INVOCATION

Councilwoman Teresa Myers Ervin gave the invocation for the meeting. The invocation was followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag.

BUDGET WORKSESSION

Mr. Griffin stated that the purpose of the meeting is to have a worksession on the proposed budget for FY 2012-2013. It is essentially an informational and educational presentation that will cover:

- Review of objectives established by Council on January 5, 2012
- Budget totals by funds
- Compensation and Benefits
- General Fund
- Hospitality Special Revenue Fund
- CDBG Budget
- Water & Sewer Enterprise Fund
- Stormwater Utility Enterprise Fund
- Water/Sewer & Stormwater Utility Construction Funds
- Utilities Equipment Replacement Funds

In January staff discussed with Council the essential need to look at downtown and that downtown redevelopment was necessary for economic development and necessary for how we view ourselves as a community.

FY 2012-2013 OBJECTIVES

▶ Downtown Redevelopment

- ▶ Adoption of Maintenance and Appearance Codes
- ▶ Adoption of Business Related Incentives
- ► Security
- ▶ Utility Improvements and Related Streetscape Repairs

Particular objectives discussed were the adoption of the Maintenance and Appearance Code, the incentive for downtown, security issues related to downtown, and the concept of utility replacement were discussed. Neighborhood redevelopment is on the forefront of what the City is thinking where we should be as a community. The Unified Development Code is essential to that process.

Neighborhood Redevelopment

- ► Adoption of the Unified Development Code (UDO)
- ▶ Promote infill redevelopment with financial assistance & policy
- ▶Fund housing infrastructure issues & beautification in targeted areas
- ► Adopt and fund a rental housing conversion program
- ▶ Increase code enforcement activities in residential neighborhoods
- ► Establish a Nuisance Abatement Court System
- ▶ Continue investment in neighborhood park & trail system

The Unified Development Code is essential to that process. There has been a lot of discussion about the issue of neighborhood redevelopment. A private consultant has been hired who will assist the City in identifying neighborhood weaknesses. Certainly the concept of abandoned and vacant properties is a significant problem in neighborhood redevelopment. The idea is not just to take away abandoned properties but its to create reinvestments in those historically underserved neighborhoods.

Quality of Life

- ▶ Downtown and Neighborhood Redevelopment
- ▶ Enhance Florence's Community Character and Image
- ▶ Preserve Historical, Cultural, and Environmental Resources
- ▶ Provide quality parks, facilities programs, and services

Quality of life defines the City. How we perceive ourselves is essential to how we and others view our community.

Public Infrastructure

- ▶ Investment in public infrastructure to attract and maintain a diverse economic base
 - Water & Sewer systems
 - Storm Drainage systems
 - Parks & Recreation facilities
 - Streets & Roadways

You can't have quality of life if you don't have good public infrastructure. The City has done a good job by the creation of public utilities and those public utilities can generally create the fund to support the related activities. The City is much weaker when you look at parks and recreation facilities and our streets and roadways. Those are in essence dependent upon property taxes, business licenses or franchise fees.

Our General Fund is basically a \$29 million dollar fund. This year our auditors asked us to create a general fund debt service fund which is essentially the debt service associated with our borrowing for the fire station and fire equipment and for Levy Park. The auditors requested that we pull that out of our general fund and put it into a special fund. This action actually decreases the general fund.

The Hospitality Fund is the best growth fund within the City.

Water/Sewer Utilities Expense Fund is stable and strong.

The Stormwater Utility Enterprise Fund is a flat fee to every commercial and residential property and is extremely stable.

The Utilities Construction Fund, the Stormwater Construction Fund and the Capital Replacement Fund is all within the City's Utiliies budget.

All funds total over \$70 million. These funds are equally divided between the General Fund and the Utility Funds, although the Utility Funds have gradually overtaken the General Fund as a matter of revenue.

FY 2012-2013 COMPENSATION & BENEFITS INFORMATION

- ► Average of 2% performance-based pay increases effective January 1, 2013
- ► Annual Longevity Recognition

A 2% performance based pay increase is being recommended for Council's approval. The annual longevity recognition that has been in place for several years has also been funded.

Property taxes and license fees make up the greatest portion of the City's budget. The Local Option Sales Tax (LOST) offsets 55.3% of the total property tax. Most of that offset is within the 4% residential property tax but it does assist in the 6% business category as well. More than half of all property taxes assessed are rebated through the LOST.

The decrease of 3.35% in property taxes between 2012 and 2013 is a result of taking out the debt services. As mentioned before this was recommended by our auditors. If the debt service had not been taken out, property takes would have had a net increase.

Government Reimbursements is generally down because the City is no longer getting police grants.

Interfund Transfers is showing an increase due to a transfer from the roll-cart maintenance fee.

Other Revenues received a large transfer from fund balance last year but it is not being proposed at this time for this budget. This results in a decrease for Other Revenues.

Overall this is essentially a flat budget.

GENERAL FUND BALANCE INFORMATION

- The City of Florence unassigned General Fund balance ("fund balance") for fiscal year ended June 30, 2011 is \$8,740,538.
- Fund balance should be maintained by the City at a level sufficient to:
 - meet the City's cyclical cash flow needs
 - ensure adequacy of reserves in the event of an emergency (i.e., natural disaster or unexpected decline or loss of significant revenue source)
 - ensure a strong General Obligation credit rating
- Fund balance amounts determined to be available for expenditure in any given year should be used only for:
 - long life capital items that do not increase ongoing operating costs
 - other non-recurring, one time expenditures
- This fund balance represents 30.5% (\$8,740,538) of the FY 2012-13 proposed budgeted General Fund expenditures in the amount of \$28,665,000.

Stormwater fees are essentially our number one revenue. It is as stable as you can get with modest growth. This budget does not have a lot of variance in it.

When the stormwater utility was adopted, one of the objectives was to create a utility that was equally divided between operations and debt or construction. Non-departmental construction fund transfer is 26% of the budget and debt service is 25%. Operations represents the remainder of the budget at 49%.

Mr. Griffin reviewed the objectives and spoke to their current status. A number of the objectives have been funded and are listed in the above chart.

The Maintenance and Appearance Code, Business Related Incentives, Security, and Utility Improvements and Related Streetscape Repairs have been funded. The funding sources include the approval of \$210,000 in FY 2012 midyear budget amendment and \$80,000 has been proposed from the Hospitality Fund in FY 2013.

The Unified Development Code (UDO) is a work in progress (funded); staff is hoping that the consultants that have been hired to look at infill redevelopment (not funded) will have some good suggestions that staff can incorporate; housing infrastructure issues and beautification in targeted areas (not funded); rental housing conversion program (not funded); increasing code enforcement activities in residential neighborhoods (funded); establish a Nuisance Abatement Court System (funded); continue investment in neighborhood park and trail system (funded); and housing initiatives are partially funded by state and federal grants.

Housing

Neighborhood Redevelopment

Housing and neighborhood conditions are central to any discussion about City affairs – whether the focus is on economic development, downtown redevelopment, or how we perceive ourselves as a city.

