7 and add a new subsection providing that a person who violates any section of the City's Code of Ordinances with the intent to intimidate another person or persons in whole or in part because of the action or perceived race, color, creed, religion, ancestry, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity, physical or mental disability or national origin is guilty of the separate offense of hate intimidation.

II. POINTS TO CONSIDER:

- 1. South Carolina and Wyoming are the only two states currently without a statewide hate crime statute.
- 2. The hate intimidation ordinance will create a separate offense and, if found guilty, can be punished by a fine of no more than \$500.00 or by imprisonment for no more than 30 days.
- 3. Other municipalities, to include Charleston, Columbia and Greenville, have adopted local ordinances that provide some protection against hate intimidation, hate bias, or similar language.

a. SECTION 1.7 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Florence, South Carolina, is hereby amended in its entirety to read as follows:

Sec. 1-7. - General penalty; continuing violations; hate intimidation

- (1) Wherever in this Code, or in any ordinance of the city, or rule, regulation or order promulgated by any officer or agency of the city under authority duly vested in such officer or agency, any act is required, or the failure to do any act is declared to be unlawful or an offense or a misdemeanor, and no specific penalty is provided for the violation thereof, the violator of any such provisions of this Code, or any such ordinance, rule, regulation or order shall be punished by a fine of not more than five hundred dollars (\$500.00) or by imprisonment for not more than thirty (30) days. Each day any violation of this Code, or any such ordinance, rule, regulation or order shall continue shall constitute, except where otherwise provided, a separate offense.
- (2) A person who violates another section of this chapter with the intent to intimidate another person or persons in whole or in part because of the action or perceived race, color, creed, religion, ancestry, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity, physical or mental disability or national origin of the other person or persons is guilty of the separate offense of hate intimidation and shall be punished as provided in Section 1.7(1). The sentences shall run consecutive to one another unless the Court specifies on the record the reason why they should run concurrent.






