SPECIAL MEETING OF FLORENCE CITY COUNCIL WEDNESDAY, MAY 27, 2009 - 3:00 P.M. CITY-COUNTY COMPLEX CITY MANAGER'S CONFERENCE ROOM # 605 FLORENCE, SOUTH CAROLINA

MEMBERS PRESENT: Mayor Stephen J. Wukela called the special meeting to order at 3:00 p.m. The following members were present for the meeting: Councilman Frank J. Brand, II; Councilwoman Octavia Williams-Blake; Councilman William C. Bradham, Jr.; and Councilman Steve Powers. Councilman Ed Robinson arrived at 3:10 p.m. and Mayor Pro tem Williams arrived at 3:19 p.m. Councilwoman Octavia Williams-Blake arrived at 3:38p.m.

ALSO PRESENT: David N. Williams, City Manager; Dianne M. Rowan, Municipal Clerk; James W. Peterson, Jr., City Attorney; and Thomas Chandler, Director of Finance.

Notices of this regular meeting were sent to the media informing them of the date, place and time of the meeting. Dwight Dana of the Morning News was present for the meeting.

INVOCATION

Mayor Pro tem Billy D. Williams gave an invocation, which was followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag.

APPEARANCE BEFORE COUNCIL

Mr. Allie Brooks, Ms. Marisia Cooper, Pastor Jim Crooks, Pastor Odom and Pastor Collins appeared before Council and requested funding in the amount of \$60,000 to fund a summer program to help meet the needs of young people in the City who may not have access to camps and other social activities that will give structured and objective use of their time for the summer. Two years ago a program was held at the Boys and Girls Clubs from 7-ll p.m. Because of lack of funding this program was not held last year. Mr. Brooks stated that his concern is these students have been mentored for the past 9 nine months and they now need to have constructive time for the summer. Mr. Brooks stated the \$60,000 would be used for a Teen Center that would operate for 10 weeks, five days a week (Tuesday through Saturday) from 7-l1 p.m. There would be recreational activities, but more importantly there would be activities that are academically and technology oriented, supervised by a caring adult. This funding will serve 125 students for five nights. This program will bridge the gap from the end of school until the beginning of the next school year. All of these students are non-violent juveniles and are not in the Juvenile Justice system. The objective of this program is to keep them constructively occupied so they will not end up in the Juvenile Justice system.

Ms. Marisia Cooper, with the Attorney General's Office spoke in favor of this initiative. Reverend Jim Crooks of Southside Baptist Church, Pastor Odom and Pastor Collins all spoke in favor of this program.

OTHER BUSINESS

Mayor Wukela stated he received a letter dated May 21, 2009 from the City of Myrtle Beach thanking the City of Florence Fire Department for their assistance with the recent fires at Myrtle Beach.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

Councilman Brand made a motion to enter into Executive Session to discuss a personnel matter. Councilman Bradham seconded the motion, which carried unanimously.

Council entered into Executive Session at 3:43 p.m

Mayor Wukela reconvened the special meeting at 4:32 p.m.

Mayor Wukela stated that a legal matter was discussed in Executive Session.

Mayor Wukela made a motion that Council accept Judge Cheveron Scott's resignation effective July 31, 2009, which he provided to Council by a letter dated May 19, 2009. Councilman Bradham seconded the motion. There being no discussion, Council voted unanimously to pass this motion.

Mayor Wukela made a motion to appoint Mrs. Debbie Jackson as Municipal Judge effective for a term to begin June 1, 2009 and ending June 30, 2011. Councilman Brand seconded the motion. There being no discussion, Council voted to unanimously pass this motion.

BUDGET WORKSESSION

Mr. David Williams presented the budgets for the Hospitality Fee Fund, General Fund, General Fund Additional Operation Needs and General Fund Additional Capital Needs.

The <u>Hospitality Fee Fund</u> totals \$2,872,000. Hospitality Fee allowed uses are Tourism-related buildings, cultural recreational or cultural facilities; beach access and re-nourishment; highways, roads, streets and bridges providing access to tourist destinations; advertisements and promotions related to tourism development; water and sewer infrastructure to serve tourism-related demand. SC Law permits up to 20% of these funds to be spent for related operations. Even with the economic downturn the Hospitality Fee has remained strong in Florence. Staff is projecting a very slight increase over the current year. The amount projected for hospitality fees is \$2,855,000 with interest earnings of \$17,000, for a total budget of \$2,872,000. Hospitality Fee Fund Expenditures are: Civic Center Funding - \$1,121,000; Freedom Florence - \$570,000; Economic Development Partnership Membership - \$46,000; Florence Museum Support - \$30,000; Florence Downtown Development Corporation - \$200,000; Radio Drive/ Veterans Park Debt Service - \$270,500; REDLG Debt Service - \$33,000; Tennis Center/Performing Arts Center Debt Service - \$561,500; and Highway 52 Right-of-Way Acquisition (Payment 2 of 5) - \$40,000. Total = \$2,872,000.

<u>Civic Center Funding</u>: Debt Service is \$404,000; Operating Deficit - \$375,000; Business Development - \$35,000; Capital Improvements - \$307,000. **Total Funding is** \$1.121,000.

Florence Downtown Development Corporation Funding: Organizational Administration - \$71,000; Programs and Consulting - \$80,000; Occupancy Expenses - \$36,000; Debt Service on Royal Knight Building - \$13,000. Total Funding = \$200,000.

Councilman Powers asked if there were any plans to adopt a Master Plan for the downtown redevelopment. Councilman Powers stated he feels that Council should adopt a Master Plan in order to give the City the opportunity to submit input in the redevelopment of downtown.

The <u>General Fund FY 2009-2010</u> budget does not include any tax increases. Millage currently stands at 54.9 mills.

FY 2009-10 Changes in Personnel & Benefits - Original Plan

Council discussed the possibility of the City not paying 100% of the health insurance for employees. This would allow for employees that are covered under another plan to not be required to be covered by the City's plan also. The City could see savings on health insurance premiums with this scenario. Staff will research this.

Since 1995 the taxpayers of the City have received \$68,762,007 in tax credits from the Local Option Sales Tax revenues.

The difference in actual collections and budgeted for this year is \$325,000.

Franchise Fees Collections are very strong this year an no shortfall is projected.

State Shared Revenue will decrease approximately \$200,000 from what was budgeted for 2009 and for 2010 will be even more of a decrease.

The City has received another COPS grant that will fund three additional police officers, the City will receive a JAG grant, and there is an application pending for 15 additional police officers through a COPS grant program.

For Criminal fines, staff is projecting a small increase for next year. Traffic fines are projected lower for next year. There are many factors involved in these funds which makes it hard to project.

The original revenue projections were \$26,386,000 with the original expenditure requests being \$28,491,000; a difference of \$2,105,000.

Gasoline and oil costs for all funds have increased from slightly over \$200,000 in 2000 to over \$1 million for 2010. Electricity has increased dramatically in 10 years. Heating fuel is still a significant factor in some departments. Street Light costs have increased from \$450,000 in 2000 to over \$675,000 for 2010. There is a slight decline in the property and liability insurance costs; however the general trend is for it to increase.

To close the gap and balance the general fund budget staff had to reduce budget requests, eliminate some of the budget requests, tried to make some early purchases, made adjustments for pay increases, and enhanced revenue projections.

Line items targets for reductions: Salaries and wages, operations costs and capital equipment.

Mr. Williams stated that because General Fund revenue sources are insufficient to support the need for additional Police personnel, Fire Department personnel and equipment, and other identified upcoming budgetary considerations, options for additional revenues have been identified.

Potential Revenues to Support Additional Operational Needs:

*Increase property tax operating millage with no initial anticipated impact on 4% property owners. Homeowners would pay no additional tax.

*Include lessors of rental property in business license rate schedule.

Current Operating Millage Rate = 54.9. 2008 value of 1 mill is \$145,000. The total millage cap for the City is 4%. When this is applied to 54.9 mills, the City could increase the millage rate by 2.20 mills. This increase would generate approximately \$319,000. The City could increase the operating millage rate of property taxes up to 4 mills over the next two years with no initial impact on 4% owner-occupied homes. A millage rate increase over a 2 year period of approximately 2 mills per year would generate approximately \$300,000 for the first year and approximately \$600,000 for the second year and each year thereafter.