Housing Resources

State and Federal Sources of Funding Citywide Programs

- ▶ \$900,000 Neighborhood Stabilization Program (NSP) grant used to purchase foreclosed homes and stabilize neighborhood values. Program income from sale of homes will be used as down payment assistance.
- ▶ \$1.4 million NSP grant provided to three partner agencies (Florence Housing Authority, Habitat for Humanity and Florence Affordable Housing Corporation) to purchase foreclosed homes and stabilize neighborhoods. Program income from sale of homes will be used as down payment assistance. Some units have been converted to affordable rental units.
- ▶ \$300,000 HOME Grant provides down payment assistance to eligible applicants.
- ► Federal Home Loan Bank of Atlanta Rehabilitation Program that provides \$12,000 in rehabilitation assistance to eligible applicants.
- ▶ We have identified and partnered with church groups, civic organizations, etc. to provide rehabilitation to eligible applicants self funded by partners. Examples are Life Changers, Rebuilding Together, Central United Methodist Church, Calvary Baptist Church.

Mr. Scotty Davis, Director of Community Services gave Council a review of the Neighborhood Stabilization Program. It is a program to stabilize the values in the neighborhoods. The City has a \$2.3 million grant that will be used to purchase foreclosed homes in the neighborhoods, redevelop the homes and then resell them. Once the houses are sold, the money received is placed back in program income allowing the program to continue.

Mr. Davis also has a home grant that provides down payment assistant and also works with a program with church groups that provide rehabilitation to eligible applicants.

Mr. Griffin requested that Council approve \$280,000 for neighborhood redevelopment activities that has been set aside in the budget as nondesignated. \$90,000 comes from unappropriated CDBG funds and another \$90,000 is from funds designated for like activities but not spent. The remainder of \$100,000 is from new funds. Mr. Griffin would like to have these funds designated in order to let the consultant group do their work and come back with a recommendation of how to appropriate those funds.

Water and sewer and storm drainage are funded at normal maintenance amounts.

PUBLIC INFRASTRUCTURE - WASTEWATER

Current Project: Replacement of aging and obsolete treatment processes which will in turn increase treatment capacity from 15 MGD to 18 MGD. Completion is scheduled for Spring 2013.

Proposed Project:

- Expand treatment plant capacity from 18 mgd to 22 mdg by adding new unit processes. The estimated construction cost of \$10 million will be funded by a State Revolving Fund (SRF) loan.
- ► Eliminate conveyance "bottlenecks" adding additional capacity and eliminate potential NPDES violations. The estimated construction cost of approximately \$1.9 million.

Proposed Funding:

SRF Funding given favorable rates and availability of funds.

Next year staff would like to move forward with upgrading the City's wastewater plant from 18 MGD to 22 MGD (the third phase). The costs are \$10 million and \$1.9 million. SRF funding is available for this project at very favorable rates. An application has been sent to SRF and the City is in a good position to receive these funds.

- ▶ Worked with Pecan Festival Committee to streamline planning and budgeting
- ▶ Worked on preliminary plans for Business Incubator
- Developed façade renderings for 10 downtown buildings
- Continued support of Art Trail Gallery

Mr. Ray Reich, Downtown Development Manager reviewed the objectives that have been accomplished over the last nine months and the following objectives he would like to complete during FY 2012-2013.

Downtown Objectives to be completed during FY 2012-13:

- ▶ Review all buildings in the H1 District for Appearance & Maintenance Code violations and work with property owners on completing the renovation of facades to bring buildings into compliance with codes. Creation, funding and Council approved of downtown H1 District incentives.
- Complete a minimum of 10 façade renovations in H1 District.
- ▶ Replace at least 15 signs in the H1 District with signs that meet Design Guidelines.
- ▶ Open and Operate Business Incubator.
- ► Complete streetscape projects on West & East Evans and North & South Dargan.
- ► Continue work with private sector developers on downtown projects.
- ▶ Work to develop "public space" for dining and socials in area on South Dargan.
- Develop plan for Royal Knight Building.
- Complete façade and other necessary repairs to FDDC and City.
- Work with Committee to grow Florence After Five to be a larger event.
- Work with Pecan Festival Committee for better budget controls.
- Continue work with private sector developers for public/private partnerships for re-development of downtown H1 buildings.
- Work with existing downtown businesses to improve their marketing and merchandising skills.

One issue that Mr. Griffin wanted to make Council aware of is a new ADA (American Disabilities Act) regulation. \$75,000 had been set aside to make park improvements at Timrod Park. Staff learned of the new ADA regulations that require any park improvement done must bring the entire site into full compliance. \$75,000 was allocated for Timrod Park playground equipment. With the new ADA regulation, \$20 - 30,000 of the \$75,000 will have to be spent on re-engineering the site. Staff has met with a playground consultant and they will be making a proposal to staff.

Mr. Griffin concluded his presentation by stating he would like to propose a public hearing on the budget in May along with a shorter presentation. Mr. Griffin would also like to have first reading on the budget in May and then another worksession can be scheduled, if necessary. There was no objection.

A PUBLIC HEARING TO RECEIVE INPUT FROM THE PUBLIC REGARDING THE 2012-2013 COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT (CDBG) BUDGET.

The public hearing was opened at 1:05 p.m.

Mr. Scotty Davis, Director of Community Services stated that the City of Florence is an entitlement community and receives CDBG money each year. It is required that the funding be used to meet three national objectives: 1) aid in the elimination of slum and blight; 2) benefit low to moderate income persons; and 3) meet a need having a particular urgency. City staff held public meetings to receive input on the Community Development Block Grant funding at the followings times and locations:

*February 6, 2012 at 6:30 p.m. - Greater Wilson Heights

*February 8, 2012 at 7:00 p.m. – Levy Park

*February 21, 2012 at 7:00 p.m. - Northwest Community Center

*February 22, 2012 at 2:00 p.m. - City Council Chambers

*April 23, 2012 at 3:00 p.m. - Florence Tennis Center

*May 14, 2012 at 3:00 p.m. – Council Chambers

In conjunction with this, Mr. Davis' department has also been working with the neighborhoods and the neighborhood plans and using that information to continue the City's comprehensive plan for CDBG. There have been three different meetings with the neighborhoods and also a bus tour in the neighborhoods to identify needs and to help staff to prioritize the needs in those areas. Requests received from those neighborhood meetings include: Additional lighting in the neighborhoods; drainage issues; abandoned houses; Dr. Iola Jones Park Community Center, shed and picnic tables; and vacant lots. Staff has reviewed these issues and is recommending the following budget:

But when Council approves these funds those are the funds that you actually approve within the context of the budget.

Within general government most of the services provided by the City are heavily invested in personnel; particularly in the police and fire departments. Personnel and benefits total \$20,263,730 of the total budget of \$28,009,800. The remainder of the General Fund expenditures are in department operations; capital leases; grants OPEB/unemployment compensation; property/liability/small claims and fixed non departmental. The total of these expenditures is \$28,009,800.

Variable costs are: other capital; other non departmental; and community programs and total \$644,200.

Along with paying the debt, the city is still able to put a sizable amount of money into a construction fund that is purely set aside to offset costs for future expansion of either the wastewater treatment facility or part of the collection system, depending on what is recommended to us by the consultants.

A PUBLIC HEARING TO RECEIVE INPUT FROM THE PUBLIC REGARDING THE 2012 BUREAU OF JUSTICE ASSISTANCE GRANT FOR THE FLORENCE POLICE DEPARTMENT

The Public Hearing was opened at 1: 33 p.m.

Chief Anson Shells of the Florence Police Department reported that the Police Department has applied for funding through the Department of Justice Byrnes Equipment Grant in the amount of \$30,796. If awarded this grant, the Police Department intends to use the money to make the following purchase to improve operations within the department. The department plans to purchase a fire arms training system. This system is designed to provide officers with live action firearms scenarios to train officers how to properly react to real or perceived deadly force situations. Components of the system include Glock pistols to fire non-lethal projectiles and body protection. The cost of the system is \$16,416. The department will also purchase an automatic license tag reader to improve traffic and criminal enforcement for the City of Florence. This system will include two dual lens cameras, camera cables, camera controller, and software. The cost of the system is \$14,380.

The public hearing was closed at 1:44 p.m.

APPEARANCE BEFORE COUNCIL

MR. FORREST ALTON, CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER FOR THE S.C. CAMPAIGN TO PREVENT TEEN PREGNANCY.

Mayor Wukela presented Mr. Alton a Resolution declaring May as Teen Pregnancy Prevention Month in the City of Florence.

Mr. Alton gave a report on the efforts that are being made for the prevention of teen pregnancy in South Carolina. There has been a 26% decrease in South Carolina's teen birth rates over the last 10 years. The reduction in Florence County has also been 26% over the last 10 years. Despite these declines, South Carolina still has the 12th highest rate of teen birth in the country. Florence County has the 21st highest teen birth rate in South Carolina. Almost 7,000 girls under the age of 20 became mothers in South Carolina last year and 220 of those girls who were under the age of 20 were from Florence County.

MS. ROSEMARY A. BARILE, DIRECTOR OF TRAINING/PUBLIC INFORMATION FOR THE SC DEPARTMENT OF MENTAL HEALTH.

Ms. Barile invited Council to participate in the annual Mental Health Awareness Walk that will be held Wednesday, May 16, 2012 at 9:30 a.m.

MR. GERALD HOLLEY, CITY-COUNTY MEMORIAL STADIUM COMMISSION – TO MAKE A REQUEST FOR FUNDING FOR CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS AT AMERICAN LEGION FIELD.

Mr. Holley stated that the City and County share operation costs for American Legion Field and since 1981 any capital improvement costs have been shared 50/50 as well.

Florence County annually reworks the driveways to improve drainage and smooth the driving surface at American Legion Field. County staff has determined that additional gravel or stone is needed to upgrade the areas. The cost for this improvement is \$10,000.

Mr. Holley requested that City Council allocate \$5,000 for this upgrade. This would be contingent upon Florence County's approval of \$5,000.

Councilman Willis made a motion to approve the request of \$5,000. Councilwoman Williams-Blake seconded the motion,

Councilman Willis amended his motion to state that approval is given for up to \$5,000 and that it is contingent upon the County's approval of the request for an equal amount. Councilwoman Williams-Blake seconded the amendment.

The motion passed unanimously.

ORDINANCES IN POSITION

BILL NO. 2012-15 – SECOND READING

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE HOSPITALITY FUND BUDGET FOR THE CITY OF FLORENCE, SOUTH CAROLINA, FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING JULY 1, 2011 AND ENDING JUNE 30, 2012.

An Ordinance to amend the Hospitality Fund Budget for the City of Florence, South Carolina, for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2011 and ending June 30, 2012 was adopted on second reading.

Mayor Pro tem Brand made a motion to adopt Bill No. 2012-15 on second reading. Councilman Powers seconded the motion, which passed unanimously.

<u>BILL NO. 2012-16 – SECOND READING</u> <u>AN ORDINANCE TO ANNEX AND REZONE PROPERTY OWNED BY ELOISE HART, 2600</u> <u>ASCOT DRIVE.</u>

An Ordinance to annex and rezone property owned by Eloise Hart, 2600 Ascot Drive was adopted on second reading.

Mayor Pro tem Brand made a motion to adopt Bill No. 2012-16 on second reading. Councilman Powers seconded the motion, which passed unanimously.

INTRODUCTION OF ORDINANCES

BILL NO. 2012-17 - FIRST READING

AN ORDINANCE TO RAISE REVENUE AND ADOPT A BUDGET FOR THE CITY OF FLORENCE, SOUTH CAROLINA, FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING JULY 1, 2012 AND ENDING JUNE 30, 2013.

An Ordinance to raise revenue and adopt a budget for the City of Florence, South Carolina, for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2012 and ending June 30, 2013 was passed on first reading.

Mayor Pro tem Brand made a motion to pass Bill No. 2012-17 on first reading. Councilman Powers seconded the motion.

Councilman Robinson stated he has concerns with the community revitalization efforts and asked if Council would receive a report from the consultants prior to the June City Council meeting.

Mr. Griffin responded that the last group of focus meetings are not scheduled until the second week of June, therefore the report would not be ready by the June 11, 2012 City Council meeting. Mr. Griffin further stated he anticipated getting the report at the end of June to mid-July. \$290,000 has been taken and set aside in this budget for the City to use when the report is received.

Councilman Robinson said he does have serious concerns with the neighborhood revitalization plans. The CDBG area has been neglected in the past and he feels the proposed manner for correcting the problem will further exacerbate the problem.

Councilman Powers stated that at different times Council has discussed charging license fees to rental entities to raise revenues. Councilman Powers requested before second reading is given to the Budget to have a report from staff on what anticipated funds could be brought in by a license fee on rental properties.

Councilwoman Ervin requested that while staff is reviewing a system for license fees for commercial rental property to also look at a system for license fees for residential property as well.

The motion to pass Bill No. 2012-17 on first reading was unanimous.

BILL NO. 2012-18 – FIRST READING

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE GENERAL FUND BUDGET FOR THE CITY OF FLORENCE, SOUTH CAROLINA, FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING JULY 1, 2011 AND ENDING JUNE 30, 2012.

An Ordinance to amend the General Fund Budget for the City of Florence, South Carolina, for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2011 and ending June 30, 2012 was passed on first reading.

Mr. Thomas Chandler, Director of Finance reported this is an Ordinance to amend the budget to recognize as revenue \$160,000 received as a grant from the Drs. Bruce and Lee Foundation with an offsetting expenditure of \$160,000 for the acquisition of the old Kress Building located downtown.

Mayor Pro tem Brand made a motion to pass Bill No. 2012-18. Councilman Powers seconded the motion, which carried unanimously.