Taxpayer impact of a 4 mill tax increase for operations on 6% property (autos, rental property, small businesses) ranges from \$1.20 for the first year on property valued at \$10,000 to \$2.40 for the second year. For property valued at \$100,000 the increase would be \$12.00 for the first year and \$24.00 for the second year.

Taxpayer impact of a 4 mill tax increase for operations on 10.5% property (utilities and manufacturing) for a two year period would be \$105.00 for the first year and \$210.00 for the

second year on property valued at \$500,000. Property valued at \$1,000,000 would be \$210.00 for the first year and \$420.00 for the second year.

Charging non-resident business license rate for all outside businesses would potentially generate \$200,000 in additional annual revenue.

Including property rental in business licensing would generate approximately \$350,000 annually.

Staff suggests that these costs be spread out over several years. Construction Projects for FY 2009-10 could include: Fire Station 5 & Related Apparatus - \$1,200,000; Animal Shelter - \$1,100,000; Levy Park Facility - \$377,000; Levy Park Improvements - \$290,000; and Downtown Parking-Performing Arts Center - \$1,000,000. These projects total \$3,967,000. Construction Projects for FY 2010-11 could include: Fire Station 5 & Related Apparatus - \$400,000 and Streetscapes/Underground Utilities - \$600,000 for a total of \$1,000,000. For FY 2011-12, the construction projects could include: Streetscapes/Underground Utilities - \$625,000 and Business Incubator - \$250,000 for a total of \$875,000. In FY 2012-13, the construction project could be the remaining \$250,000 for the Business Incubator. The overall total for these projects is \$6.092,000.

The Projects Capital Plan Timeline for the equipment for FY 2009-10 could include: Replacement Fire Fighting Apparatus - \$700,000 and Replacement Sanitation Trucks - \$400,000 for a total of \$1,100,000. Equipment for FY 2010-11 could include: Replacement Fire Fighting Apparatus - \$300,000 and ISO Related Expenses - \$500,000 for a total of \$800,000. The replacement of the sanitation trucks at \$450,000 could be deferred until FY 2011-12. The overall total for the equipment needs is \$2,350,000.

Projected Capital Plan Timeline for other capital items could include the Housing Redevelopment - \$200,000 and Land & Building Acquisition/Demolition for FY 2009-10 for a total of \$450,000. In FY 2010-11 the Housing Redevelopment - \$200,000 and the Land & Building Acquisition/Demolition - \$250,000 for a total of \$450,000 could be considered.

Mr. Williams stated this was the end of the discussion for this part of the budget.

OTHER BUSINESS

Councilman Brand expressed concerns relating to some information he received that a Committee of Council had been formed without the knowledge of the entire Council, to conduct a study with the PDRTA regarding the Bush Recycling property. Councilman Brand stated he was told that three members of Council have formed a Committee and have spoken with Congressman Clyburn regarding \$50 million for a facility for PDRTA on the old Bush Recycling

site. Councilman Brand stated that if the City is involved in these discussions, why does the entire Council not know about them?

Councilwoman Williams-Blake stated she was told by a member of Council that a committee consisting of three council members had been formed for the purpose of discussing a \$50 million grant with Congressman Clyburn that would require a \$10 million match from the City of Florence.

Mayor Wukela stated that a committee has not been formed; however Councilman Williams, Councilman Robinson and himself have spoken with Congressman Clyburn regarding a proposal made by Wilbur Smith for a transportation hub to be located on the old Bush Recycling site. Mayor Wukela added they had also met with PDRTA regarding this matter. Mayor Wukela stated he did not intend for any member of Council to feel or be excluded from these discussions and apologized if they felt they had been excluded.

Bradham, Jr.; Councilman Ed Robinson; Councilman Steve Powers and Mayor Pro tem Billy D. Williams. Councilwoman Octavia Williams-Blake arrived at 4:12 p.m.

<u>ALSO PRESENT:</u> David N. Williams, City Manager; Dianne M. Rowan, Municipal Clerk; Thomas Chandler, Director of Finance; and Darene Stankus, Director of Human Resources.

Notices of this regular meeting were sent to the media informing them of the date, place and time of the meeting. Dwight Dana of the Morning News was present for the meeting.

INVOCATION

Mayor Pro tem Billy D. Williams gave the invocation, which was followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag.

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTION

RESOLUTION NO. 2009-08 A RESOLUTION TO AMEND RESOLUTION NO. 2009-06 REGARDING THE COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT BUDGET FOR 2008-2009.

Mr. David Williams, City Manager reported that Council has adopted a Resolution adopting the CDBG budget for FY 2009-2010 and also a Resolution was adopted that amended the current year's budget because of an additional \$90,000 plus that the City received for this budget year. This information was submitted to HUD, however the City has been notified by HUD that one of the items listed in the amended budget is not allowable under their regulations. The amount is approximately \$30,000 and was designated for playground equipment at Iola Jones Park. Mr. Williams asked Scotty Davis, Director of Community Services, to give Council other options of allowable uses of these funds for them to consider.

Councilman Brand made a motion to adopt the amended Resolution with the provision that fire hydrant replacement be put in the place of the playground equipment at Iola Jones Park. Councilman Bradham seconded the motion. During discussion, Councilman Williams stated he is concerned with the adequacy of the existing water lines getting the proper water pressure to the new hydrants. If this is approved by Council, Councilman Williams suggested the Water and Sewer Fund take a look at what upgrades need to be done to the lines that would serve these areas.

Councilman Robinson asked about the placement of the playground equipment for Iola Jones Park. Mr. Williams responded that another source of funds would have to be identified for the playground equipment.

Council voted unanimously to adopt Resolution No. 2009-08.

BUDGET WORKSESSION

Mr. David Williams, City Manager stated that the first category to be discussed is the compensation options that were presented.

Councilman Powers stated that before he can vote for a millage increase, he would like to see if there are other alternative funding sources for these needs. Councilwoman Williams-Blake agreed with Councilman Powers and feels like Council needs to go back through the proposed budget and look for other places to cut funding, such as Council's pay raise proposed for December, 2009. Councilman Williams and Councilman Robinson are in favor of the pay raise for Council. Councilman Bradham is in favor of deferring Council's raise until December 2011. Councilman Bradham would also like to see the travel policy updated. Councilman Robinson feels the present travel policy is justified and does not agree with any changes.

BREAK

Councilman Brand made a motion to take a brief break at 6:14 p.m. Councilman Bradham seconded the motion, which carried unanimously.

Mayor Wukela reconvened the meeting at 6:24 p.m.

Mr. David Williams stated that the funding sources allowed for capital projects differs from funding sources for operational needs. Following is a list of construction projects, equipment, and other capital project needs. The preferred way to raise the additional funds for these projects would be a General Obligation Bond to borrow the money to do them and it would probably take a couple of years to complete them.

It would be possible for the City to borrow \$11,430,008 for these projects; however, the total amount needed is \$7,705,000.

Mayor Wukela stated he feels that the Fire Station and the additional police officers are desperately needed.

Councilman Bradham stated that City Council needs a new travel policy as there are four new members that have not had a vote on the present policy and they need a voice on the policy. Councilman Bradham stated he will bring a revised travel policy to Council before July 1, 2009. Councilman Bradham also stated he felt Council's pay raise that is scheduled for December 2009, be deferred until December 2010. Councilman Bradham also stated he has some concerns relating to the lobbyist in Washington and would like to see this issue discussed further at a later date. Councilman Bradham made a suggestion that all out of state travel be eliminated effective July 1, 2009, with the exception, that if a member of Council can justify a trip to Washington that will benefit the City of Florence and the people of Florence, the councilmember should bring their request before the full council for Council's approval prior to the trip. This proposed change would have no effect on in state travel. \$30,000 has been allocated for Council travel in the FY 2009-2010 budget.