BILL NO. 2012-19 – FIRST READING AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ARTICLE 5, SIGN REGULATIONS IN THE ZONING ORDINANCE RELATING TO INSTITUTIONAL USES.

An Ordinance to amend Article 5, Sign Regulations in the Zoning Ordinance relating to Institutional Uses was passed on first reading.

Mr. Phillip Lookadoo, Director of Planning, Research and Development reported to Council that a request has been received for the signage relative to the new schools being built on Hoffmeyer Road. Currently the Ordinance allows for 20sqf free standing signs to be used in residential areas and a wall sign to be 12 sqf. As staff looked at the request and at more of a campus type feel for schools, it was determined that it would be necessary to look at an amendment that allowed for a scalable sign requirement. Staff drafted an amendment that allowed for there to be a sign for every 300 feet so if there were multiple parts of that campus each building could have a sign. It would then be allowed to have 1 sqf for every 2sqf of street frontage and capping it off at 90 sqf. Also allowed is an animated-type of sign so that schools can display messages and to formalize a policy that staff has in the department with respect to flashing signs. In order to do that, staff tied this to the state code relative to billboards, which basically says that you can have an LED type of sign but the sign has to stay up for a period of six seconds. When the sign changes, it has to change within 2 seconds and the light can't be varied from one time to the other.

These amendments were presented to the Planning Commission at a public hearing that was held on April 10, 2012. The Planning Commission members voted 6-0 to recommend the text amendment.

There was a request for staff to define "institutional uses" as relates to this Ordinance and to have a more definitive definition placed into the definition section of the Ordinance.

Mayor Pro tem Brand made a motion to pass Bill No. 2012-19 with the understanding that on second reading of this Ordinance, staff will have addressed this issue and the amendment will be more specific as to "institutional uses". Councilman Powers seconded the motion, which carried unanimously.

BILL NO. 2012-20 - FIRST READING

AN ORDINANCE TO REVISE CHAPTER 20 OF THE CITY CODE BY ESTABLISHING AN ORDINANCE WHICH REGULATES THE TOWING OF VEHICLES FROM PRIVATE PROPERTY WITHIN THE MUNICIPAL LIMITS OF THE CITY OF FLORENCE.

An Ordinance to revise Chapter 20 of the City Code by establishing an Ordinance which regulates the towing of vehicles from private property within the municipal limits of the City of Florence was passed on first reading.

Councilman Willis reported that for some time he has been concerned with situations that are occurring on parking lots and housing parcels with certain specialized wrecker services that concentrate on pulling vehicles without the owner's consent. This proposed Ordinance gives basic regulations to those specific wrecker services that want to put vehicles on business parking lots and apartment complexes where there is a violation of where the car is parked. It sets up a standard for a relationship that the wrecker service must have with the land owner to meet state law. It provides a uniform posting that the City will require on those parking lots that citizens and business owners want to engage in this

type of business. The business owner will be required to post these specific signs that tell citizens what is going to occur if someone parks improperly or mistakenly parks where they shouldn't. The proposed ordinance also sets the maximum fees that can be charged, not necessarily the fee that may be charged.

Councilman Willis made a motion to pass Bill No. 2012-20 on first reading. Mayor Pro tem Brand seconded the motion.

Councilman Robinson suggested that the City County Conference Committee review this issue to see if there can be uniformity between the County's wrecker ordinance and the City's wrecker ordinance. The motion to pass Bill No. 2012-20 carried unanimously.

BILL NO. 2012-21 - FIRST READING AN ORDINANCE TO REZONE 1811 CHEROKEE ROAD FROM B-1, LIMITED BUSINESS DISTRICT TO B-2, GENERAL COMMERCIAL DISTRICT.

An Ordinance to rezone 1811 Cherokee Road from B-1, Limited Business District to B-2, General Commercial District was passed on first reading.

Mr. Phillip Lookadoo, Director of Planning, Research and Development reported to Council that this request was amended by letter of the owner on May 7, 2012 to rezone from B-1 to B-2 as opposed to the original request of B-3.

The property address is 1811 Cherokee Road and it is identified on Tax Map 90026-08-003 and 90026-08-004 and is located in the Five Points area of the City of Florence. The request is being made by Mr. Kenneth Davis, owner.

Adjacent land uses on the north side of Cherokee Road are all commercial of some fashion. On the opposite side of Cherokee and encapsulated by Cashua Road, the land use is residential.

The future land use map of the Florence 2010 Comprehensive Plan designates the subject properties as Commercial Auto Urban, consistent with the present request.

A Public Hearing for rezoning was held on May 8, 2012 and the Planning Commission voted 8-1 in favor of recommending the rezoning. There was no one present at the Public Hearing to voice concerns or opposition to the rezoning. The applicant was present to speak in favor of the request.

Councilman Powers made a motion to pass Bill No. 2012-21 on first reading. Mayor Wukela seconded the motion, which passed unanimously.

REPORTS TO COUNCIL

A REQUEST BY THE PEE DEE TOURISM COMMISSION FOR ADDITIONAL FUNDING TO ASSIST WITH THE OPERATION OF THE SOUTH CAROLINA WELCOME CENTER LOCATED IN DILLON ON 1-95 SOUTHBOUND TO FLORENCE.

Mr. Thomas Chandler, Director of Finance reported to Council that at the April 9, 2012 regular city council meeting, Ms. Fran Willis, representing Pee Dee Tourism, informed City Council that last year the Pee Dee Tourism entered into a 3 year partnership with South Carolina Parks, Recreation and Tourism (SCPRT) to operate the Welcome Center located on I-95 Dillon southbound and that 1/3 of the facility has been allocated to the promotion of Florence. Ms. Willis noted that last year a partial year was funded by Florence County and the City of Florence in equal amounts of \$12,500.

Ms. Willis stated that Pee Dee Tourism requested \$20,000 each from Florence County and the City of Florence for the state Accommodations Tax funding. Florence County appropriated \$20,000 and the City appropriated \$10,900 for the current fiscal year from the state Accommodations Tax Fund.

Ms. Willis appeared before City Council at their April 9, 2012 regular meeting and requested an additional \$9,100 to represent a full \$20,000 match to the amount appropriated by the County.

Mayor Pro tem Brand asked how many other communities provide funding to Pee Dee Tourism and at what levels.

Mr. Chandler stated he did not know the levels of funding but Ms. Willis had stated that Pee Dee Tourism receives funding from six counties for the Welcome Center.

Councilwoman Williams-Blake made a motion to approve the request. Councilwoman Ervin seconded the motion, which passed unanimously.

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTION

RESOLUTION NO. 2012-12 A RESOLUTION TO ADOPT THE COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT BUDGET FOR FISCAL YEAR 2012-2013.

A Resolution to adopt the Community Development Block Grant Budget for Fiscal Year 2012-2013 was adopted by Council.

Councilman Robinson made a motion to adopt Resolution No. 2012-12. Councilman Powers seconded the motion, which carried unanimously.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

Mayor Wukela stated an Executive Session has been requested for the purpose of a discussion of employment and compensation for a city employee as well as to discuss a contractual matter regarding the potential acquisition of certain real estate.

Councilman Willis made a motion to enter into Executive Session. There was no objection. Council entered into Executive Session at 3:27 p.m.

Mayor Wukela reconvened the regular meeting at 4:17 p.m.

Mayor Wukela stated that the only matter discussed in Executive Session was the potential purchase of property.

Councilman Powers made a motion to authorize the City Manager to negotiate with regard to those properties discussed up to the terms discussed. Councilwoman Williams-Blake seconded the motion, which carried unanimously.

ADJOURN

Councilman Powers made a motion to adjourn the meeting. Councilwoman Ervin seconded the motion, which passed without objection.

AN ORDINANCE TO RAISE REVENUE AND ADOPT A BUDGET FOR THE CITY OF FLORENCE, SOUTH CAROLINA, FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING JULY 1, 2012, AND ENDING JUNE 30, 2013.

WHEREAS, § 5-7-260 of the South Carolina Code of Laws (as amended) requires that a Municipal Council shall act by ordinance to adopt budgets and levy taxes pursuant to public notice.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Florence in Council duly assembled and by the authority of the same:

Section 1

- (a) There is hereby adopted a General Fund budget for the City of Florence for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2012, and ending June 30, 2013, as filed in the office of the City Clerk which is hereby incorporated by reference as if set forth fully herein, providing for revenues and appropriations in a total amount of \$28,665,000.
- (b) Further, there is hereby adopted a General Fund Debt Service Fund budget for the City of Florence for fiscal year beginning July 1, 2012, and ending June 30, 2013, as filed in the office of the City Clerk which is hereby incorporated by reference as if set forth fully herein, providing for revenues and appropriations in a total amount of \$421,600.
- (c) Further, there is hereby adopted a Water and Sewer Utilities Enterprise Fund budget for the City of Florence for fiscal year beginning July 1, 2012, and ending June 30, 2013, as filed in the office of the City Clerk which is hereby incorporated by reference as if set forth fully herein, providing for revenues and appropriations in a total amount of \$30,110,000.
- (d) Further, there is hereby adopted a Stormwater Utility Enterprise Fund budget for the City of Florence for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2012, and ending June 30, 2013, as filed in the office of the City Clerk which is hereby incorporated by reference as if set forth fully herein providing for revenues and appropriations in the total amount of \$1,325,000.
- (e) Further, there is hereby adopted a Water and Sewer Utilities Construction Fund budget for the City of Florence for fiscal year beginning July 1, 2012, and ending June 30, 2013, as filed in the office of the City Clerk which is hereby incorporated by reference as if set forth fully herein, providing for revenues and appropriations in a total amount of \$4,931,000.
- (f) Further, there is hereby adopted a Stormwater Utility Construction Fund budget for the City of Florence for fiscal year beginning July 1, 2012, and ending June 30, 2013, as filed in the office of the City Clerk which is hereby incorporated by reference as if set forth fully herein, providing for revenues and appropriations in a total amount of \$527,000.

Fiscal Year 2012-13 Budget Ordinance (continued)

- (g) Further, there is hereby adopted a Water and Sewer Utilities Equipment Replacement Fund budget for the City of Florence for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2012, and ending June 30, 2013, as filed in the office of the City Clerk which is hereby incorporated by reference as if set forth fully herein providing for revenues and appropriations in the total amount of \$517,200.
- (h) Further, there is hereby adopted a Stormwater Utility Equipment Replacement Fund budget for the City of Florence for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2012, and ending June 30, 2013, as filed in the office of the City Clerk which is hereby incorporated by reference as if set forth fully herein providing for revenues and appropriations in the total amount of \$180,000.
- (i) Further, there is hereby adopted a Hospitality Fund budget for the City of Florence for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2012, and ending June 30, 2013, as filed in the office of the City Clerk which is hereby incorporated by reference as if set forth fully herein providing for revenues and appropriations in the total amount of \$3,385,000.

Section 2

Subject to the provisions and requirements of § 6-1-320 of the South Carolina Code of Laws (as amended), a tax for general operating purposes for the period from July 1, 2012, and ending June 30, 2013, for the sums and in the amount hereinafter mentioned, is and shall be levied, collected and paid into the treasury of the City of Florence for the operational use and service thereof. A tax of fifty three and seven-tenths (53.7) mills upon each one dollar (\$1.00) in value of real estate and personal property of every description owned and used in the City of Florence, South Carolina, is and shall be levied and paid into the City treasury for the credit to the City of Florence for the corporate purposes, improvements, and for the purpose of paying current operating expenses of said municipality. Such a tax is levied on such property as is assessed for taxation for County and State purposes.

Section 3

Subject to the provisions and requirements of § 6-1-320 of the South Carolina Code of Laws (as amended), a tax for general obligation bond indebtedness for the period from July 1, 2012, and ending June 30, 2013, for the sums and in the amount hereinafter mentioned, is and shall be levied, collected and paid into the treasury of the City of Florence for the purpose of meeting general obligation bond debt service requirements. A tax of up to, but not exceeding, four (4.0) mills upon each one dollar (\$1.00) in value of real estate and personal property of every description owned and used in the City of Florence, South Carolina, is and shall be levied and paid into the City treasury for the credit to the City of Florence for the purpose of providing for and paying general obligation bond debt of the municipality. Such a tax is levied on such property as is assessed for taxation for County and State purposes.

Section 4

The City Manager shall administer the budget and may authorize the transfer of appropriate funds within and between departments as necessary to achieve the goals of the budget.

Fiscal Year 2012-13 Budget Ordinance (continued)

Section 5

If for any reason, any sentence, clause or provision of this Ordinance shall be declared invalid, such shall not affect the remaining provisions thereof.

Section 6

That all ordinances or parts of ordinances conflicting with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed, insofar as the same affect this Ordinance.

Section 7

That this Ordinance shall become effective July 1, 2012.

DEPARTMENT/DIVISION: City Council – Sponsor – Councilman Glynn Willis

I. ISSUE UNDER CONSIDERATION:

An ordinance to regulate the posting, notification requirements and fees associated with towing of a vehicle from private property.

II. CURRENT STATUS/PREVIOUS ACTION TAKEN:

- The City of Florence currently has an ordinance which regulates wrecker service and storage charges for vehicles which are removed from public property by the City of Florence.
- 2. The City of Florence does not regulate the towing of vehicles from private property within the municipal limits of the City.
- 3. This is the initial consideration of the proposed ordinance.

III. POINTS TO CONSIDER:

- 1. Within the City there are no regulations regarding the towing of vehicles from private property. Therefore, reasonable notification, information or security may not be provided to the owner of a vehicle. Due to this lack of information an owner may believe his vehicle has been stolen and the Police Department is unable to assist the owner.
- 2. A large number of vehicle owners who have had a vehicle towed believe that they have been subjected to unfair business practices in the form of price gouging and other restrictions when they attempt to reclaim their vehicle.
- 3. Some examples of why a vehicle may be towed from private property are noted below: 1) a particular business parking lot is full and therefore the business patron(s) use a parking lot on an adjacent property; 2) an owner parks a vehicle in an attempt to sell the vehicle; 3) a vehicle has experienced a mechanical failure; or 4) a vehicle is left overnight at a business location but is not removed within a short period of time.
- **4.** Reasonable signage or posting of property would resolve most issues regarding unauthorized parking on private property. The City may also adopt rules to insure that market rates are charged for the service provided.