Councilman Robinson stated he feels the comments just made are racist. Councilman Robinson feels that if travel to Washington is stopped, it will hurt the growth of the City. It has taken years to build a relationship with the federal legislators to get the city where it s now. The group that goes to Washington brings money back to Florence. Councilman Robinson feels it would be wrong the stop out of state travel. Councilman Robinson added that he is the chairman of Municipal Black Caucus for South Carolina and will have to resign his position if he can not attend the out of state meetings. The money that is brought in as a result of out of state travel is much more than the money that is spent on out of state travel.

Councilman Bradham restated that his suggestion was that if there was a member of Council that felt he or she needed to go to Washington for something that would benefit the City or the people of the City, to appear before Council ahead of time and get the trip approved by Council, this would be accountable to the people.

Councilman Brand stated that Council will not always agree but disagreeing needs to be done in the right way and not made personal. It is important that Council uses one voice to move the City forward.

Councilman Williams stated he was elected by the people to do what he think is best for the people of Florence and thinks it is ridiculous for a member of Council to have to go before the full Council to ask for permission to travel out of state. Councilman Williams stated the parking deck at the downtown TECH site, the Bush Recycling Site, the West Florence Community Center, the Barnes Street Facility, the Surface Water Treatment Plant, and the sewer line on Highway 327 are all projects that were made possible with federal money that was obtained by going to Washington. The City is currently trying to obtain federal funding for the new Wastewater Treatment Plant.

Councilwoman Williams-Blake suggested that the \$30,000 that is budgeted for FY 2009-2010 be equally divided among the seven council members.

Mayor Wukela asked if there was any other discussion. There being none, Council adjourned the meeting.

Mayor Pro tem Billy D. Williams gave the invocation, which was followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Councilman Brand made a motion to approve the minutes of the May 6, 2009 Special Meeting; the Regular Meeting of May 11, 2009; and the Special Meeting of May 21, 2009. Councilman Bradham seconded the motion. There being no discussion, Council voted unanimously to pass the minutes as presented.

SPECIAL HONORS AND RECOGNITIONS

Mayor Wukela presented Curtis McCall a plaque in recognition of his retirement from the City of Florence. Curtis worked for the City 28 years beginning April 15, 1981 until April 15, 2009 when he retired.

Mayor Wukela presented Charlie Jernigan a certificate in recognition of completing 35 years of service with the City.

Gary Beckett was presented a certificate by Mayor Wukela in recognition of completing 10 years of service with the City.

Mayor Wukela presented Timothy Hunt a certificate recognizing his completion of 10 years of service with the City.

John Rogers was presented a certificate by Mayor Wukela for completing 10 years of service with the City.

APPEARANCE BEFORE COUNCIL

Representative Terry Alexander - to discuss a SCDOT seminar to inform and assist in qualifying minority and women owned businesses in the Pee Dee area of opportunities to apply for Federal Stimulus Dollars.

Representative Terry Alexander appeared before Council to speak about an upcoming seminar that the Greater Florence Chamber of Commerce, City of Florence and himself are sponsoring with SCDOT to inform and assist in qualifying minority and women owned businesses in the Pee Dee area of opportunities to apply for Federal Stimulus dollars. The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act - stimulus funding - has provided SCDOT with an additional \$463 million in federal funding. SCDOT is reaching out to inform and qualify more minority and women owned businesses that are involved in highway construction work and other areas that support these projects. Representative Alexander gave the date and time of the seminar.

Mr. Ray McBride - Executive Director of the Florence County Library

Mr. McBride gave an update on the services that the Florence County Library system offers. System wide circulation of library materials is up 10% over last year. The library averages 14,000 items circulated per month between the six libraries in the system. In 2008 the door count totaled 539, 686 people visiting the six libraries; up 8% over last year. That is an average of 1,479 people per day. So far in 2009, the average count per day is 1,591. Internet use is up 20% over last year. Last year 33,620 children attended library programming. This year the library system will exceed over 40,000 children. 7,000 adults are expected to attend library programming in 2009. The meeting room usage is up 45%. Currently three new library branches are under construction - one in Timmonsville, one in Olanta and one in Johnsonville.

Ms. Martha Meshaw, Club Sponsor for Wilson High School Civinette Club and four students - to be recognized for their contribution to Keep Florence Beautiful.

Mr. Julian Young of Keep Florence Beautiful introduced Ms. Martha Meshaw, Club Sponsor for the Wilson High School Civinette Club. Mr. Young also introduced Ms. Shannon Maney and Ms. Sharon Chin. The Wilson High School Civinette Club held a karaoke competition and raised \$182.00 for Keep Florence Beautiful.

Mr. Allie Brooks and members of the faith-based community

Mr. Allie Brooks appeared before Council to follow up with a request that was made to City Council at their May 27, 2009 meeting for \$60,000 in funding for a Teen Center at the Boys and Girls Club and also for mentoring training for the summer months. At the last meeting, Councilman Williams asked for specific figures for the funding of this Center. This information was provided to Council by Mr. Neil Zimmerman of the Boys and Girls Club. The City will have four community centers open this summer for teen activities. The centers will be open for four nights from 7:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. at Levy Park, North West Park, Maple Park and Barnes Street.

Mayor Pro tem Williams asked the City Manager to begin looking at funding sources for this initiative. Mayor Pro tem Williams stated that Council would get back with Mr. Brooks and his committee.

PUBLIC HEARING

Chief Anson Shells appeared before Council and informed Council that the Police Department has solicited federal funding through the Edward Byrnes Memorial Grant Program, which provides funding for equipment for law enforcement operations. This year the Department is requesting the amount of \$248,356, which is the amount that has been indicated that the Department will receive this year through the grant. The funds will be used this year to purchase three police vehicles to support the Community Services Division and to purchase 33 in-car video cameras to support Community Services, as well as the Patrol Division. There is no match and the grant period is for four years.

Mayor Wukela asked if there was anyone present who would like to speak. One individual asked what type of training the officers would receive in relationship to the new equipment. Chief Shells responded that the officers would receive training to become certified to use the equipment whether they actually have a camera in their car or not and will receive follow up training on an annual basis.

There being no one else to speak, Mayor Wukela closed the public hearing.

ORDINANCES IN POSITION

BILL NO. 2009-09 - SECOND READING

AN ORDINANCE TO ANNEX AND ZONE PROPERTY OWNED BY PROPERTY INVESTMENT GROUP, LLC LOCATED AT 1201 E. PAMPLICO HIGHWAY

An Ordinance to annex and zone property owned by Property Investment Group, LLC located at 1201 E. Pamplico Highway was adopted on second reading.

Mr. Phillip Lookadoo, Director of Urban Planning and Development reported that this issue came before Council in March 2009 for first reading and was approved by Council. In April 2009 the applicant withdrew this petition before second reading was given. Subsequent to that meeting the applicant has changed his mind and has requested that this issue come back before Council for second reading.

Mr. Lookadoo reported that this is a request to annex property located at 1201 E. Pamplico Highway and to zone the property B-3, General Commercial District. Water service is available to the property but sewer cannot be provided by gravity service to the property. Sewer service is to be provided by the developer.

Upon reviewing the application, Urban Planning and Development staff recommended approval of the request to the City of Florence Planning Commission.

On February 10, 2009, the Planning Commission voted unanimously to recommend approval of the annexation and zoning request.

Councilman Brand made a motion to adopt Bill No. 2009-09 on second reading. Councilman Powers seconded the motion. There being no further discussion, Council voted unanimously to adopt Bill No. 2009-09 on second reading.

BILL NO. 2009-14 - SECOND READING

AN ORDINANCE TO ANNEX PROPERTY OWNED BY SOUTH FLORENCE DEVELOPERS, LLC LOCATED ON CHAPEL VIEW DRIVE.

An Ordinance to annex property owned by South Florence Developers, LLC located on Chapel View Drive was adopted on second reading.

Mayor Pro tem Williams made a motion to pass Bill No. 2009-14. Councilman Brand seconded the motion. There being no further discussion, Council voted unanimously to adopt Bill No. 2009-14 on second reading.

BILL NO. 2009-16 - SECOND READING

AN ORDINANCE TO ANNEX PROPERTY OWNED BY WALLACE AND SHEILA HAYES, 1618 SOUTHWOOD COURT.