IV. STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recognizes the issues associated with private property towing and would recommend adoption of the proposed Ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE TO REVISE CHAPTER 20 OF THE CITY CODE BY ESTABLISHING AN ORDINANCE WHICH REGULATES THE TOWING OF VEHICLES FROM PRIVATE PROPERTY WITHIN THE MUNICIPAL LIMITS OF THE CITY OF FLORENCE.

- WHEREAS, the City Council recognizes and acknowledges that there are no local regulations regarding the posting of signs or other notification procedures informing owners of towed vehicles as to their status, contact or location information or fees assessed for towing and storage; and
- WHEREAS, it has been brought to the attention of City Council that a number of residents of the City believe they have been subjected to unfair business practices as it relates to the towing of their vehicles from property as well as fees charged for the act of towing and storage of their vehicle; and
- WHEREAS, it is also recognized by the City that owners of towed vehicles because they believe that their vehicle has been stolen call the City's Police Department which often creates confusion and wasted manpower of City Police personnel; and
- WHEREAS, it is reasonable to assert that the reasonable posting of property which would include contact information and notification to the Florence Police Department would assist in clarifying the issues regarding the towing of vehicles from private property for both the vehicle owner and the property owner.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, BY MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FLORENCE IN MEETING DULY ASSEMBLED AND THE AUTHORITY THEREOF THAT;

Sec. 20-103. Towing from private property.

- (a) It shall be unlawful to remove any motor vehicle from private property without authorization from the owner of the motor vehicle, except for the following circumstances:
 - (1) The property owner has appropriate signage which clearly states parking is prohibited. Signs shall be at least (3) square feet; and
 - (2) The posted signs contain a legible warning that violators' vehicles will be towed at the owner's expense and said sign shall also include a telephone number to call for the release information regarding the towed vehicle; and
 - (3) The posted signs were in place, clearly visible and legible to a driver approaching the private property where parking is prohibited/restricted at the time the vehicle was parked/
- (b) The owner of the vehicle towed from private property shall be responsible for paying all applicable towing and storage charges provided that the private property owner has complied with all requirements contained in subsection (a) above and (d) below.
- (c) If a vehicle is towed as a result of the property owner's request and the property owner has not complied with the requirements of subsection (a) above or (d) below, or if the vehicle is shown to have been legally parked at the time it was towed, the property owner shall be guilty of an offense punishable by a maximum fine of \$200.00 or sentenced to thirty (30) days imprisonment, and, in addition, shall, in the discretion of the municipal judge pursuant of §14-25-75 of the South Carolina Code of Laws, be responsible for reimbursement of towing and storage charges paid by the vehicle owner.
- (d) Before towing a vehicle from private property without authorization from the vehicle owner, the wrecker service operator shall first obtain from the property owner or their agent of record written authorization for the towing which shall set forth the name and original signature of the property owner or agent; the address from which the motor vehicle is to be towed; the reason for the removal; and the year, make, model, vehicle identification number, and license plate state and number of motor vehicle being towed. Any wrecker service removing a motor vehicle form private property without the consent of the owner of the

vehicle shall, within 30 minutes of the removal, deliver the report of the tow to the Florence Police Department (FPD). This delivery of the report shall either be done via e-mail to fdpcommunications@cityofflorence.com, by facsimile to (843) 676-8851, or by delivering it by hand to the FPD Telecommunications Desk at 180 N. Irby Street, City/County Complex. The report to the FPD must include a copy of the written authorization referenced in (d) above as well as the location where the motor vehicle may be claimed by its owner. The wrecker service may only tow to a storage area or garage located within the City of Florence or no more than five (5) road miles (shortage distance) as measured from the existing municipal limit boundary of the City of Florence. The business operations office and storage facility for the wrecker service must be located at the same physical location.

- (e) A private property owner may authorize persons as their agent of record to request towing of vehicles from their property pursuant to this article by sending a letter to the Florence Police Department giving authority to said person(s) and detailing the person's name, address and any contact information determined necessary by the Police Department.
- (f) It shall be unlawful for any towing business/towing operator to financially reward any property owner or agent of record and also for any property owner or agent of record to accept any financial reward from any towing business/towing operator.
- (g) When a vehicle is towed without owner authorization or a person lawfully in possession of the vehicle (hereinafter, the vehicle owner), the following fees shall be the maximum allowable charges by any wrecker operator or company and no other fees or charges of any kind shall be required by the vehicle owner in order to recover the vehicle.

Class A Wrecker/Car Carrier:

Towing - (per tow) \$135.00 flat fee to include dollies and Go-Jacks.

Storage – (after first 24 hours), per 24 hours: \$20.00

No Tow - shall be 50% of the towing fee

Vehicle release - (between 6PM and 7AM only), per release: \$35.00

Class D Wrecker:

Towing – (per tow) \$150.00 flat fee to include dollies and Go-Jacks.

Storage (after first 24 hours), per 24 hours: \$30.00.

No tow – shall be 50% of the towing fee.

Vehicle release (between 6PM and 7AM only), per release: \$35.00.

The city manager shall upon the recommendation of the chief of police cause a review of the above fees. Based upon review by the city manager shall cause the fees to be adjusted for those services noted above.

If a vehicle owner returns to reclaim his/her vehicle while the tow truck is on the scene, but prior to the vehicle being connected to the tow truck, the tow truck operator may charge no more than the "no tow" fee to release the vehicle. If the vehicle owner refuses or is unable to pay the no tow fee, the tow truck operator may tow the vehicle. If the vehicle is completely connected or on the "rollback" of the tow truck when the vehicle owner returns to reclaim the vehicle, the tow truck operator shall disconnect the vehicle and return it to the vehicle owner upon payment of no more than the maximum towing charge listed above. If the owner refuses or is unable to pay the towing fee, the vehicle may be towed.

- (h) A wrecker service operator is not required to return the vehicle to the person after the company's normal business hours, per state law [S.C. Code, §] 56-5-2525. Should the operator elect to provide for after hour requests, no additional fee or charge is allowed other than those established in [subsection] (D) above.
- (i) The wrecker service shall post a copy of the ordinance at business locations outlining the service provider's obligations and duties. Any wrecker service located within the city limits or holding a city business license shall be required to post the city prepared ordinance in a conspicuous location. It shall be unlawful to intentionally or negligently fail to post or alter or obscure the ordinance in any way.
- (j) The Chief of Police is the principle person responsible for the administration of this ordinance. It is also the responsibility of the Chief of Police to inform the business license department of any suspected unfair business practices as it relates to this ordinance.
- (k) As to private towing and law enforcement towing, the tow truck operator will permit the vehicle owner to remove at all times health and human care related

devices such as, but not limited to, car seats, strollers, walkers, crutches and the like, medications, prescriptions, personal handbags, and personal and identity papers from the vehicle without charge and without regard to any towing or storage charge owed on the vehicle. If the tow truck operator has removed this personal property from the vehicle, he will return it to the vehicle owner when requested without charge and without regard to any towing or storage charge owed on the vehicle.

(I) Any towing owner/operator who violates any provision of this Section of this chapter shall be deemed guilty of an offense and shall be subject to punishment under Florence code Sec. 20-102.





1. This Resolution will establish consistent rates for both public property towing and private property towing to avoid conflict and confusion within the community.

Staff recommends approval of Resolution 2012-14.

RESOLUTION 2012-

A RESOLUTION TO UPDATE THE WRECKER POLICY OF THE CITY OF FLORENCE TO BRING CURRENT THE ORIGINAL POLICY ADOPTED IN 1986 AND TO INCORPORATE ALL CHANGES SINCE THE ORIGINAL RESOLUTION.

WHEREAS, on December 15, 1986, the City Council of the City of Florence adopted a wrecker policy and incorporated by reference Chapter 20 Article III of the code of ordinances of the City of Florence;

WHEREAS, through the years the City Council passed Resolutions 1992-13, 2004-02, and 2009-11 amending and updating certain sections of the City's wrecker policy;

WHEREAS, the City of Florence desires to further amend and update the wrecker policy and to consolidate all previous changes into one complete document;

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved by the City Council of Florence, duly assembled, that the Wrecker Policy of the City of Florence be amended to read in its entirety as set out on Exhibit A attached hereto.

Exhibit A

WRECKER POLICY

Section 1. Emergency wrecker services.

The Police Dispatcher shall call any wrecker service having a business license issued by the City requested by the owner of a vehicle damaged or disabled in a street or public place. If no wrecker service is designated by the vehicle owner, the Police Dispatcher shall call the wrecker service as provided in Section 2 and 3 below.

Section 2. Rotation for police-requested towing.

The Chief of Police shall have prepared an alphabetical list of all firms meeting the requirements of this chapter for police-requested towing which shall be used by the Dispatcher for rotation of calls in order. Additions to the list shall be inserted alphabetically. Calls for heavy duty wreckers shall be rotated among those firms having heavy duty equipment without regard to the normal rotation for regular calls. Copies of the Dispatcher's list for the previous month will, for a nominal cost, be made available to the public upon written request within ten (10) days.

Section 3. Eligibility for police-requested towing.

Any firm having a valid business license to operate in the City shall become eligible to participate in the assignment of service calls by the Police Department if it conforms to the rules and requirements established herein. The application of a firm to participate in emergency police towing operations shall be made to the Chief of Police and shall contain the following information:

- (a) Name of Firm. Indicate whether owned by individual, corporation, or partnership, list names and addresses of all parties having a financial interest in said towing firm and state number of years business has been established.
- (b) Attendants and Drivers. List names and addresses of all attendants and drivers who will conduct the police towing service.
- (c) Equipment. Describe available equipment to be used in police towing services, particularly in terms of comparative qualities or capacities as related to minimum eligibility requirements.

- (d) Communications. Describe the method of operation of the communications system between place of business and operating tow trucks, as well as the means utilized for insuring prompt dispatch of trucks upon receipt of call from the Police Department. All such companies shall maintain a twenty-four hour communication capacity to enable contact if necessary at any time.
- (e) Primary Business Location. List location of primary business operation, including dimensions and type of facilities available.
- (f) Storage Lot. List location of storage lot(s), dimensions thereof, relationship to primary business operation, type of protection afforded, and screening and maintenance provided at said lot(s) and provide proof that the lot, if located in the City Limits, complies with applicable zoning regulations.
 - (g) Provide proof of insurance coverage as specified in Section 5.

Section 4. Minimum standards for equipment.

- (a) Every emergency wrecker proposed to be used by an applicant shall be subject to inspection in a manner determined by the Chief of Police and every such wrecker, other than an emergency heavy duty wrecker, shall comply with the following minimum requirements.
 - (1) Each wrecker shall be equipped with a power operated winch, winch line and boom, with a factory rated lifting capacity of not less than 8,000 pounds single line capacity.
 - (2) Each wrecker shall carry as standard equipment: tow sling, tow bar, towing dollies, safety chains, a fire extinguisher, wrecker bar, broom, shovel, and approved warning devices. Such devices shall include amber flashing warning lights or any additional devices that may be required by state law or state regulations.
 - (3) Each wrecker and all of its equipment shall be in a safe and good working condition.
 - (4) Each wrecker must have the name, address, and phone number of the wrecker company displayed on both sides of the vehicle.
- (b) Every emergency heavy duty wrecker of not less than two and one-half (2 ½) tons in size, shall meet the requirements in subsection (a) of this section, and in addition thereto, shall be equipped with a power operated winch, winch line and boom, with a factory rating lifting capacity of not less than 32,000 pounds, single or double line capacity, and a tow sling.

Section 5. Insurance.

- (a) An applicant shall procure and keep in full force and effect a policy of public liability and property damage insurance issued by a casualty insurance company authorized to do business in the state and in the standard form approved by the Insurance Commissioner of the state, with the insured provision of such policy including the City as an insured, and the coverage provision insuring the public from any loss or damage that may arise to any person or property by reason of the operation of an emergency wrecker of such applicant and providing that the amount of recovery on each emergency wrecker shall be in limits of not less than the following sums:
 - (1) For damages resulting in bodily injury or death of one (1) person in any one (1) accident, \$250,000.00.
 - (2) For any damages arising out of any one occurrence, \$500,000.00.
 - (3) For injury to or destruction of property in any one (1) accident, \$25,000.00.
- (b) An applicant shall procure liability insurance in the amount of \$100,000 to cover damages arising out of bodily injury or death to persons and in the amount of \$25,000 for damages for injury to or destruction of property caused by vehicles in tow, under possession of, or in control of a wrecker operated and maintained by the applicant.
- (c) Every policy mentioned in (a) above shall contain an endorsement providing for 30 days notice to the City in the event of any material change or cancellation of the policy.
- (d) The applicant shall also provide proof of the above referenced insurance annually through a certificate of insurance filed with the Police Department.

Section 6. Storage lot requirements.

(a) Lot. The wrecker service shall maintain a safe storage area for all vehicles towed which shall be approved by the Florence Police Department. This may be a locked building or a secured fenced-in area where the stored vehicles and other property shall not be accessible to the public. The owner of any approved storage facility and the wrecker license holder whose wrecker tows a vehicle to an approved storage facility and the wrecker license holder whose wrecker tows a vehicle to an approved storage facility shall be jointly and severally responsible for any damages or losses inflicted to vehicles which have been left at any such approved storage facility; provided however, that the foregoing liability and responsibility shall extend only to damage or losses caused by negligence of said storage facility, said wrecker service license holder, either of their agents, or by improper maintenance of such storage facility. Before any storage facility shall be approved by the Florence Police Department, an affidavit acknowledging the liability and responsibility, shall be executed by the person applying to have the storage facility approved by the Florence Police Department. These approved facilities shall be located within the City Limits or within one (1) mile adjacent to the City Limits. Those storage facilities

located in the City Limits shall have proof of compliance with city zoning regulations. The City of Florence shall assume no liability for storage of the vehicle.