An Ordinance to annex property owned by Wallace and Sheila Hayes, 1618 Southwood Court was adopted on second reading.

Mayor Pro tem Williams made a motion to adopt Bill No. 2009-16. Councilman Brand seconded the motion. There being no discussion, Council voted unanimously to adopt Bill No. 2009-16 on second reading.

BILL NO. 2009-17 - SECOND READING

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 15 OF THE CITY OF FLORENCE CODE OF ORDINANCES

An Ordinance to amend Chapter 15 of the City of Florence Code of Ordinances was adopted on second reading.

Councilman Brand made a motion to adopt Bill No. 2009-17. Councilwoman Williams-Blake seconded the motion. There being no further discussion, Council voted unanimously to adopt Bill No. 2009-17 on second reading.

BILL NO. 2009-18 - SECOND READING

AN ORDINANCE TO ANNEX PROPERTIES OWNED BY MEDLIN CONSTRUCTION, 3777 TROTWOOD DRIVE AND 3778 WEST POINT DRIVE.

An Ordinance to annex properties owned by Medlin Construction, 3777 Trotwood Drive and 3778 West Point Drive was adopted on second reading.

Councilman Brand made a motion to adopt Bill No. 2009-18. Councilman Bradham seconded the motion. There being no further discussion, Council voted unanimously to adopt Bill No. 2009-18 on second reading.

BILL NO. 2009-19 - SECOND READING

AN ORDINANCE TO RAISE REVENUE AND ADOPT A BUDGET FOR THE CITY OF FLORENCE, SOUTH CAROLINA, FOR FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING JULY 1, 2009, AND ENDING JUNE 30, 2010.

An Ordinance to raise revenue and adopt a budget for the City of Florence, South Carolina, for fiscal year beginning July 1, 2009, and ending June 30, 2010 was deferred on second reading.

Mayor Wukela stated that the budget is currently in two parts. The first is the current capital and operating expenses and responsibilities of the City. That budget was approximately \$2.1 million in the red when the budget process started. By cutting a number of operating and capital expenses, the City Manager was able to balance the budget. This has left the City with a number of future operational and capital expenses that are unfunded. For the purposes of strategizing the possibilities of how the City could fund and solve that shortfall, the City Manager has been asked to and has provided Council with an option that contains a number of things. First, it is designed to provide for the funding of chiefly capital needs of the construction of a new fire station, to address the shortfall of equipment and manpower in the fire department, it seeks to address the need for 15 additional police officers, and the need for the additional operating expenses in the police department. It also contains a number of other capital and operational needs such as the new tennis center and the new animal shelter. In order to do that, staff has created a funding strategy to do a number of things. First is the increase of the property millage rate by 2.2 mills this fiscal year and potentially 2.2 mills the next fiscal year. Also, proposed is an increase of the capital millage by 4 mills in the next fiscal year primarily to address the need for the capital improvement of the fire station. This strategy also includes the increase of the business license on businesses that are located outside of the city limits but who do business inside the City of Florence. The final piece is assessing a business license on owners renting or leasing property resulting in gross receipts in excess of some amount to be determined.

Council has passed on first reading a budget for fiscal year 2009-2010 that does not include paying for any of the additional operational capital needs or funding of any of these needs.

Councilman Robinson made a motion to defer Bill No. 2009-19 and schedule another worksession. Councilman Powers seconded the motion.

Councilman Powers stated that he felt there were other alternatives besides raising taxes.

Councilman Brand suggested that a Ways and Means Committee be formed for next year to look at alternative funding sources.

Mayor Wukela stated the City is in a good position to apply for General Obligation debt as the City has no outstanding general obligation debt at this time. As far as the financing of the capital improvements, the time to do them is now because of the good financial position of the City. Because of the Local Option Sales Tax, if there is a 2.2% millage increase in the next fiscal year, residential property owners will see no increase in their property taxes. If at the end of the next fiscal year there is another 2.2% operational millage increase and a 4% capital millage increase, a residential property owner that has property valued at \$100,000 would see an increase of about \$1 a month. Businesses, because they pay a higher tax, would see an increase of about \$15 a month. These are the issues that Council has been struggling with. If there is a way to fund these needs without a tax increase or having the least affect on business, Mayor Wukela stated Council should do that. Mayor Wukela stated he could not support a budget that doesn't include funding for the additional 15 police officers and funding for a new fire station.

Councilman Powers stated he felt that all of the capital improvements could be done but would like to look for other ways to fund them without raising taxes.

Councilman Robinson stated he is very much against the hiring of 15 additional police officers.

Mayor Wukela stated he felt that the need for more police officers could not be any clearer.

Council voted unanimously to defer Bill No. 2009-19 on second reading.

INTRODUCTION OF ORDINANCES

BILL NO. 2009-04 - FIRST READING

AN ORDINANCE TO ESTABLISH THE DATE FOR THE HOLDING OF THE REFERENDUM CALLED FOR BY ORDINANCE 2008-47 TO DETERMINE WHETHER OR NOT THE CITY OF FLORENCE SHALL AMEND CHAPTER 2 OF ITS CITY CODE TO CHANGE ITS METHOD OF ELECTING THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL MEMBERS FROM PARTISAN ELECTIONS TO NONPARTISAN AND RUN-OFF ELECTION AS AUTHORIZED BY SECTION 5-15-62 OF THE SOUTH CAROLINA CODE OF LAWS.

This issue has been deferred until November 9, 2009.

BILL NO. 2009-20 - FIRST READING

A SERIES ORDINANCE TO AUTHORIZE THE BORROWING OF NOT EXCEEDING \$18,868,479, PLUS CAPITALIZED INTEREST, IF ANY, FROM THE SOUTH CAROLINA WATER QUALITY REVOLVING FUND AUTHORITY FOR BLENDED 2.81% INTEREST LOAN TO FINANCE, OVER A PERIOD OF TWENTY (20) YEARS, A PORTION OF THE CONSTRUCTION COSTS OF A WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANT TO BE CONSTRUCTED AT THE EXISTING FACILITY SITE.

A Series Ordinance to authorize the borrowing of not exceeding \$18,868,479, plus capitalized interest, if any, from the South Carolina Water Quality Revolving Fund Authority for blended 2.81% interest loan to finance, over a period of twenty (20) years, a portion of the construction costs of a Wastewater Treatment Plant to be constructed at the existing facility site was passed on first reading.

Mr. Thomas Chandler, Director of Finance reported that Council had before them an Ordinance for the borrowing of \$18,868,479 plus capitalized interest, if any, from the South Carolina Water Quality Revolving Fund Authority. The terms are a 20 year loan for a blended rate of 2.81%. The City of Florence is currently pursuing the construction of a new wastewater treatment facility at the current existing site. That construction will require a number of different funding sources. One of the opportunities that has come up with the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act 2009, commonly referred to as stimulus funds, was the ability to borrow for 0% interest, funds to assist in the construction of this facility. In April 2009, City Council adopted a Resolution to apply for these funds and the City was approved for this \$18,868,479. Of the \$18.8 million, \$4 million is being loaned at 0% interest. The remainder is at 3.5% interest for a blended rate of 2.81%.

Councilman Brand made a motion to pass Bill No. 2009-20. Councilman Bradham seconded the motion. There being no further discussion, Council voted unanimously to pass Bill No. 2009-20 on first reading.

BILL NO. 2009-21 - FIRST READING AN ORDINANCE TO ABANDON A PORTION OF RIGHT-OF-WAY ON BROGDON STREET.

An Ordinance to abandon a portion of right-of-way on Brogdon Street was passed on first reading.

Mr. Phillip Lookadoo, Director of Urban Planning and Development reported that this a request by Mr. J. P. Costas to abandon a portion of the 50 foot right-of-way on Brogdon Street. The portion to be abandoned is 15 feet on either side of the street, leaving 20 feet for continued access.

Currently, Brogdon Street is a 50 foot right-of-way leading from a 14' alley, DeJongh Alley. The applicant is repairing his building after fire damage and would like to add a small 5 foot addition to the Brogdon side of his building for electrical systems. The current building has non-conforming setback on Brogdon Street. Approval of this request would reduce the existing non-conformities and be a more productive use of a 50 foot right-of-way which is unnecessary in this location. Notifications have been seen to all affected property owners and public utilities and no comments have been received as of this date. The existing 50 foot right-of-way is unnecessary for a short dead-end road which serves 8 properties, two of which have primary access from other streets. No city utilities are located in the areas to be abandoned. Both local gas and electric providers have been contacted and have indicated no problems with the request. The Fire Department staff has also reviewed the request and has no objections.

Councilman Powers made a motion to pass Bill No. 2009-21. Councilman Brand seconded the motion. There being no further discussion, Council voted unanimously to pass Bill No. 2009-21 on first reading.

Councilman Brand made a motion to reappoint Mr. Derrick Owens and to appoint Mr. Ronald B. Moore to serve on the City of Florence Planning Commission. Councilman Powers seconded the motion.

Council voted unanimously to reappoint Mr. Derrick Owens to serve on the City of Florence Planning Commission.

Mayor Pro tem made a motion to reappoint Mrs. Elouise Frazier to serve on the City of Florence Planning Commission. Councilman Robinson seconded the motion.

Mayor Wukela, Mayor Pro tem Williams, Councilman Powers, Councilman Robinson, Councilman Bradham and Councilwoman Williams-Blake voted in favor of reappointing Mrs. Frazier to serve on the City of Florence Planning Commission.

Councilman Brand voted no to reappoint Mrs. Frazier.

Council voted unanimously to appoint Mr. Ronald B. Moore to serve on the City of Florence Planning Commission.

Mr. Derrick Owens and Mrs. Elouise Frazier were reappointed to serve on the City of Florence Planning Commission. Mr. Ronald B. Moore was appointed to serve on the City of Florence Planning Commission. These terms will begin July 1, 2009 and end June 30, 2012.

CITY OF FLORENCE BOARD OF ZONING APPEALS

Councilman Brand made a motion to reappoint Mr. Charles G. Howard, Jr. and Mrs. Kathryn Wilcox to serve on the City of Florence Board of Zoning Appeals. Councilman Bradham seconded the motion. There being no further discussion, Council voted unanimously to reappoint Mr. Charles Howard and Mrs. Kathryn Wilcox to serve on the City of Florence Board of Zoning Appeals.

Mr. Charles G. Howard, Jr. and Mrs. Kathryn Willcox were reappointed to serve on the Board of Zoning Appeals for a term to being July 1, 2009 and end June 30, 2012.

COMMISSIONERS OF ELECTION

Councilman Bradham made a motion to reappoint Dr. Joseph T. Stukes and Mr. Woodrow V. Lyde to serve on the Commissioners of Election. Councilman Powers seconded the motion. There being no further discussion. Council voted unanimously to reappoint Dr. Stukes and Mr. Lyde to serve on the Commissioners of Election.

Dr. Joseph T. Stukes and Mr. Woodrow V. Lyde were reappointed to serve on the Commissioners of Election for a term to begin July 1, 2009 and end June 30, 2015.

CITY OF FLORENCE DESIGN REVIEW BOARD

Councilman Powers made a motion to reappoint Mr. George J. Wilds, Mr. Cedric Brigman, Mrs. Julia Buyck and Mr. Nathaniel Mitchell to serve on the City of Florence Design Review Board. Councilman Brand seconded the motion. There being no further discussion, Council voted unanimously to reappoint Mr. Wilds, Mr. Brigman, Mrs. Buyck and Mr. Mitchell to serve on the Design Review Board.

Mr. George J. Wilds, Mr. Cedric Brigman, Mrs. Julia Buyck and Mr. Nathaniel Mitchell were reappointed to serve on the City of Florence Design Review Board for a term to begin July 1, 2009 and end June 30, 2013.

HOUSING AUTHORITY BOARD

Mayor Pro tem Williams made a motion to reappoint Mrs. Ruth Smith to serve on the Housing Authority Board. Councilman Brand seconded the motion. There being no further discussion, Council voted unanimously to reappoint Mrs. Ruth Smith

Mrs. Ruth Smith was reappointed to serve on the Housing Authority Board for a term to begin July 1, 2009 and end June 30, 2014.

HOUSING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT AND APPEALS

Councilman Brand made a motion to defer the appointments to this Board. Councilman Powers seconded the motion, which carried unanimously.

PARKS, BEAUTIFICATION, AND LEISURE SERVICES COMMISSION

Mayor Pro tem Williams made a motion to reappoint Ms. Jeanne Downing, Ms. Bettie Ann McCrae, Mr. Larry Hooks and Mrs. Barbara B. Jenkinson to serve on the Parks, Beautification, and Leisure Services Commission. Councilman Brand seconded the motion. there being no further discussion, Council voted unanimously to reappoint Ms. Downing, Ms. McCrae, Mr. Hooks and Mrs. Jenkinson to serve on the Parks Commission.

Ms. Jeanne Downing, Ms. Bettie Ann McCrae, Mr. Larry Hooks and Mrs. Barbara B. Jenkinson were reappointed to serve on the Parks, Beautification, and Leisure Services Commission for a term to begin July 1, 2009 and end June 30, 2014.

VETERANS PARK COMMITTEE

According to the Ordinance the Mayor is to appoint the Chairman and Vice-Chairman of this Committee.

Mayor Wukela appointed Mr. Barringer F. Wingard, Jr. to serve as the Chairman and Mr. Bruce A. Mallick as Vice-Chairman of the Veterans Park Committee for a term to begin immediately and end June 30, 2014.

Councilman Bradham made a motion to defer the remainder of the appointments until the next City Council meeting. Mayor Pro tem Williams seconded the motion. After a short discussion, Council voted unanimously to defer the remainder of the appointments.

(Mayor Pro tem Williams left the meeting at 3:23 p.m. and returned at 3:27 p.m.)

COUNCILMAN ED ROBINSON - TO DISCUSS THE CURFEW ORDINANCE

Councilman Ed Robinson stated he has been working with Department heads since August of 2008 on his continued efforts to keep the City's kids out of jail. One of the reasons they go to jail is because they are not in school. Councilman Robinson added there is a need to give guidance at least until they are 17 at which time they can make their own decisions. Councilman Robinson has worked with the Department of Social Services, Department of Juvenile Justice, Department of Mental Health, the Boys and Girls Club and Florence School District 1 on this Curfew Ordinance. Councilman Robinson stated he would like to have this ordinance in place before school begins in August as the Ordinance is based on the school year. The Ordinance basically states that children under 18 can not be on public property during school hours. If a child is taken into custody for violating the Ordinance, there would be a neutral place to take them until they can be released to a parent or guardian.

Mr. Jim Peterson, City Attorney added that he would provide a draft ordinance with specific findings in it for Council to review before adoption.

COUNCILMAN ED ROBINSON - TO REQUEST THE APPOINTMENT OF A COMMITTEE FOR THE TEEN CENTER

Councilman Ed Robinson made a motion to form a committee consisting of Councilman Powers, Drew Griffin, Phillip Lookadoo, individuals from the community and himself to choose a site for the Teen Center and to discuss the operations for the Teen Center. Mayor Pro tem Williams seconded the motion.

This Teen Center would be separate from the faith-based Teen Center and the Centers that are sponsored by the City. Mayor Pro tem Williams stated this would be a year-round center and not just for the summer months. Councilman Robinson has talked with Mr. Larry Jackson, Superintendent of Florence School District One who has agreed to have the buses from each school drop the children off at the Teen Center after school. Councilman Robinson has also talked with PDRTA about establishing a route to pick the children up and take them back to their homes. There will be a variety of activities for the children to participate in.

There being no further discussion, Council voted unanimously to approve the request to form a committee to study the prospects of a Teen Center.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

Mayor Wukela stated there was a legal matter to discuss in Executive Session.

Councilman Powers made a motion to enter into Executive Session. Councilman Bradham seconded the motion, which carried unanimously.

Council entered into Executive Session at 3:58 p.m.

Mayor Wukela reconvened the regular meeting at 4:19 p.m.