Section 7. Wrecker and storage charges.

(a) When a vehicle is towed by a wrecker service selected under Section 2 and 3 of this Policy, the following fees shall be the maximum allowable charges by any wrecker operator or company and no other fees or charges of any kind shall be required by the vehicle owner in order to recover the vehicle.

(1) Towing by a Class A Wrecker/Car Carrier:

Towing - (per tow) \$135.00 flat fee to include dollies and Go-Jacks.

No Tow - shall be 50% of the towing fee.¹

After Hours Vehicle Release - \$35.00 per release.²

(2) Class D Wrecker:

Towing – (per tow) \$150.00 flat fee to include dollies and Go-Jacks.

No Tow – shall be 50% of the towing fee.³

After Hours Vehicle Release - \$35.00 per release.4

In addition to the charges specified above, an additional charge of \$100.00 dollars each may be made if the vehicle is flipped over and must be righted and/or if the vehicle is on a bank or sloping terrain.

(b) When a vehicle is towed by a wrecker service selected under Section 2 and 3 of this Policy, no storage charge shall be assessed for the first 24 hours after the towing. After the first 24 hours, the maximum storage charges on stored and impounded vehicles weighing under

¹ If the owner of such vehicle appears before his vehicle is towed away and makes claim to his vehicle after the wrecker has been ordered to remove such vehicle, the vehicle shall be released to the owner upon settlement with the wrecker service for 50% of the towing fee, provided the owner shall satisfy all charges against the vehicle at police headquarters.

Normal business hours for wrecker and storage businesses governed by this Policy shall be Monday through Friday from 7:00 a.m. until 6:00 p.m. A wrecker service operator is not required to return a vehicle to an owner after the company's normal business hours pursuant to Section 56-5-2525 of the South Carolina Code of Laws, as amended. Should the operator elect to provide for after hour request to pick up vehicles, the operator may charge no more than the amount specified in Section 7 (a) and (b) above.

10,000 pounds shall be \$20.00 dollars per day for storage of vehicles and or trailers. After the first 24 hours, the maximum storage charges on stored and impounded vehicles weighing 10,000 pounds or more shall be \$30.00 dollars per day for storage of vehicles and or trailers.

(c) All towing and storage charges will be itemized on an invoice or receipt when the charges are paid. No charges other than the towing or storage charges allowed in Section 7 (a) and (b) above may be made on any vehicle towed by a wrecker service selected under Section 2 and 3 of this Policy without the prior written approval of the owner or his agent.

Section 8. Penalties.

The business license of the owner or operator of any wrecker service who shall violate any of the applicable provisions of this chapter shall be subject to immediate suspension upon written notification by the Chief of Police for a period of up to fifteen (15) days, or permanent suspension by City Council after public hearing, in addition to prosecution for each violation of this chapter as a separate offense. Any deviation from the policies herein established or failure to provide reasonable, quick and efficient service may result in removal of a wrecker service from this rotation list by the Chief of Police. A wrecker service shall be automatically removed from this rotation list upon failure to respond to two consecutive calls, unless the Chief of Police shall determine after investigation that unusual circumstances were responsible for the company's failure to perform the requested towing service.

Section 9. Liability.

The City of Florence, its agents and employees, shall not be liable for any personal injury or property damage caused by negligence or failure of the wrecker or towing service to exercise reasonable prudent care in responding to a call or in towing a vehicle for storage or in any damage that may occur while the vehicle is in storage.

<u>Section 10.</u> Incorporation of applicable ordinances.

All of the provisions of Article III, Chapter 20 of the Code of Ordinances for the City of Florence regulating wrecker service companies are fully incorporated by reference as is repeated below.

<u>Section 11.</u> Personal property in towed vehicle.

The tow truck operator must permit the vehicle owner to remove at all times health and human care related devices such as, but not limited to, car seats, strollers, walkers, crutches and the like, medications, prescriptions, personal handbags, and personal and identity papers from the vehicle without charge and without regard to any towing or storage charge owed on the vehicle. If the tow truck operator has removed this personal property from the vehicle, he must return it to

the vehicle owner when requested without charge and without regard to any towing or storage charge owed on the vehicle.

On May 14, 2012, City Council unanimously adopted a CDBG resolution that showed the expenditure of \$224,958 in CDBG funding. The City of Florence Community Development Block grant was reduced from \$224,958 to \$224,853 for FY 2012-2013.

III. POINTS TO CONSIDER

- A. The City of Florence will receive \$224,853 in Community Development Block Grant funding for FY 2011-2012. This represents a decrease of \$105 from the city's initial allocation of \$224,958.
- B. The City of Florence has to amend the CDBG resolution adopted on May 14, 2012 and reduce the CDBG budget by \$105 to reflect our current allocation of \$224,853.
- C. The recommended budget provides funding for projects in each of CDBG targeted areas of North Florence, North West Florence, and East Florence. The recommended projects are as follows:

-Repairs to the basketball courts at Dr. Iola Jones Park	\$33,500
-Repairs to the basketball courts at the North West Park	\$33,500
- Storm drainage improvements in the Williams Heights area (*An additional \$150,000 will be provided by the storm water utility for this project)	\$20,853*
-Funding for the Pee Dee Transitional Shelter	\$35,000

-Debt service on the Section 108 loan, which was used to make improvements to Levy Park and the Barnes Street facility. \$100,000

The FHLBank of Atlanta requires applicants to be sponsored by a financial institution that is a member of the FHLBank. SC Bank and Trust is a member of the FHLBank of Atlanta and has agreed to be the city's sponsor.

III. POINTS TO CONSIDER

- A. FHLBank Atlanta (the Bank) has announced the availability of \$13.5 million in grant funds for the 2012 offering of the AHP Competitive program. For the 2012 offering, applicants can receive grant funds of up to \$500,000 per project. The funds can be used to assist in the acquisition, construction, or rehabilitation of rental or owner-occupied housing affordable to persons earning 80 percent or below the area's median income.
- B. FHLBank Atlanta offers competitively-priced financing, community development grants, and other banking services to help member financial institutions make affordable home mortgages and provide economic development credit to neighborhoods and communities. The Bank's members—its shareholders and customers—are commercial banks, credit unions, savings institutions, community development financial institutions, and insurance companies located in Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Maryland, North Carolina, South Carolina, Virginia, and the District of Columbia.

C. Over the past several years, the City of Florence has accessed millions of dollars in affordable housing grant funding from the SC State Housing Finance and Development Authority. The Authority has now changed its focus and is currently no longer offering grant funding for down payment and closing cost assistance. The Authority is offering loans (not grants) to governmental agencies for emergency housing rehabilitation.