Mayor Wukela stated that Judge Charlene Hewitt, City Judge, who has been with the City for many years, is retiring from the City. In Executive Session, Council discussed the appointment of Judge Taft Guiles to the City Court effective July 1, 2009 and end June 30, 2011; a two year term. Mayor Pro tem Williams so moved and Councilman Bradham seconded the motion. There being no further discussion, Council voted unanimously to appoint Judge Taft Guiles to serve on City Court.

ADJOURN

Mayor Pro tem Williams made a motion to adjourn the meeting. Councilman Powers seconded the motion, which carried unanimously.

The meeting was adjourned at 4:21 p.m.

INVOCATION

Mayor Pro tem Billy D. Williams gave the invocation, which was followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag.

BILL NO. 2009-20 - SECOND READING

BILL NO. 2009-21 - SECOND READING

AN ORDINANCE TO ABANDON A PORTION OF RIGHT-OF-WAY ON BRODGON STREET.

An Ordinance to abandon a portion of right-of-way on Brogdon Street was adopted on second reading.

Councilman Powers made a motion to adopt Bill No. 2009-21. Councilman Bradham seconded the motion, which carried unanimously.

BUDGET WORKSESSION

Councilman Bradham made a motion to reduce the City Council travel account to remove funding for all out of state travel for council members effective July 1, 2009 except for the following consideration: that any member of Council that is justified to serve on a national organization, a board member or a council member of a national organization, may apply to Council and seek approval for that trip from the full Council. Councilman Bradham stated the reason for this is to make Council accountable as the travel expenses were large last year. Also, there are four new members on council and they need to have a part in developing a new policy.

As this motion would not change the current Resolution regarding council travel, Councilman Brand suggested that council should follow the current Resolution and if any member of council wishes to change or amend the current policy, to do so at a later date. Councilman Brand seconded the motion made by Councilman Bradham.

Mayor Wukela stated that since there is no proposed change to the current policy that Council could proceed with the discussion of the budget ordinance.

Mr. Jim Peterson, City Attorney was asked to clarify the current policy. Mr. Peterson stated that up until September 1997, City Council required councilmembers to come before the full council to get approval of any out of state travel. Resolution No. 97-26 changed the existing resolution to state that as of September 1997, any councilmember could take out of state travel, for city business, and be reimbursed, not to exceed \$2,000 per councilmember per fiscal year.

Mayor Pro tem Williams and Councilman Robinson were in agreement that the information and benefits brought back to the City from out of state travel outweighs the \$2,000 restriction. Mayor Pro tem Williams stated, and Councilman Robinson was in agreement, that if the proposed changes are made, he will make a motion for the City of Florence to cancel their membership with the National League of Cities and the Municipal Association of South Carolina.

Councilman Robinson and Mayor Pro tem Williams asked for clarification on an upcoming trip to Connecticut scheduled for July 21-26, 2009, as reservations have already been made. Councilman Powers and Councilwoman Williams-Blake stated they felt it would be appropriate for them to go to Connecticut.

Councilman Brand stated he agreed with most of the budget but has some concerns with the proposed capital improvements. Councilman Brand stated that a new fire station is needed, as well as new equipment and personnel. Also, there is a need for more police officers and staffing for the new tennis complex. Councilman Brand does not feel like this is the right time to raise taxes and suggested that a committee be formed of councilmembers, the City Manager and the Chief Financial Officer for the city. This committee will look for other ways besides raising taxes to fund these capital improvements. After a thorough review, if there are no other alternatives than to raise taxes, Councilman Brand stated then and only then would he consider raising taxes.

Councilman Bradham asked if the budget could be separated into two parts, the balanced budget (General Fund Budget) and the Capital Needs.

Mayor Wukela responded that technically the budget is divided. Council has passed, on first reading, an Ordinance that establishes a budget with current operating expenses and capital expenses and revenues to fund those.

Councilman Powers stated he agreed with Councilman Brand and made a motion that a permanent committee be formed to work year round to work on finding alternative funding sources rather than raising taxes. The committee would be appointed by City Council and would consist of three members of Council, the City Manager and the Finance Director. Councilwoman Williams-Blake seconded the motion.

Mayor Pro tem Williams stated he had concerns that his interest would not be represented on this committee. Mayor Pro tem Williams made a motion to amend Councilman Powers motion that the committee would report their findings to Council and not make any recommendations. Councilman Robinson seconded the motion.

Councilman Powers added that any final recommendation by the committee would have to be voted on by the full Council.

Voting in favor of the amendment was Mayor Pro tem Williams and Councilman Robinson.

Voting against the amendment were Mayor Wukela, Councilwoman Williams-Blake, Councilman Bradham, Councilman Brand and Councilman Powers.

The amendment did not pass

Voting in favor of Councilman Powers motion were Mayor Wukela, Councilman Powers, Councilman Brand, Councilman Bradham and Councilwoman Williams-Blake.

Voting against Councilman Powers motion were Mayor Pro tem Williams and Councilman Robinson.

Mayor Wukela stated he appreciated Councilman Brand's concern to look for other funding alternatives before raising taxes. However, Council has the issue of the budget before them. Mayor Wukela made a motion to amend Bill No. 2009-19 in order to increase the millage this year by 2.2 mills for operational and 2.2 mills next year and 4 mills next year in order to fund the additional police officers and the new fire station. This motion failed for lack of a second.

Councilman Bradham made a motion to pass Bill No. 2009-19 on second reading as presented. Councilman Brand seconded the motion.

Mayor Pro tem Williams requested that the funding in the amount of \$280,000 allocated in the FY 2009-2010 budget for the Downtown Development Corporation be put on hold until Council can receive a report from the Downtown Development Corporation relating to an agreement that was made, when the Corporation was first formed, to obtain private funding that would be added to the funding provided by the City. Councilman Robinson seconded the motion. Mayor Pro tem Williams added the funding for the Downtown Development Corporation was suppose to be a one time allocation and not a yearly part of the City's budget.

Mr. Williams, City Manager stated this funding is a part of the Hospitality Fund Budget and not the General Fund Budget. If Council agrees not to fund the Downtown Development Corporation it will free up \$280,000 in the Hospitality Fund Budget and will have no effect on the General Fund Budget.

Mayor Wukela stated he was inclined to support Mayor Pro tem Williams' motion. Mayor Wukela further stated that the current budget that is before Council for second reading does not contain any money for construction of an additional fire station, for additional police officers, for the construction of a humane society facility or for the operation of the new tennis facility but does contain \$80,000 for a consultant for the Downtown Development Corporation.

After a discussion, Council voted 5 to 2 to pass the motion to place a hold on the money allocated for the Downtown Development Corporation.

Mayor Wukela made a motion to change the way the city assesses business licenses for businesses located outside the city limits but are conducting business inside the city limits and to amend the budget to reflect the additional revenue that would be added because of this change. Councilman Brand seconded the motion.

Mr. David Williams clarified that the anticipated additional revenue from this change would be approximately \$200,000. If this change is made it will require that the business license ordinance be amended and will require two readings.

Council voted unanimously to approve the change.

Mayor Wukela asked if there were any further amendments to the budget as it currently stands.

There was a motion made earlier by Councilman Bradham and seconded by Councilman Brand to pass Bill No. 2009-19 on second reading.

Mayor Wukela stated that he feels the City needs to approve the increases that he proposed earlier.

Councilwoman Williams-Blake agreed and added that if Council's efforts to find alternative funding are exhausted in the next 45 days, then Council will need to come back as soon as possible to discuss increasing the millage to fund the police, fire and other projects.

Mayor Pro tem Williams stated he was not in agreement for a millage increase at any time but 45 days might not be enough time to find other funding sources.

Mayor Wukela stated if millage is not increased in the next 45 days, the City will lose the ability to raise the millage for the upcoming fiscal year.

Council voted unanimously to adopt Bill No. 2009-19 on second reading.

ADJOURN

Mayor Pro tem Williams made a motion to adjourn the meeting. Councilman Bradham seconded the motion, which carried unanimously.

The meeting was adjourned at 6:32 p.m.

I. ISSUE UNDER CONSIDERATION

- (a) Ordinance No. 2008-47 was adopted on October 20, 2008 to provide for a public referendum to be held in order to determine whether or not the City of Florence will amend Chapter 2 of its City Code to change its method of electing the mayor and city council members from partisan elections to the nonpartisan election and run-off election method as authorized by Section 5-15-62 of the South Carolina Code of Laws.
- (b) The ordinance now under consideration is designed to set the date for referendum election.

II. CURRENT STATUS/PREVIOUS ACTION TAKEN

- (a) After passage of Ordinance No. 2008-47 referred to above, as called for in the ordinance, we submitted the matter to the Department of Justice for pre-clearance. On January 5, 2009, we received a letter from the Department of Justice in which we were informed that no determination regarding the submission for pre-clearance would be made until the referendum election is scheduled.
- (b) The attached ordinance is designed to set the date for the election for September 15, 2009 in order to leave time for pre-clearance and the required public notice.

III. POINTS TO CONSIDER

- (a) The attached ordinance chooses the date of September 15, 2009 in order to allow the following to occur:
 - (1) The ordinance requires two readings;

- (2) The Justice Department must pre-clear the election date and process, and it has sixty (60) days to complete that process after we submit it.
- (3) Section 5-15-50 and 7-13-35 require that Public notice of the referendum election be published at least sixty (60) days prior to the election date, and this notice cannot be given prior to receiving the pre-clearance mentioned above.
- (b) It is clear that any such change in Florence requires that we both follow the statutory requirements found in Title 5 of the South Carolina Code and that we comply with the requirements of the U.S. Justice Department.
- (c) To safely allow for the activities and times set out above, and to allow all interested citizens time to prepare for the referendum, a September 15, 2009 date is about the earliest safe date for the election.

IV. STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Staff stands ready to carry out the wishes of Council.

AN ORDINANCE TO ESTABLISH THE DATE FOR THE HOLDING OF THE REFERENDUM CALLED FOR BY ORDINANCE 2008-47 TO DETERMINE WHETHER OR NOT THE CITY OF FLORENCE SHALL AMEND CHAPTER 2 OF ITS CITY CODE TO CHANGE ITS METHOD OF ELECTING THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL MEMBERS FROM PARTISAN ELECTIONS TO NONPARTISAN AND RUN-OFF ELECTION AS AUTHORIZED BY SECTION 5-15-62 OF THE SOUTH CAROLINA CODE OF LAWS.

WHEREAS, City Council duly enacted Ordinance 2008-47 on October 20, 2008 and thereby called for a referendum to determine whether or not the City of Florence shall amend Chapter 2 of its City Code to change its method of electing the mayor and city council members from partisan elections to nonpartisan and run-off election as authorized by section 5-15-62 of the south carolina code of laws, and

WHEREAS, §5-15-70 of the Code of Laws of South Carolina, 1976, as amended, requires that certain times be established by Ordinance for the conduction of Municipal Elections.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED By the City Council of the City of Florence at a meeting duly assembled and by the authority thereof:

That the following is hereby established for the Referendum Election called for by Ordinance 2008-47:

1. Referendum Election

The Referendum Election shall be held on September 15, 2009 during voting hours beginning at 7:00 a.m. and concluding at 7:00 p.m., at which time a single question shall be posed to the citizens of the City of Florence as follows:

"Shall the Municipality of Florence amend Chapter 2 of its City Code to change its method of electing its Mayor and Members of Council from partisan elections to the nonpartisan election and run-off election method as authorized by Section 5-15-62 of the South Carolina Code of Laws?"

2 Election Commission

The Referendum Election shall be conducted in accordance with §5-15-100, S. C. Code of Laws, by the Municipal Election Commission, appointed pursuant to §5-5-90, S. C. Code of

Laws. Pursuant to §5-15-145 of the S. C. Code of Laws, the City hereby authorizes the Florence County Election Commission to physically conduct the General Election to include preparation of the ballots, obtaining Voter Registration Lists, appointing and coordinating Poll Managers, handling absentee ballots, preparing voting materials for each precinct, readying voting places, supervising voting places, counting votes, and reporting the results to the Municipal Election Commission. The Municipal Election Commission shall certify the results and address any contests of the results.

3. Notice

Public Notice of the Refendum Election shall be given at least 60 days prior to the election pursuant to §5-15-50 and §7-13-35 of the South Carolina Code of Laws, and the notice shall include the last date one can register to be eligible to vote in the referendum, the date, time and location any hearing on challenged ballots will be held, the time absentee ballots will be counted, and the location of the polling places.

4. <u>Determining Results of the Election</u>

To effect the change to the nonpartisan and run-off election method as authorized by §5-15-62 of the South Carolina Code of Laws, a majority of the votes cast by qualified electors must be "Yes" votes in favor of the change.

5. Ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its approval and adoption by the City Council of the City of Florence.

As part of this information, council received a staff recommendation that a nonresidential business license rate be included for all business license classifications into the City of Florence business license ordinance.

ORDINANCE NO. 2009-

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 13, ARTICLE I, SECTION 13-18 OF THE CITY OF FLORENCE CODE OF ORDINANCES PERTAINING TO BUSINESS LICENSE CLASSIFICATION RATE SCHEDULES, AND, SPECIFICALLY, NON-RESIDENT RATES

WHEREAS, the City of Florence, South Carolina, collects business license fees as provided in Chapter 13 of the City of Florence Code of Ordinances, with Section 13-18 of said chapter specifying license classification rate schedules; and

WHEREAS, Section 13-18 imposes an itinerant business license rate schedule for a non-resident contractor, having no fixed principal place of business within the city limits of Florence, which is double the rate of a contractor with a permanent place of business within the city limits; and

WHEREAS, Section 13-18 imposes no itinerant or non-resident business license rate on any other business classification; and

WHEREAS, the State Supreme Court upheld in *American Bakeries Co. v. Sumter*, 173 S.C. 94, 174 S.E. 919 (1934), and *Crosswell & Co., Inc. v. Town of Bishopville*, 172 S. C. 26, 172 S.E. 698 (1933) that a differential business license rate classification between residents and non-residents is justified, if the circumstances and conditions are different and if the imposition of a higher license on non-residents is not unreasonable, capricious, or confiscatory; and

WHEREAS, the Municipal Association of South Carolina Business License Handbook states that many license ordinances provide that rates for non-resident businesses are classified higher than residents and that these rates are usually double the resident rates; and

WHEREAS, the Municipal Association of South Carolina Model Business License Ordinance includes a non-resident business license rate which is double the rate of a business with a fixed principal place of business within the municipality, and this model is followed in many cities throughout South Carolina; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Florence hereby finds and concludes that, unlike resident businesses which maintain a fixed principal place of business within the municipality and thereby contribute tax revenues to the City, non-resident businesses maintain no fixed principal place of business within the municipality and contribute no tax revenues, but do receive the benefits and services provided by the City, thereby creating circumstances and conditions which are different and justify the imposition of a higher license on the non-resident businesses; and

WHEREAS, City Council has determined that it is reasonable and equitable to charge a non-resident business license rate that will be double the rate of a business with a fixed principal place of business within the city limits of Florence.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the City of Florence, South Carolina that Section 13-18 of the City of Florence Code of Ordinances be amended

by adding to Section 13-18, immediately following the chart entitled RATES and immediately preceding the introductory sentence and chart for declining rates the following section:

NON-RESIDENT RATES

Unless otherwise specifically provided, all minimum fees and rates shall be doubled for non-residents and itinerants having no fixed principal place of business within the municipality.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED that the said declining rates introductory sentence and rate chart that follows the above newly added section shall be amended by this ordinance to be entitled DECLINING RATES.

All ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

For renewal licenses, this ordinance shall become effective with the next business license renewal period as defined in Section 13-4 of the City of Florence Code of Ordinances following the date of adoption of this ordinance. For new business licenses, this ordinance shall become effective immediately upon adoption.

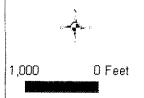

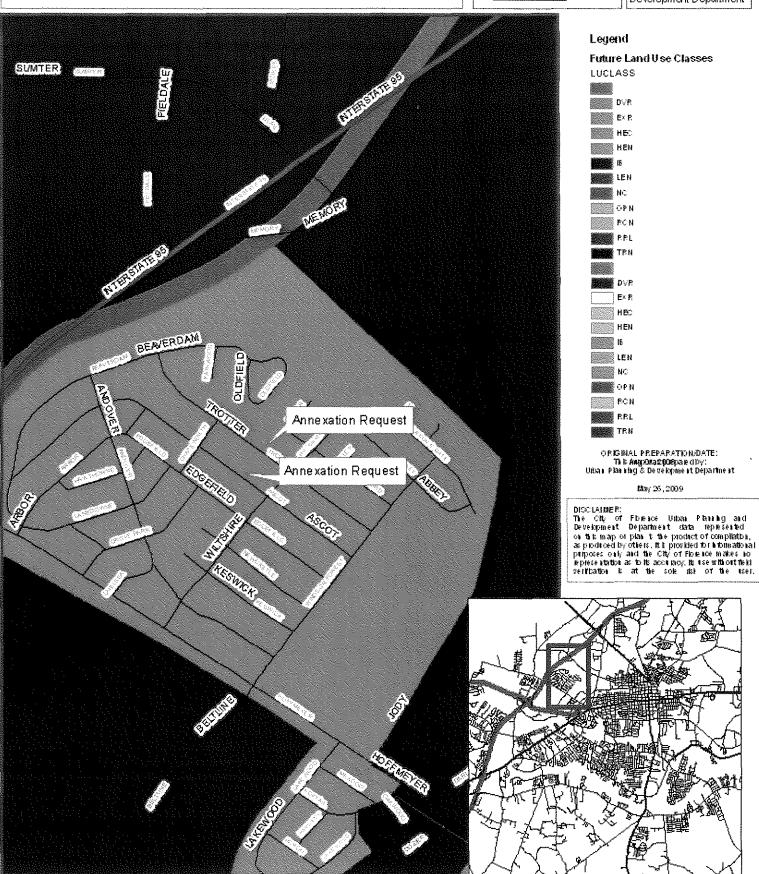

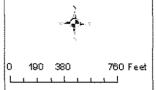
COMPREHENSIVE MAP PLAN 2648 Ascot Drive & 2647 Trotter Road



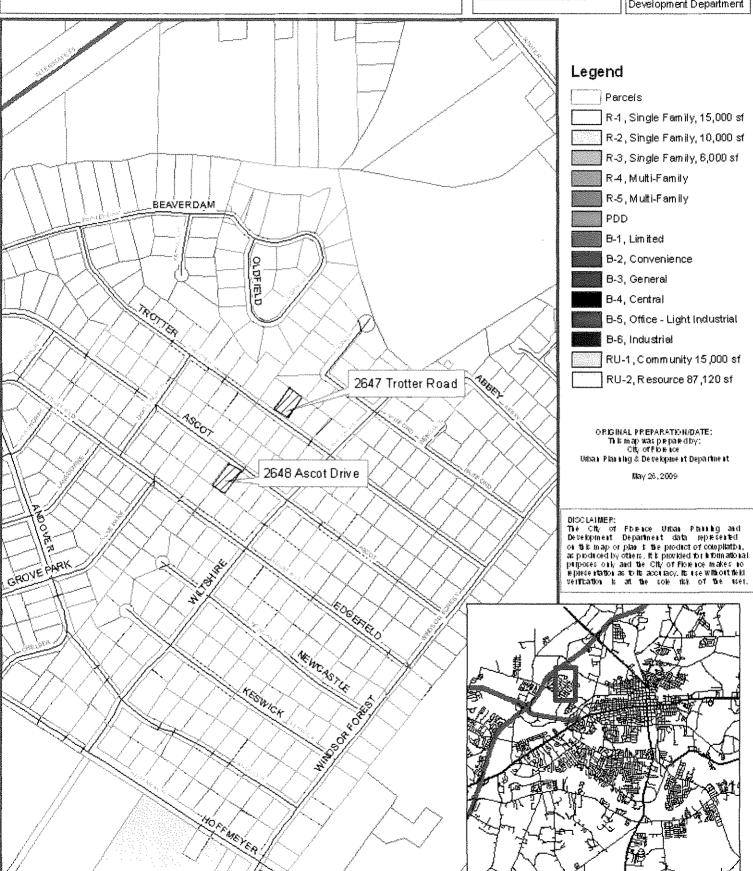




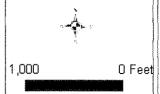
ZONING MAP 2648 Ascot Drive & 2647 Trotter Road



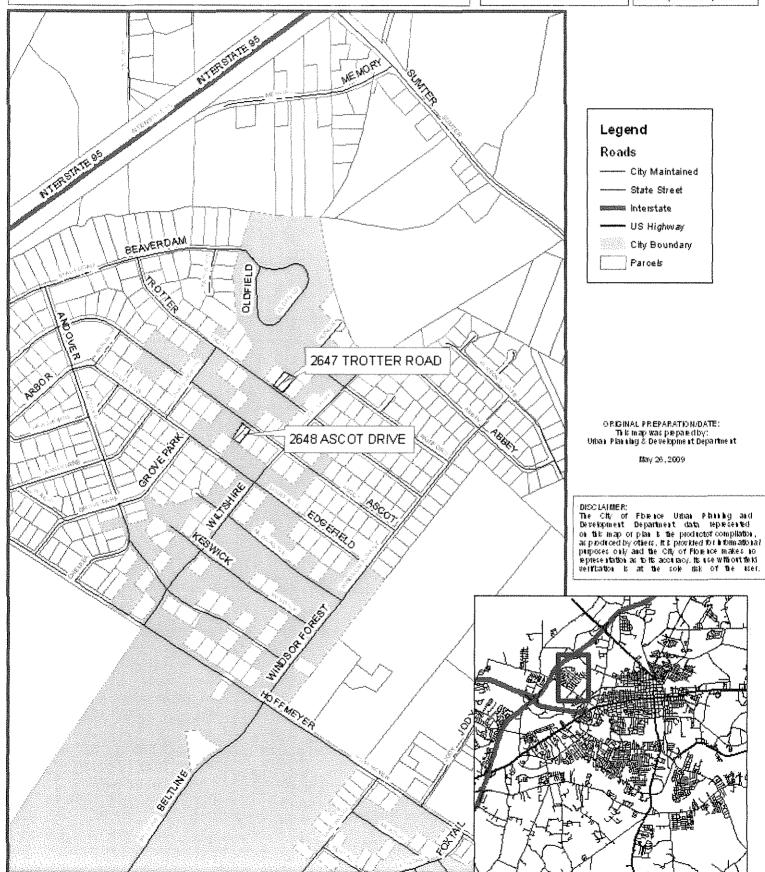

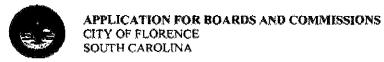

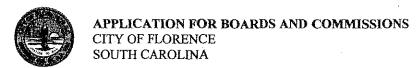

The Veterans Park Committee shall be composed of the following:

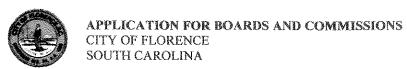

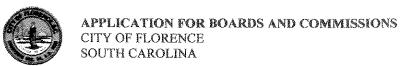

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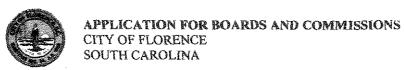

II. CURRENT STATUS/PREVIOUS ACTION TAKEN:

Since July 1, 2008 the City has taken over zoning enforcement for properties within the municipal boundaries of the City. Included in that enforcement effort has been the enforcement of Section 5.5 of the City Zoning Ordinance.

III. POINTS TO CONSIDER:

Section 5.5 of the City zoning ordinance allows temporary banners for a period of thirty days with six month intervals. Recent complaints have been made concerning the enforcement of Section 5.5 with respect to non-profit agencies, including churches.

- (1) Refer to the Planning Commission for study and recommendation.
- (2) Ask staff to generate optional amendments for consideration by City Council
- (3) Defer request should additional information be needed.
- (4) Suggest other alternatives.
